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

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

If These Halls Could Talk.



Living in the dorms of any college is an iconic experience. For most students, it's the first time they have left the comforts of home, which brings a whole new level of independence. And while each will go on to have robust lives far beyond their first experiences at college, the impact of living on campus, the friendships and memories that are formed, often last a lifetime.

For years, we have heard tales of Saint Mary's alumnae and what they best remember about their college experience; memories surface of their time living in Le Mans, Holy Cross, McCandless, Regina, or Opus halls. So we thought we'd ask you all, what are your favorite memories of living on campus? And if these halls could talk, what would they say? Over 120 of you reached out to share stories and here's what you told us ...

Your Most Memorable Moments

'Twas the Night Before Christmas Break

An overwhelming 30 percent of you told us your favorite memory of living in the halls was the night before winter break; you shared tales of the festivities that were traditional for the season. Responses, from the Class of 1958 to the Class of 1984, shared with us how special the season was made by candlelight caroling, the family-style Christmas dinner hosted by the juniors, and the Notre Dame Glee Club singing in the halls.

"I still think of the parade of stuffed animals in Holy Cross the night before we left for Christmas vacation. I also loved the holly and tinsel head pieces we wore for the very elegant Christmas dinner of duck and baked Alaska. I loved having a nun at each table for all of our dinners, and the intelligent conversation she often led with us."

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"Here Come the Irish"

It was a very different time when panty raids were a traditional college experience and Saint Mary's certainly was not excluded from this bit of Americana. While not quite as wholesome as apple pie at the time, the giddiness experienced by women, men, and the occasional sister perhaps reached a peak at the annual tradition often scheduled the Wednesday night before the first home football game. Imagine (or perhaps remember) the rumble traveling from Notre Dame to Saint Mary's as hundreds of men made their way from across the street. Women, ranging from confused to excited, would toss their panties out the windows and doors to eager students from Notre Dame.

"Freshman year in Holy Cross Hall, I was only there five weeks when a low drone was heard outside. My roommate and I had no idea what it was until a Holy Cross sister came into the room shouting 'throw your panties out the windows, throw your panties out the windows." We rushed to the windows and saw about 300 Notre Dame students below trying to get into the dorm. At first, I was not going to throw out my brand new lingerie. [But] when two ND students arrived on our floor, I threw out of our door a pretty pink pair and one of the students grabbed them and disappeared as fast as he had arrived. In half an hour, it was all over and we returned to our studies. Phew. That was my first and memorable experience of a ND panty raid."

While current students can relate to quiet hours, the thoughts of "lights out" and hallways being patrolled by nuns is part of a distant past that probably seems incomprehensible by today's standards. But that was the case for so many of you as you shared late nights of studying that occurred in your closets of all places!

When we were freshmen the lights had to be off by 10:30 p.m. We still had electricity so we hid in the closet to study. We had glass windows in our doors so we were always afraid some nun would catch us. (The ND students had all their electricity turned off except in the bathrooms.)"

Phones in the Hall, in the Rooms, and Back in the Hall

The luxury of phones has certainly progressed over the decades. Ironically, the students of today barely "talk" on the phones that now fit easily into their pockets — instead they rely on social media and text threads to communicate. But there was a time in which budding romances, family bonds, and the delivery of important information all took place on a single telephone that sat at the end of the hall. What a time it was when phones were installed in each room. The amount of access and privacy must have been liberating! Ironically, you again took to the hallways with long phone cords for privacy.

"In our freshman year, there were (if I remember correctly) seven of us named Mary Ellen. I don't know how it is now, but back then, the phones were in the hall, and when someone answered and called out for Mary Ellen, many heads popped out for the call."


Friendships That Last Forever

Evolution of Academics

"The education given at Saint Mary's is of the most practical and comprehensive character. It is intended to train the heart as well as the mind, to form women who will not only grace society with their accomplishments but honor and edify it by their virtues ... The course of studies is as extensive and thorough as long experience in teaching and a creditable staff of teachers can make it."

Mother Pauline's words ring true today. Saint Mary's women, over the course of their four years, leave with a better sense of who they are and how they want to contribute to the world. An education rooted in the liberal arts tradition has benefitted women for 175 years. It is through the classroom rigor, service in the community, prayer, and friendships that they become more assured women, ready to take on the world's needs, prepared for a diverse and ever-changing workforce.


A commitment to educating women is at the core of Saint Mary's, by offering students opportunities in an empowering environment where they can grow and gain confidence. That's why when faced with the decision to merge or not merge with the University of Notre Dame in 1971, Saint Mary's decided to remain independent. The following year Title IX was passed in the United States and served as a reminder that women were still not recognized as equal. And although Saint Mary's had been educating women for 128 years at that point, they still faced discrimination in our nation and were not offered opportunities that men were. The College's mission of educating women to make a difference in the world was wholly relevant then, and still is today.

Today we still see women facing discrimination and injustice, and although it may manifest differently than in 1860 or 1970, the College has adapted and responded to the needs of women over time. Initially students could major in home economics and philosophy, and now the College has just added neuroscience, a course of study with three concentrations: neurobiology, neuropsychology, and cognitive neuroscience.

Taking an interdisciplinary and applied approach, College leaders have always sought to raise women's voices and help them develop the confidence through coursework and research to take on any problem. It's why the College established a nursing program that emphasizes the whole patient, taught some of the first undergraduate courses in theology, implemented graduate programs when they saw a need, and continually brings on exceptional faculty to nurture students on their journey.

In 1899, the College hired the first physical education instructor, a nod to emphasis on teaching the whole student — mind, body, and spirit. And, at the beginning of the twentieth century, Saint Mary's was officially recognized by the State of Indiana as a baccalaureate degree-granting institution.

In 1904, the College developed a degree program in pharmacy. And six years later, Mary Callahan, director of athletics, started a class in auto mechanics using the Studebaker chassis as the guinea pig. She took a crash course at the Studebaker plant, and a chassis was donated by Studebaker president A.R. Erskine. Instruction was given by Miss Callahan and John Seibert, the College chauffeur. In addition to theoretical instruction, driving lessons were also available.

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
The pharmacy program ended in 1930 as demand waned when other schools opened similar programs for women. But a new program was introduced and reigned for nearly 25 years, a freshman course in the Trivium, a combination of rhetoric, logic, and grammar. Sister Miriam Joseph Rauh, CSC established the course in 1935, and developed a text combining into one course in the three arts from an interdisciplinary approach. Alumnae say that whatever else they have forgotten of their education, they will never forget the Trivium.

That same year the Trivium course was launched, Saint Mary's became one of the first colleges in the country and the first in Indiana to establish a baccalaureate degree program in nursing. Initially a five-year program, it was directed by Sister Maria Amadeo, CSC, and remains one of the College's most in-demand four-year programs today.

Continuing to pioneer education for women, in 1943 Saint Mary's College established the first program in the United States to confer graduate degrees for women in theology. Under the leadership of Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, CSC, Saint Mary's was the only institution — for more than a decade — to offer this opportunity to women religious and laypeople. Some of the first female theologians in the US were educated at Saint Mary's. As the graduate school was growing, in 1946 Saint Mary's also became the first women's college in the US to offer theology as a regular undergraduate major.

Less than a decade later, legendary Bruno Schlesinger established the Christian Culture Program, which is now the Department of Humanistic Studies. Combining multiple topics such as history,





literature, art, philosophy, and religion into one major allowed students to embrace the rich and complex ways in which all disciplines overlap and influence each other.

Another graduate program began in 1965 for a co-ed master's in education. That same year a co-exchange program was established with Notre Dame, which allowed students to take classes across the street and vice versa. Although the education graduate program was phased out a couple years later, men from Notre Dame can and still do take undergraduate classes at Saint Mary's in the education department.

Encouraging a global mindset and education, it was in 1970 that the College opened a campus in the center of historic Rome. To expand student's learning outside of the classroom, this memorable, life-changing experience is still one of the most popular study abroad programs. Business administration and psychology were also added to the College's academic offerings in 1970.

In 1991 the College began awarding Student Independent Study and Research (SISTAR) grants to support student-faculty collaboration and original research. The early teams looked at tourism in Hawaii, the neuropsychology of driving ability, original drawings of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, and Sister Madeleva's legacy, which resulted in Gail Mandell's *Madeleva: A Biography*. As the College celebrated 150 years in 1994, the Center for Academic Innovation (CFAI) was endowed to nourish the intellectual life of Saint Mary's by providing faculty development and student enrichment programs.

Although Saint Mary's and its faculty are ahead of the curve with their academic offerings, students have always been encouraged to chart their own course. In 1993 the student-designed major was formalized, which allowed students to cross disciplinary lines and combine courses in a variety of subjects.

As the academic landscape changed and advanced degrees are required for many professions, Saint Mary's launched three graduate programs open to both women and men in 2015: doctor of nursing practice, master of science in data science, and master of science in speech language pathology. Expanding those offerings in the 175th year, Saint Mary's added a master of autism studies program, the first of its kind that involves an interdisciplinary approach.

It is through the commitment to students and through listening to their passions and interests that curriculum has been developed With our faculty as experts in their fields, they forecast new areas of study and seek student input. One example is the Five-Year Dual Degree in Engineering Program with Notre Dame, which

for more than ten years has offered students the opportunity to become a well-rounded engineer with a liberal arts background.


Continuing to chart the needs and interests of students in the coming years will be incredibly important, as the number of high school students is falling from 15.4 million students in 2022 to 14.3 million students in 2028. The College has always been good at responding to the needs of the world by asking where are women needed and how do we educate them to take on those complex problems and needs? The College continues to adapt by offering remote learning graduate programs and combined accelerated degree programs to become more widely accessible. Although Saint Mary's will remain a residential, undergraduate women's college, these offerings, which include graduate programs for both women and men, help to further the mission. Looking forward, the words of Mother Pauline root us and guide us to "train the heart as well as the mind" for many years to come.



Timeline: 175 Years

It's interesting to watch the changes of a tree in a landscape. Over time, it grows to provide shade or matures to yield fruit — each year ticked off by the changes that occur with the passing of seasons. If a tree is felled, we see that the growth rings mark the time passed and tell the tree's own story. Some rings will show years of solid growth, indicated by thick bands of color while others indicate trauma or drought. Still they pile on, like the minute hand on a clock, consistently tracking history.

We don't often think about time as it exists long before us and well after. But the trees mark each passing year on the campus of Saint Mary's and quietly watch the College grow. Small trees planted in 1856 tower above students today and line The Avenue that leads them home. The development of buildings, introduction of academic programs, and advancements in research also track the passage of time. As we take a look at the history of Saint Mary's and examine the "rings" — we see that the College has matured and yielded the tremendous fruits of labor that had such humble beginnings.

Commissioners That Will Endure

ne hundred and seventy-five years ... It's impossible to look back on such a grand anniversary without asking "What's next?" And I couldn't think of anyone better to discuss this question with than Interim President Nancy Nekvasil. For 35 years, "Dr. N" has shared her infectious passion for Saint Mary's College. But it's her understanding of our future that is perhaps the

understanding of our future that is perhaps the most inspiring of all.

"You don't get to be 175 years old without remaining relevant," she opened, "and that is what we must continue to do for the next 175 years." She immediately clarified that adapting to the times doesn't mean you change who you are. Instead, it's the ability to remain true to our roots and core values that keeps the College on course.

In the late 1800s, it wasn't easy for a woman to receive a college education. While today that is not entirely the same, we can't deny that men still dominate many fields, especially in math and science. Yet all this time, we have been educating women in uncommon topics and providing opportunities for them to enter fields of study that otherwise wouldn't be available. As part of this mission, the Sisters of the Holy Cross always made sure new technologies, inspiring artists, and compassionate leaders were readily available to Saint Mary's students, and it's the same today.

"The National Literary Festival we held this fall is a perfect example of providing our students with access — access to experience, to voices, and to leaders in their fields." Nekvasil explained that the inspiration to host the festival came from words of Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, CSC, and her understanding that we always need to broaden our awareness and cultivate the mind with voices from the larger world of thinkers. "This vision and this drive lives in Saint Mary's today and must continue to be a part of our future."

Saint Mary's will always remain a Catholic college providing a strong, liberal arts education to undergraduate women. As a writer for the College, I spend a lot of time thinking about that identity and I believe it is our Catholic heritage that makes us so strong. I've always appreciated Moreau's guiding principle that "the mind will not be cultivated at the expense of the heart" and you don't have to spend much time with Interim President Nekvasil to know that she understands this vision and has inculcated it into her three and a half-decade tenure.

"The way we educate the mind over time will change, but what will stay the same is that we educate the whole student," Nekvasil discusses. "We have to nurture all aspects of our students — mind, body, and spirit — at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. This is how you develop prepared, faith-filled graduates who fully

discover their place in the world."

Our conversation continues on the importance of Catholic Intellectual Tradition and Catholic Social Teachings and how they are so beautifully woven into the tapestry of Saint Mary's undergraduate and graduate programs. These principles will always be timeless — to us and the world — and by following them, the College, too, shall remain relevant.

"Saint Mary's future is very bright. There has never been a better time to be an institution that educates undergraduate women and graduate women and men, helps them discover their voices, and then stands beside them as they go out and into the world. It was important 175 years ago and will never lose its importance." Nekvasil is incredibly passionate about our faculty and talks about the unique strengths they bring to the College and share with their students. She lights up as she talks about the students, and how mature and thoughtful they are. And then peaks as she shares the personal encounters she has had this past year with the alumnae she has visited. "They're all amazing — faculty, students, alumnae — they really are incredible," she shares.

Our conversation closes as Interim President Nekvasil pauses to share her final thoughts. "We remain strong because we're true to our Catholic roots, and we remain relevant as we investigate and adapt to the world around us. Saint Mary's will be here for another 175 years and so many more because we understand that is our nature, that is our calling."



Giving totals are for the period June 1, 2017 - May 31, 2018, which corresponds to Saint Mary's fiscal year. Total gifts and pledges from the Class of '68 were \$385,331. This includes gifts and pledges to the Class of '68 Endowed Scholarship, the Saint Mary's Fund, and other areas of the College as restricted by the donor. (The highest class gift/pledge award was won by the Class of '78 with total gifts and pledges of \$430,620.)

Our class participation was 53%. The Class of '68 won the highest class participation award. Exceeding 50% is a significant accomplishment and one that doesn't happen very often. Participation was based on a count of 299 active records for our class and a total of 157 who made a gift and/or pledge.

The Reunion goal for the Class of '68 was the establishment of the Class of '68 Endowed Scholarship. The scholarship was established with an initial contribution from the class of \$173,119. This was announced at the class dinner on Friday at Reunion. The current principal in the scholarship as of June 11, 2019 is \$206,940. This is a result of pledge payments during the past year and additional gifts restricted to the scholarship. As of March 31, 2019, the market value of the fund was \$221,428. The first scholarship award will be effective for the 2020-2021 academic year.


"My SMC senior year housemate, great friend, and fellow art major Jane McCormick Carney and I

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Event Highlights



Kickoff Celebration

On January 20, 2019 — the feast day of Blessed Basil Moreau, founder of the Congregation of the Holy Cross — the College hosted Saint Mary's Serves, a community-wide service project to kickoff the year-long celebration. The College's core values (learning, community, faith/spirituality, and justice) encourages students to take what they've learned and use it to serve their communities. To honor those values, Saint Mary's students, faculty, and staff paired up with local organizations such as La Casa de Amistad and St. Margaret's House to serve the South Bend community. After the service blitz, the kickoff celebration continued with an Opening Liturgy in the Church of Our Lady of Loretto and the Moreau Dinner in the Noble Family Dining Hall, both of which honored Blessed Basil Anthony Moreau.

Belles Weekend and Women's Choir Concert at Carnegie Hall

In 1843, the Sisters departed Le Havre, France and made the pilgrimage to America by means of a ship called the Rhone which sailed across the Atlantic Ocean. In order to commemorate their arrival in New York on July 16, 1843, many Belles, both current and former, took on the Big Apple as part of a Belles Weekend in New York City that included tours of NBC Studios and the 9/11 Memorial and Museum. The weekend culminated in a special Marian-themed performance by the Saint Mary's Women's Choir at Carnegie Hall. Member of the choir, Mary Trainor '20, knows it's a night she'll forever remember: "Music is something that really brings us together and being a Belle is something I will never forget."

Women of the Church Conference

In 1943, Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, CSC opened the Graduate School of Sacred Theology — the first of its kind for laypeople and women religious. This history made Saint Mary's the perfect place to host the Women of the Church Conference on campus in October 2019. Emily Sipos-Butler, associate director of the Center for Spirituality, said more than 150 "women and men from around the country and Europe gathered to explore the diverse work of Catholic women in the church and the world." The conference featured three days of breakout sessions, keynote addresses, and conversation about women's leadership in the Catholic Church. It was timely, as the spirit of the Women of the Church Conference reflects the overarching mission of the College: "It was a unique gathering of people with a diverse range of experiences and views of the church, all of whom were invited to listen and learn, to share and connect, and to look honestly at the current situation precisely what the College encourages in its students."

Discover Saint Mary's: A Walk in Time

Participants embarked on a pilgrimage across the historical campus on September 22, 2019 to explore the history and heritage of Saint Mary's College. Participants were commissioned as pilgrims at the Church of Our Lady of Loretto and braced the rain that showered over campus journeying to experience the imprint of the Sisters of the Holy Cross and other members of the Congregation who were influential in the conception of Saint Mary's College. Pilgrims congregated at the end of the day in the Noble Family Dining Hall for a Frenchinspired Blessed Basil Moreau Dinner.

National Literary Festival

On November 8 and 9, Saint Mary's campus was filled with celebrated novelists, poets, and screenwriters during the first Saint Mary's College National Literary Festival. The festival was hosted by alumna and *New York Times* best-selling author **Adriana Trigiani '81**, who "engaged all ten authors in substantive and entertaining public conversation at the Saturday luncheon event," said Laura Haigwood, chair of the English department. The two-day event allowed students from both Saint Mary's and Notre Dame to engage each author in discussion about their lives and their writing processes. On Friday, students and faculty were able to meet with their authors over a special dinner in the Noble Family Dining Hall while Saturday's events featured a lunch followed by author interviews and book signings in the afternoon.

Lessons and Carols

The celebration of 175 years of Saint Mary's College culminated with an event which celebrated the past, enjoyed the present, and looked forward to the future. Campus Ministry and the Department of Music presented Lessons and Carols: Looking Forward, an annual service of music, scripture, and candlelight celebrated in the Church of Our Lady of Loretto on December 15th, 2019. The Advent tradition has been celebrated by the Saint Mary's College, Sisters of the Holy Cross, and South Bend community for over forty years — an appropriate wrap-up of the College's celebration of 175 years. Traditional Advent hymns were paired with seven lessons adapted from scripture and the Women's Choir also performed Andrea Ramsey's "The Dark is Shattered" — a special musical piece commissioned this year and based on a poem by Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, CSC titled "New Things and Old, Christmas, 1941." The carols and lessons were followed by a candlelight service which brought community members together under one light and served as a reminder of the beauty which comprises Saint Mary's history, present, and future.



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
