UPON REFLECTION

As I look at this issue of Courier, I am struck by the overwhelming number of happy photographs from our two commencements and two reunions. Members of the Class of 2022 are captured enjoying all the expected pomp and circumstance connected to their Commencement. And graduates from the Class of 2020 wear irrepressible smiles as they participate in pre-Commencement rituals, don their caps and gowns, and take the long-awaited ceremonial march that COVID-19 denied them two years ago. "It was a commemoration and a reunion all in one," Elyse Paul '20 writes in her article on pp. 6-7: "Over the course of the weekend, we finally filled the gap in the Le Mans tunnel with our handprints, we opened our circle, we took our 'final' walk down The Avenue, and we personally thanked our beloved faculty and staff for all they had done for us."

Reunion participants look equally joyful, whether laughing in small groups, reminiscing in circles around the fire pits in the Le Mans backyard, enjoying shared picnic tables under the big tent, or raising a celebratory glass at the banquet. It was, if you'll allow me a pun, an occasion of "many happy returns!"

Indeed, the pictures and the words that fill several pages in this issue remind me of what truly endures from a college education. Yes, there is the deep learning and the preparation for work or for further study. But I have also been reflecting on something I heard journalist and higher education author Jeff Selingo say in a podcast I listened to recently: "We're in graduation season, of course, when students leave college. And we know that years later, what they're going to be talking about is relationships, whether those are faculty, staff, coaches, peers. Those relationships that made a difference in their lives. Meeting people in college, developing those deep relationships, is so critical to success both in college and after college. We have volumes of academic research on that."

Those relationships are what bind our graduates—brand new, recent-ish, silver, golden, and more than golden—to this College. They distinguish us from other institutions. I have received many messages from 2020 graduates (and their families) thanking the College for bringing them back for closure *together*. I have talked with numerous Reunion alumnae who returned to campus to spend time with friend groups that have grown only closer over the years and the decades with faculty and staff who animated their college experience. Even those returning for their 50th, 60th, and—yes—70th reunions, who saw almost none of the faculty and staff they knew at Saint Mary's, marveled at how those working at the College today bring the same commitment, care, and love of learning to their work as those here in earlier times. The spirit of even those long-ago relationships lives on.

While I am proud that we are a place that builds these relationships, I think we can be even more deliberate about this crucial aspect of college success. Students who see their parents and grandparents maintain college bonds over time absorb the expectation that they will go to college and create the same kinds of relationships. But over a quarter of our students come to Saint Mary's as the first in their families to attend college. As Jeff Selingo noted in his podcast, at most institutions "too many students are really spectators to the experience." If we want to guarantee that every one of our graduates will leave with sustaining relationships, we need to bolster our intentional approach to ensuring that they are full participants in "belonging." Every student who chooses to come to Saint Mary's belongs here. We want to be able to say to every graduate on Commencement Day and at Reunion Weekend: "We know you."

A Legacy of Leadership

Emily Spore Chase '04, Ph.D., RN always knew what she wanted to be when she grew up—

and how to get there. In second grade, she dressed up for career day in her grandmother's nursing uniform. In fourth grade, she wrote to the Saint Mary's admission team describing the College as the only place for her. And in May 2004, she made her dreams a reality when she graduated from Saint Mary's College at the top of her nursing class.

While Emily knew what she wanted at a young age, and understood that Saint Mary's was part of her plan, her mother Mary Beth Roitz Spore '79, Ph.D., saw Saint Mary's campus for the first time when she arrived for college in August 1975. While she was lonely and found the transition challenging, Mary Beth soon embraced her new home, making life-long friends and realized Saint Mary's was the best decision she's never made. It was years later when Mary Beth and her husband, Joseph, drove through Saint Mary's on vacation from Pennsylvania and young Emily, in fourth grade at the time, listened to her mother's stories detailing the independence and confidence she gained from her time on campus. It was then that Emily made up her mind to make Saint Mary's her college home.

Emily's family legacy is a representation of Saint Mary's alumnae: strong, resilient, and empowered. And while there are many tales of multi-generational Saint Mary's women doing good in the world, the Spore family gives us a glimpse into one of them.

"It wasn't so much that I wanted to follow my mom's exact footsteps, but that I saw how confident she was in a room full of men. She was a leader in her field, and that's what I was drawn to," said Emily.

Mary Beth graduated with a bachelor's degree in English and then went on to earn her doctorate in English literature, and began a 35-year career in academia. She was a professor and later a dean, noting that it wasn't always easy to be the only female in a male-dominated field. "At Saint Mary's, you see women presidents, women in positions of authority and responsibility. So I was equipped (by watching their pioneering examples) to respond effectively when I entered the real world and was getting pushback from male colleagues."

While Mary Beth leads in the world of higher education, Emily directed her skills toward the healthcare field, just as she'd always wanted. Graduating with a nursing degree from Saint Mary's, she continued her education at the University of Illinois Chicago, earning her doctorate degree in 2012. Currently, Emily is the chief nursing officer and senior vice president of Patient Care Services at The University of Chicago Medicine in Chicago. Three thousand five hundred nurses report to her as one of the senior leaders at the medical center. Breaking down barriers, Emily is the only

nurse, one of four women, and one of two LGBTQ+ members on the leadership team—a true role model for her own daughter, Meghan Chase, a current Saint Mary's student, Class of 2025.

Just as her mom watched her grandmother excel, Meghan has grown up with a bird's eye view of Emily doing the same. Having just finished her first year at Saint Mary's, Meghan said being able to watch Emily at the hospitals and having the experiences of visiting the NICU with her has inspired her to become a nurse herself. "I never felt forced to be a nurse; I want to be a nurse. And I think it's important in our family to carry that on," Meghan said.

One academic advantage Meghan has over her mother is the College's new Center for Integrated Healthcare Education (CIHE). Because Emily identifies herself as a "nurse first and an administrator second," her excitement about the CIHE expansion of the nursing program in Regina Hall is obvious. "This really puts the Saint Mary's program on the map," she said. "There's evidence out there that simulation is best practice, and for students to be able to have this facility, we are going to see the best nurses coming out of Saint Mary's."

With a \$1 million grant from Lilly Endowment in 2020, the CIHE opened phase one of the three-phase project in the fall of 2021. The first floor and lower level of Regina Hall have been transformed and now contain an impressive 80-seat lecture hall, five simulation labs, three acute care rooms, birthing room, pediatric room, brand new high-tech medical mannequins, and more. At a time where nurses are so needed in the workforce, Saint Mary's is able to expand its nursing enrollment by more than 30% because of the center's expansion.

Throughout the next two phases, all health science and behavioral programs will be housed in Regina Hall, creating a space to mirror a real-life medical center.

The nursing sciences program has a substantial reputation for being the best of

the best, with many accolades to show for it. Recently, Saint Mary's was named one of the top four nursing schools in Indianaand the top ranked private nursing school in the state according to Nursing Schools Almanac. In 2021, U.S. News and World Report ranked it in the top 26% of private and public undergraduate nursing programs in the nation.

Additionally, as a response to the nursing shortage in the country, Saint Mary's is offering a direct-entry Master of Science in Nursing (MSN), making the College



As a leader herself in the nursing world, Emily has seen the best of the best when it comes to healthcare facilities. When walking through the CIHE, she couldn't help but compare the Center to where she works on a daily basis. "We do simulations at my work for nurses and physicians, and it's critically important," she said. "I've always thought Saint Mary's has the best nursing program in the country—I go out and say it all the time—but the ability to have this kind of facility sets it even



the first in the state to offer this degree in a direct-entry format. Beginning in fall 2022, the MSN program is designed to be completed in two full years. Upon passing their licensure exams, graduates of the program will begin their careers with an RN-MSN.

While Emily and Meghan swapped stories about their shared experiences as nursing students at Saint Mary's, Emily emphasized the importance of giving back in order for the next generation to have facilities similar to the CIHE. "We need institutions like Saint Mary's that can educate women and build independent thinkers and leaders of the future," said Emily.

Emily's Saint Mary's legacy doesn't just begin with her mother and end with her daughter, being a Belle—and a leader extends through the family tree. Emily's younger sister and Meghan's aunt, Bridget Spore Faulk '08, was a music major at Saint Mary's and founded the a capella group, Bellacappella. "While we all did very different things, it's still that essence of being a leader and being confident in your own field," said Emily.

Emily wants future generations to have the education and the experience that she had, that her sister had, and that her mom had, which is why she is motivated to support Saint Mary's through dedicated gifts to the nursing program and the Saint Mary's Fund. "It's for the current generation, which is Meg, and the future generations like my niece Sally. She is only 4 but we are already considering her a future Belle," she said. "We need institutions like Saint Mary's that educate women, build independent thinkers, leaders of the future, and strong voices at every table." †

Class of 2020 Celebrating Together by Elyse Paul '20 **A Personal Perspective**

As a 2020 graduate, reuniting with my best friends for the weekend's Commencement Celebration was surreal. For two years, after being abruptly separated in March 2020, we hoped for a traditional celebration with all the pomp and circumstance. On Saturday, May 28th 2022, my classmates and I made an extraordinary comeback to campus to celebrate our undergraduate accomplishments and to catch up on where we've been during the past couple of years. Our time together on campus again felt like stepping back in time to a chapter of our lives we hold so dearly in our hearts. It was a true gift to return home and properly commemorate our accomplishments.

Seared into my memory is that moment in March 2020 when we found out classes would transition to virtual instruction. I was shopping for a dress for Commencement Ball—one of the eagerly anticipated senior week events. We were told spring break would be extended by another week to give professors time to adapt to virtual instruction and that the College hoped to bring students back soon.

Many tears of uncertainty were shed during these early weeks while I desperately hoped I could return to my dorm room in Le Mans Hall. As the light of hope dimmed, our class mourned the loss of a "normal" senior week, Commencement ceremony, and a proper goodbye to everyone who had impacted us.

Despite the separation, we found ways to stay connected to our alma mater and found unexpected moments of joy even apart from each other. We acted as technology consultants for our professors. We sent mail to fellow students with encouraging words as we navigated a new way of life. When senior week arrived,

we celebrated virtually. My friends and I called each other on Facetime, cooked breakfast, and danced on top of couches in our living rooms blasting Beyonce's "Love On Top" for our own version of Late Night Breakfast. My mom, Deanne Isabelle Paul '90, Zoomed her classmates and other alumnae to toast my accomplishments for a unique twist on the alumnae Champagne Brunch. Other alumnae sent messages to remind us that our predicament would never undermine all we had accomplished at Saint Mary's. On the day of virtual Commencement, my friends and I called each other to cheer when our names were read.

Fast forward two years after that online ceremony, and remarkably more than half of the Class of 2020 returned to campus to celebrate together. Since May 2020, some of us have earned graduate degrees,

Saint Mary's commitment to tradition and community was displayed through all the efforts to bring us all back together. Those sentiments were wholeheartedly demonstrated as each member of the Class of 2020 crossed the stage as strong, resilient, patient, and deserving women. †

COMMENCEMENT 2022 A Call for Active Hope

On Saturday, May 14, 310 undergraduates and 50 graduate students claimed their degrees before family members and friends at the 2022 Saint Mary's Commencement.

Along with the main ceremony, graduates and their families celebrated with events throughout the week. Among the highlights was the 15th annual Multiethnic Graduation Celebration on May 12 that formally honored 40 graduates from diverse backgrounds; and the Commencement Mass on May 13 that brought graduates and families together in prayer in O'Laughlin Auditorium with Bishop Kevin C. Rhodes presiding.

During her Commencement address, Catholic theologian M. Shawn Copeland, Ph.D. implored graduates to bring hope to the world through their endeavors. After the past two years that have been rife with

upheaval, Copeland said spreading hope is necessary.

"Hope is sorely needed—not passive, acquiescent, equivocating wishing, but active, resilient, steadfast hope that acts to bring about good, that stands up for truth, that advocates and works for justice," she said. "Hope is not superficial, not simplistic, not naive. Do not confuse hope with optimism or with 'magical' thinking. Hope is difficult and complex, daring and demanding."

The event started and ended with rain, but the sunny weather during the ceremony was the ideal backdrop at Le Mans Green for a day of new beginnings with a focus on hope.

As the ceremony drew to a close, President Katie Conboy charged the Class of 2022 to "bear your vitalities to a world awaiting you!" "You can do this in small ways or large ones, in local or global contexts," she said. "Raise your voices—with civility and a spirit of dialogue—in any space that requires it. Create community in your personal and professional worlds. Lift up the marginalized and walk with those who need your solidarity. Embrace new challenges and opportunities. Keep stretching. Keep growing. Look more for questions than for answers," she urged the graduates.

If students learned only one thing while at Saint Mary's, Conboy said she hopes it is that the talents and skills that are uniquely theirs become their gifts to the world.

"When you give those gifts away generously, you will find that you somehow have more of them to give," she said.

Saint Mary's College Commits to Laudato Si' Action Platform

"We find hope and confidence in our community that we can respond to this need to care for that which God has made and loved."

Saint Mary's College is addressing the climate crisis with immediate action and a global, unified, faith-based plan. In partnership with the Sisters of the Holy Cross, the College has signed on to the Laudato Si' Action Platform and is part of its first cohort, among 30 colleges and universities in the United Statesincluding Loyola University Chicago and Georgetown University—as well as others around the world.

Named for Pope Francis' 2015 encyclical to address climate damage, Laudato Si' puts the pope's philosophy

of caring for our common home into practice. It also provides structure and a network of colleges and universities to work together for greater impact. It is a call that Saint Mary's is answering from a place of deep faith and hope for the future.

Over the course of seven years—the duration of the action platform— Saint Mary's College is prepared to take on environmental challenges that impact our campus and students. By creating a Laudato Si' taskforce, the College will create a plan that will

galvanize the entire community to achieve its goals.

The taskforce is aligned with the College's strategic plan, Revere and Revise, which calls on the Saint Mary's community to build on the sustainability work already accomplished and underway. Including environmental stewardship in the strategic plan is the College's acknowledgement of the global threat of climate change and the urgency to take action now.

Making the commitment was an unqualified yes, said Molly Gower, assistant professor of religious studies and theology and interim vice president for Mission.

"It's important that we do the hard work of learning what is real, even when it is scary," Gower said. "Saint Mary's is a place where our students learn and grow academically and spiritually. It takes honesty and courage to open our eyes to see what is real in the world. Things are broken and need repairing. We find hope and confidence in our community that we can respond to this need to care for that which God has made and loved."

It's Time for Urgency

This isn't a new commitment for the Saint Mary's community. In the 1990s the congregation and the College signed on to the United Nations' Earth Charter, which lays out ethical principles for building a just, sustainable, and peaceful society. The way the College and the Sisters respond to the needs of the earth and their community should also continue to change with the growing urgency of climate change, said Sister Veronique Wiedower '70, CSC, president of the Sisters of the Holy Cross.

"The timing is right to answer the Vatican's call-to-action, to share our experiences and learn from others globally," Wiedower said. "Together we can accomplish more."

There are seven specific goals within the overall Laudato Si' platform: response to the cry of the earth, response to the cry of the poor, ecological economics, adoption of sustainable lifestyles, ecological education, ecological spirituality, and community resilience and empowerment.

Chris Cobb, associate professor of English and environmental studies, and educational director of the Sustainable Farm, noted that signing on to the Laudato Si'Action Platform is a commitment that validates the significance of caring for our planet.

"We seek to transform our relationship with the earth to one that authentically acknowledges that earth is our common home, and the way that we care for earth is the way we care for all of creation," Cobb said.

The Action of Stewards

As the College makes this seven-year commitment, the first step is assessing the current environmental sustainability initiatives. For many years students, faculty, and staff have paid special attention to improving sustainability on campus. Some examples include the "free store," which diverts the endof-semester move-out waste, reducing single-use plastics, water bottles and

straws, hosting Food Justice Week, among other initiatives. Eliana Sanchez '22 worked with the Food Recovery Program during her first three years at Saint Mary's. She recruited student volunteers and worked with Campus Dining to take hot meals to the Center for the Homeless in downtown South Bend, altogether eliminating food waste from the dining hall.

Her experiences with food recovery and other campus initiatives inspired her to take on an additional major in environmental studies. "When I came to Saint Mary's, it was the first time I was exposed to how important it is to take care of the environment and the connection to my faith," Sanchez said. "As I learned more about the climate crisis and how it is connected to my faith, it became integral to how I practice my faith."

Sanchez, who served as the student trustee, is proud that the College has signed on to the Laudato Si' Action Platform. She took a tri-campus sustainability course, co-taught by Cobb and other instructors at the University of Notre Dame and Holy Cross College, where she became passionate about creating a more sustainable future.

"We need institutional-level actions and through taking that course I learned that Saint Mary's was already doing a lot," Sanchez said. "I'm excited that Saint Mary's will continue to grow in sustainability efforts to address the climate crisis."

In 2020, the College's Sustainable Farm began its first growing season. The farm provides experiential learning for Saint Mary's students, who use its soil to conduct research. Students in Cobb's conservation biology course were tasked with developing a plan for addressing an invasive species at the farm, Canadian

"She truly went above and beyond in this regard. It was nice to have Temple Grandin—an expert in this field—validate so much of what we are teaching our students."



International Instructors Share Their Cultures

The College hosted two Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistants (FLTA) in the 2021-2022 academic year. From Taiwan, Chih-Ting Lu taught Intro to Chinese, along with Mandarin Conversation and Reading. Hagar Hodeeb, visiting instructor from Egypt, taught Arabic.

College Receives Grant for First Gen Students

Saint Mary's received a \$1 million, five-year grant to ensure first-generation student success by joining the Kessler Scholars Collaborative. As part of the collaborative, the College will implement the Kessler Scholars model on campus. Additionally, Saint Mary's and partner institutions will share resources, evaluate best practices, and participate in collaborative-wide student engagement and networking opportunities. Between July 2022 and June 2027, Saint Mary's will devote at least 40% of the total grant, or \$400,000, to direct student aid. The first cohort of up to 20 Kessler Scholars will arrive on campus in fall 2023.

Saint Mary's College and the University of Notre Dame's Mendoza College of Business are collaborating on new accelerated bachelor's-to-master's degree programs. For Saint Mary's students who meet the criteria for entry, Notre Dame will guarantee advance admission to four of its master's programs. Students will be able to complete their graduate degree with one additional year of coursework or less. "These new offerings speak to the shared commitment of our two institutions to provide outstanding academic programming for our students," said President Katie Conboy. "At the same time, we are showing students how to maximize the investment in their education by earning a master's degree at an accelerated pace." The new dual-degree programs will

He had already been dealing with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma for five years, so it was unusual to have two different forms of lymphoma. His form of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, mycosis fungoides, cannot be cured, but can be controlled. However, the Hodgkin's lymphoma can be cured, so he had four months of chemo, ending in January 2022. The PET scan four weeks after his final chemo infusion found no signs of Hodgkin's lymphoma. He will continue follow-up appointments and periodic PET scans for several years to be sure that he does not have a relapse. He will also continue to be monitored to be sure that his non-Hodgkin's lymphoma is under control.

"We decided to try to make something good come from his chemotherapy, so we invited family and friends to send a dollar to enter a pool to pick the date that they thought Lennie would lose all of his hair, or select the option that he would not lose all of it. Half of the money collected would go to the winner(s) and half to Feed More, the Central Virginia Food Bank. Lennie's hair got very thin, but he didn't lose all of it, so there were several winners — and every winner asked that their winnings be added to the donation. Many people also sent additional money as a donation, so we donated almost \$600 to Feed More and others also made donations to food banks in Richmond, Harrisonburg, London, or other cities. We said that every hair that Lennie lost was helping battle food insecurity."

Some sad news to report: Mary Lee Carr Charles' husband Roger died February 17 while being transported to the hospital. His death was unexpected, but he had been undergoing workup appointments toward heart surgery.
