Executive Summary

In January and February of 2016, Saint Mary's College administered the Higher Education Data Sharing Consortium's (HEDS) Sexual Assault Climate Survey to its current students, both undergraduate and graduate. The goal of the survey is to assess the campus climate around sexual violence that informs decision-making and improvements that enable Saint Mary's to continue to work towards eliminating sexual violence. HEDS is a consortium of more than 100 private colleges and universities (primarily small, liberal arts institutions). Participating in the HEDS survey allows Saint Mary's to collect benchmarking data from similar institutions nationally who also administered the survey to its students during the same academic year. In total, 517 Saint Mary's students responded for a 33% response rate. A total of 49 institutions participated in the survey nationally in 2015-16 with responses collected from 13,401 women with an average response rate of 22%. Results below are isolated to women respondents only at all participating institutions in 2015-16 in order to control for gender differences in response. Available demographic data collected suggest those responding to the survey are representative of the Saint Mary's population as a whole in terms of race/ethnicity and class year.

Initial results of the survey were shared in April 2016 with the Presidential Task Force on Sexual Violence and the Saint Mary's College Board of Trustees. The results below provide for initial benchmarking for assessing and implementing improvements aimed at the ultimate goal of eliminating sexual violence impacting Saint Mary's students and students nationally.

Frequency of Sexual Assault and Unwanted Sexual Behaviors

- 9.5% of Saint Mary's respondents report being sexually assaulted since starting at Saint Mary's.
 - An additional 4.5% suspect they were assaulted but are unsure.
 - 12 percent of women respondents at participating HEDS institutions in 2015-16 report being sexually assaulted since starting at their institution. Rates for females at Association of American University institutions was 23% in its survey administration in 2014-15 (AAU, 2014).
- 11% of Saint Mary's respondents report an attempted sexual assault was made upon them with another 7% unsure but suspect that an attempt was made.
- More than half of Saint Mary's respondents have encountered unwanted sexual behaviors including verbal, non-verbal or brief unwanted contact.
- Nearly 6 in 10 of those assaulted report being assaulted more than once and a quarter of those assaulted report being assaulted three or more times.
- 27% of assault survivors report they were assaulted by more than one person, which is higher than females at other participating HEDS institutions (21%).

Location of Sexual Assault and Relationship to Person Committing Sexual Assault

- Of those sexually assaulted, more than 80% report the person committing the assault was a student from another institution and more than 80% also report the assault occurred off-campus at another college or at an apartment, bar, etc.
- Just over half of survivors report their assaulter was a nonromantic friend or acquaintance, 40% report it was a stranger.

Involvement of Alcohol and Ability to Give Consent

- Three-quarters of Saint Mary's respondents who are sexual assault survivors report the incident involved them consuming alcohol compared to 64% of women respondents at participating HEDS institutions while 79% of Saint Mary's survivors report the assaulter had been consuming alcohol.
- Nearly 60% of Saint Mary's sexual assault survivors report they were unable to give consent or are unsure if they gave consent due to incapacitation which exceeds the percentage who report the same nationally (46%).

Who do survivors tell about the sexual assault?

- Most sexual assault survivors report telling someone about the assault. Most commonly they confide in close friends or roommates.
- Saint Mary's sexual assault survivors report the incident less frequently to campus representatives or family members.
- Those that did not report that a sexual assault occurred indicate they did not because:
 - Felt they would be blamed
 - Wanted to forget what happened
 - Felt ashamed or embarrassed
- Only a small percentage of Saint Mary's students choose not to tell anyone of the assault.

Frequency of Use and Satisfaction with the College's Official Formal Reporting Process

- Very few survivors of sexual assault utilize the College's procedures for making a formal report about the sexual assault. Thirteen percent of Saint Mary's respondents who are survivors of sexual assault report following College procedures for making a formal report about the sexual assault. This may be due to the fact that most assaults are reported to have occurred off campus.
 - This compares similarly to women respondents nationally (14%).
- Satisfaction with the College's process for making a formal report and with the institution's response to the report is mixed among the few respondents who made a formal report.
- Among all respondents, while more than three-quarters believe Saint Mary's would take an official report of assault seriously and support the person making the report, there is less confidence that the College would take action against the offender.

Information and Education Received on Sexual Assault

- Saint Mary's respondents are significantly more likely to report having received education about sexual assault, resources, and reporting procedures and report they were more likely to retain the information received and found it more helpful than female respondents nationally.
- Fewer respondents nationally and at Saint Mary's report having received information about the College's procedures for investigating sexual assault.

Campus Climate, Safety and Supportive Environment

- Saint Mary's respondents report a positive and supportive general campus climate with support from faculty, staff and administrators.
- Nine in ten Saint Mary's respondents agree that their fellow students are concerned about one another's welfare compared to just over 70% of female respondents nationally.
- Ninety-four percent of Saint Mary's respondents agree they feel safe on campus compared to 77% of women respondents nationally.
- However, nearly half of Saint Mary's respondents report feeling at risk for either themselves or friends being sexually assaulted on or near campus or at an off-campus event or program connected with Saint Mary's.


- Overall, more than 80% of Saint Mary's respondents agree that faculty/staff/administrators respect what students think, are concerned about students' welfare and treat students fairly.
 - These percentages of agreement exceed that of other women respondents nationally.
- Ninety-two percent of Saint Mary's respondents agree they feel valued in a classroom/learning environment and 84% agree they feel like a part of the Saint Mary's community.
- Saint Mary's respondents are more likely than women nationally to feel safe on their institution's campus (94% agree they feel safe on this campus compared to 77% nationally).

• Ninety-three percent of Saint Mary's respondents agree faculty contribute to a positive and supportive campus climate. Likewise, 89% report the same about staff, 86% about students and 78% about administration.

• These percentages of agreement are significantly higher than reported by women respondents nationally.

- Seventy-three percent of Saint Mary's respondents agree that campus officials do a good job protecting students from harm compared to 66% of women nationally.
- Sixty percent of Saint Mary's respondents agree that if a crisis happened here, they are confident campus officials would handle it well compared to 54% of women at HEDS institutions nationally. Fourteen percent of Saint Mary's respondents disagree compared to 20% of women at participating HEDS institutions.
- Fifty-seven percent of Saint Mary's respondents agree that campus officials respond quickly in difficult situations while 13% disagreed.
- When it comes to campus officials handling incidents in a fair and responsible manner, 59% of Saint Mary's respondents agree campus officials respond fairly and responsibly compared to 54% of women nationally who say the same of their institutions.
- Eight in ten Saint Mary's respondents agree that there is a good support system at Saint Mary's for students going through difficult times. This significantly exceeds the percentage of women agreeing nationally (63%).



- Saint Mary's respondents are less likely to agree that the number of sexual assaults that occur on campus, off campus at an event/program connected to Saint Mary's or off campus near campus is low. 42% of Saint Mary's respondents disagreed that the number of assaults is low compared to 30% of women at HEDS institutions nationally.
- Likewise, Saint Mary's students feel more at risk for being sexually assaulted on campus, off-campus at a SMC connected event or at a party/social even near campus. Nearly half of Saint Mary's respondents disagree that they do not feel at risk for being assaulted on or near campus compared to 44% of women at similar institutions.
- Saint Mary's students believe that a strong support system exists among the student body as nearly 80% agree that they believe students at Saint Mary's would intervene if they witnessed a sexual assault. This compares to just 55% of women nationally who report the same of fellow students at their institutions.

- More than 75% of Saint Mary's respondents agree that campus officials would take a report of sexual assault seriously, would support and protect the person making the report and would conduct a careful investigation.
- Less agreement at both Saint Mary's and nationally exists that campus officials would take action against the offender(s) as 53% of Saint Mary's respondents and 57% of women at HEDS institutions agree. Nearly a fifth of Saint Mary's respondents disagree that campus officials would take action against the offender(s) and 28% are unsure.
- Great confidence exists among students that their fellow students would support the person making the report as 79% agree compared to 65% of women nationally.





• 97% of Saint Mary's respondents report they received information on what sexual assault is and how to recognize it compared to 79% of women at other HEDS institutions.

- 88% reported receiving information on how to report an incident of sexual assault and 92% report they received information on confidential resources for sexual assault and how to locate them on campus at Saint Mary's. These rates exceed that of women elsewhere with approximately 60% of women nationally reporting they received such information.
- Fewer students, 61%, report they received information on the procedures for investigating sexual assault compared to 36% of women nationally.
- 93% of Saint Mary's respondents report they received information from Saint Mary's on actions they can take to help prevent sexual assault compared to 73% of women nationally.

• The majority of Saint Mary's respondents report they retain the information they receive about sexual assault as 81% report they remember almost all, all or most of the information they received about sexual assault compared to 61% at other HEDS institutions.

• Saint Mary's respondents found the information they received about sexual assault to be helpful as 81% report it was helpful or very helpful compared to 66% of females nationally.

- 59% of Saint Mary's respondents report they have experienced unwanted sexual contact in the form of verbal behaviors since starting at Saint Mary's at least rarely. This rate is similar to female respondents nationally (64%).
- 28% of Saint Mary's students report they have received unwanted nonverbal behaviors (unwanted sexual texts, email, social media posts, lewd gestures, etc.) since starting at Saint Mary's at least rarely. Again, the rate is similar to female respondents nationally (32%).
- Unwanted brief physical contact (such as someone briefly groping, rubbing sexually against someone, pinching, or other brief inappropriate/unwelcome touching of the body) was experienced by 49% of Saint Mary's respondents at least rarely compared to 45% of women respondents nationally.

- For those in table 9 who have experienced unwanted sexual contact at least rarely, 90% of those students report it, a student from another institution was at least one of those responsible. A third also report a person(s) from the local community was also at least one of those responsible.
- This differs from women respondents nationally at mostly co-educational institutions where the majority of responsible parties come from the student's institution.

Sexual Assault Definition (as presented in the survey) and Rates

The following questions focus on sexual assault experiences. Sexual assault is defined in the survey as referring to five specific types of sexual contact, which respondents **did not want** or for which **they did not give consent**.

• Touching of a sexual nature (kissing you, touching of private parts, grabbing, fondling, rubbing up against you in a sexual way, even if it was over your clothes)

- Oral sex (someone's mouth or tongue making contact with your genitals, or your mouth or tongue making contact with someone else's genitals)
- Vaginal sex (someone's penis being put in your vagina, or your penis being put into someone else's vagina)
- Anal sex (someone's penis being put in your anus, or your penis being put into someone else's anus)

• Anal or vaginal penetration with a body part other than a penis or tongue, or by an object, like a bottle or candle

Additionally, the survey asks respondents to consider only the following locations of assault: (a) on campus; (b) off campus at an event or program connected with Saint Mary's, including study abroad and internships; or (c) at a social activity or party near campus such as at an apartment, restaurant, or bar?

- Eleven percent of Saint Mary's respondents report that since starting at Saint Mary's, an unsuccessful attempt at sexual assault was made upon them. An additional 7% are unsure.
 - These figures compare similarly to women respondents nationally.
- When asked to identify the responsible part of the attempts, 93% report at least one of those attempting was a student from another institution and 28% report at least one was a person or people from the local community.





- Alcohol was involved in three-quarters of all incidents of sexual assault with Saint Mary's respondents more frequently reporting the incident involved them drinking alcohol.
- About 12% Saint Mary's respondents who indicated they were sexually assaulted report the assault incident involved them voluntarily taking or using drugs. While 6% of Saint Mary's assault survivors report the assault incident involved them being given a drug without their knowledge or consent, nearly a fifth reported they were unsure of they had been given a drug without their knowledge or consent.


