UPON REFLECTION

Each autumn, we wonder when the first leaf will turn: first one, then a few—and, overnight, a panorama of reds, yellows, and oranges! The campus canopy is constantly adapting. In my comings and goings along The Avenue, I note its enchanting display of the seasons, and I often imagine how our founders thought of this tree-lined Avenue as an example for our students. The word "resilience" feels appropriate: the trees bend (mostly) without breaking, and they experience change, rebirth, and loss every year.

When I joined the College in 2019, I noted that Sister Madeleva Wolff, a transformative past president, had also been attuned to the idea of resilience. At a time when the education of women was subversive in itself, she ensured that Saint Mary's would further cultivate women's resilience by combining a liberal arts education with exposure to technical fields and to advanced study. Because of these early steps, Saint Mary's today offers a comprehensive program portfolio: the liberal arts, yes, as well as professional programs such as Accounting, Engineering, Nursing Science, and Speech Language Pathology. A strong interdisciplinary foundation prepares all Saint Mary's graduates with the ability to flex with life's demands, to apply a critical mind to any field, and to adapt across the seasons of life.

As the beneficiary of a liberal arts education, I often struggle to answer questions about my own career path. How did a B.A. in Music go on to a Ph.D. in Neuroscience and a career in strategy and finance? The liberal arts are the secret sauce! Contrary to skill-based education, the liberal arts train students in the art of learning—ensuring the development of foundational skills that transfer across jobs and careers. Workforce research points to a real urgency for more such graduates: the skills most in demand by employers today are the educational strengths of Saint Mary's College, including critical thinking, research and evidence-based practice, problem-solving, and the ability to acquire new skills.

Saint Mary's has also developed expertise in institutional adaptation. We have emerged on this side of a pandemic stronger than where we began, with over 400 new undergraduate students this year and a growing balance sheet. Stability in our undergraduate core is augmented by growth in new programs that diversify our reach, including accelerated bachelor's-to-master's pathways, both at Saint Mary's and in partnership with the University of Notre Dame; new graduate programs in Nursing and Social Work; and a suite of new summer youth programs to be launched in the summer of 2023. These summer camps and pre-college offerings are being created with support from Lilly Endowment, and youth programs are key to our vision to serve girls and women across the lifecycle.

The Avenue's extravagant hues are soon replaced with bare branches that will, in turn, bud, leaf, and flower in time to celebrate our seniors as they move into their own next seasons. The liberal arts foundation offered by Saint Mary's promises a lifetime of opportunity for these graduates and the certainty of impact for the communities they serve.

Launching Generations of SMC Researchers

In her lab at University of Colorado Denver, **Mary Bevilacqua** '13 is facing a challenge. How can global-health engineering teams and industry personnel in low-resource environments effectively create biomedical devices to meet the specific needs of their communities? How can the available technology be adapted to work for them? The questions are not easy, but the answers are there—and Bevilacqua is poised to find them.

Bevilacqua has worked non-stop as a chemist and researcher since graduating from Saint Mary's. She was an analytical chemist, then earned her master's degree in tissue engineering from Johns Hopkins University. Now, as an instructor at CU Denver, Bevilacqua teaches bioengineering, introducing students to the world of regenerative medicine, device design, and prototyping. In the lab, her focus is more on the processes and methodology of device design as part of her doctoral research.

The focus is specific, her end-goal is well defined. And she credits her approach to research and her ability to connect with students back to her experience at Saint Mary's, particularly to chemistry researcher and mentor Professor Toni Barstis.

Barstis is a professor and Fulbright Global Scholar, as well as the Denise DeBartolo York Endowed Chair of Science. Until this term, Barstis was the director of both the STEM Division and the Engineering Program.

Now, after 30 years at the College, Barstis is retiring at the end of the academic year. "Her influence, her style of research, definitely made a permanent imprint on how I approach medical technology and design," Bevilacqua said. "I didn't know it at the time, but it has become the driving force for my research focus."

An accomplished researcher, Barstis is named as the inventor on two US patents held jointly by the College and Notre Dame for her work with Paper Analytical Devices (PADs). Bevilacqua, who was a double-major studying chemistry and art, was also credited as inventor on the second PADs patent—the first time this was achieved by a student at SMC.

At the time, Bevilacqua saw the blending of art and science as a natural expression of who she was. She couldn't imagine having to choose between the two, and the College encouraged her work in the lab and the studio.

Barstis was one of Bevilacqua's many professors who understood the value in this multidisciplinary education. She remembers well the need to fuel her own passions. When she arrived in 1993, Barstis had just earned her Ph.D. in physical chemistry from the University of Michigan. "Every day I asked myself if I belonged at that school, if I was smart enough. Imposter syndrome was part of my every day," she remembers. As a first-gen student, Barstis credits *her* college professors for showing her how much bigger the world

was. Then, when the SMC position teaching physical chemistry presented itself, "You couldn't have pulled at my heartstrings more. I wanted to show women that they can do this. I knew, I just *knew*, research could influence a student in a way that the classroom could not." She was moved by the variety of women at Saint Mary's, and saw the opportunity to influence the way students—especially first generation students—saw their place in the world, and the vast opportunities available to them.

Over the years, Barstis became a force of nature with her students and developed a reputation as a mentor—from guiding a group of research students in Nepal to helping them solve real-world problems in the Saint Mary's lab. Rather than focusing solely on her own projects with students as assistants, she encouraged her undergraduate students to pursue their own ideas. She has influenced generations of students who, like Bevilacqua, have become researchers and lovers of science. To Barstis's mind, no interdisciplinary barriers should exist if they prevent students from learning.

"People don't understand that one of the biggest influences of an all-women's college is that these students take ownership; they are leaders. Here they don't know the word *no*," Barstis said. "Sometimes they are shocked when they leave here and see boundaries that would limit them. But I have spent nearly 30 years trying to enable these students to do whatever the hell they want to do."

Her approach and influence has had a ripple effect, one that over time helped further refine all research at Saint Mary's.

"At Saint Mary's, there is a range of students in the research field. Toni understands this," said Don Paetkau, a 19-year professor of biology. "Some have a certain thing they want to do. Others want a lot more guidance. In the middle are students who are interested in an instructor's project and become passionate about it. Everywhere in this range is a way that Saint Mary's research can help." He said that right from the beginning, Barstis paved the way for this kind of customized research. Now, legions of alumnae are research professionals, blazing their own paths with the model they learned at Saint Mary's.

Mary Bevilacqua '13 is a bioengineering instructor at University of Colorado — Denver, and a Ph.D. candidate studying biomedical technology design. After graduating from SMC with dual degrees, Bevilacqua learned to blend her diverse interests in art, engineering, global health, and research into a purposeful vocation.

Kate McMahon '18, is a doctoral candidate at Colorado State University in Fort Collins. At Saint Mary's, she did much of her undergraduate research with Jennifer Fishovitz, professor of chemistry and physics. In her junior year, she became interested in research funding—an audacious focus for an undergrad. Rather than downplay her interests, members of the department of chemistry and physics helped champion her efforts. The result? McMahon, along with **Catherine Bruno '18**, founded SCORE—Student Committee on Research Expansion—as a way to bring more funding and access to student research at the College. Barstis served as an early supporter of the program, and liaison to the administration.

McMahon, a third-generation alumna, remembers how empowering that support was. By introducing STEM students to alumnae and other industry professionals, the College provided life-changing connections. "As a sophomore, I remember thinking it was so cool; the opportunities here are endless! At the professional development workshops, I remember seeing captains of industry, these alumnae who are leaders in their fields coming back to their humble little college and love being here—and enthusiastic about the next generation," McMahon said. "And Toni really helped facilitate that. If I had questions for someone I'd met, she'd immediately get an email and provide an introduction. If I had an idea, she would validate it. She always pushed us to ask the next question. At Saint Mary's, you really get to be original as an undergraduate."

For several years Patrick Flynn, professor of computer science and engineering at Notre Dame, worked closely with Barstis and their colleague Marya Lieberman, professor of analytical chemistry at Notre Dame, together inventing the original PADs. Flynn describes Barstis's remarkable enthusiasm for "nearly everything" and her effortless talent to get students excited by the technical side of chemistry.

"Toni has remarkable skills as a mentor to undergraduates interested in research," Flynn said. "To do this is a challenge, and requires sustained commitment, as well as an ability to spot talent, recruit it, and plan to develop it." Strong mentoring of undergraduate student research is essential to the work they do to train the next generation of scientists, he continued. "I admire Toni for her ability to build such a distinctive and productive undergraduate research group at Saint Mary's—taking advantage of the opportunity to expose these smart undergrads to leading-edge collaborative research."

Other colleagues at Saint Mary's have stretched their own style of teaching and research as well, the effect of Barstis and her infectious attitude. "She definitely paved the way for

funded research at Saint Mary's," Paetkau said. "And when I say paved the way, she really took some of the hits. As we developed a grant to conduct research in Nepal, she took on the work of being part of the National Science Foundation review panel to get the experience and to really understand how to do this. There were many learning curves for the College to obtain and maintain grants—for the researchers *and* administration—and she pushed to see it through. Her hope was always that it would be easier for new faculty who want to do work with outside funding. And to this day, it is."

She also went through the first patent process, questioned the College's reliance on other institutions, and created internships at the College so students could stay on through the summer and learn here rather than going elsewhere for research. "Both of our departments—chemistry and biology—have changed because of her legacy," Paetkau said.

Indeed, Barstis's legacy at Saint Mary's is deep and will impact generations of future scientists. In addition to helping hone the summer science research communities, she expanded the College's 5-Year Dual-Degree Engineering Program with the University of Notre Dame, increasing the number of engineering students to record numbers. And she was instrumental in starting the STEM professional development series, empowering students in the sciences so they can secure jobs more easily upon graduation.

While she is quick to defer attention away from herself, particularly when it comes to accolades, she *is* proud of the relationship she helped forge with the University of Notre Dame for Saint Mary's students interested in engineering. It is significant because students leave with two bachelor's degrees—one from Saint Mary's and one from the University of Notre Dame—and also because SMC graduates leave confident they are at the same professional level as those from a top-tier research institution.

"I tell them 'You've done this; it's yours. You've gone toe-to-toe with the students who graduate with the same degree at Notre Dame.' We have been able to focus on this with all of our engineering students, and help them understand themselves, to negotiate for themselves, to become equals."

The students who go through this program have the best of both worlds, she said. "They learn these incredible things at Saint Mary's, have the ability to do research, learn to write. Then they can take advantage of the resources at Notre Dame. And they just love it. You remember being 18 to 22, the world is open to you! The energy, the excitement, the exhaustion, the dreaming. This program changed my life and I'm just really pleased with that. That tells me it was blessed. That's what I love Saint Mary's for."

In her Fulbright year and beyond, Barstis says it's finally time to focus on her own research, taking the PADs project further. Of the two paths, commercializing the devices and continued research, she chooses the latter because it helps get the technology in the hands of other inventors who can continue to develop it.

"It was always very 'real-world' application with her," Bevilacqua said. Barstis encouraged students to think beyond the lab, to think of the end-user when conducting their research. "It is something that I think is unique in a lot of academic experiences, where research tends to be isolated in the bubble of the academic community. For those of us who studied at Saint Mary's, taking this (PADs) technology and going further with it, is something we can do."

"I'm proud of all my students, whether they're chemistry or engineering students. They have an attitude that resonates with me, this 'pay it forward'," Barstis said. "I've been blessed to pay it forward, using my intelligence and stubbornness to make a difference. I've helped the students at Saint Mary's, and that was so much fun."

In the classroom with her own students, Bevilacqua carries with her the lessons she learned at Saint Mary's and in Barstis's lab. Her students choose an obstacle that exists in the medical world, then design and build a novel device to try to overcome it. "I try to create for them the same kind of opportunity that I had through Toni—to create something people could potentially utilize, to solve a real problem. She created something special at Saint Mary's. We can all try to do that too."

Editor's Note: As part of her global

studies experience at Saint Mary's, Margaret Cicchiello '22 traveled to the US/Mexico border as part of a spring break cultural immersion trip organized by SMC

faculty members Leonard Sanchez and Kathyrn Lyndes. Here she shares a reflection of her time there, and the impact it has had on her life.

The sidewalks of Brownsville, Texas, were crowded as a group of students pulled wagons full of blankets, toiletries, and cooking ingredients toward the border checkpoint into Matamoros, Mexico. Once through, the sidewalk suddenly gave way to rocky dirt. They didn't stop to buy candy from the children who ran up to them, because they had used their

change to pay the border toll. Tents dozens of them in every direction—made it clear they had reached their destination. This 'tent city' was flanked by a fence on one side and a river on the other; laundry strung along its bank. Residents used water to turn the dusty dirt into clay to make simple ovens. It was here where the students delivered their wagons, full of ingredients like salt, cooking oil, and flour to the 2,000 people who were living there indefinitely, waiting for information about their asylum status.

On spring break in 2020, I joined four Saint Mary's students and two professors in McAllen, Texas to assist the men, women, and children waiting at the borders. This week-long experience was

facilitated by Leonard Sanchez, professor of social work, and Kathryn Lyndes, assistant professor of social work and gerontology. It was important to both of them that students from Saint Mary's were able to meet personally with people who are directly impacted by this humanitarian crisis, so we could better understand the situation. In partnership with Respite Center Ministries (RCM) and Sister Norma Pimentel, MJ, executive director of Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley, our small group joined RCM to offer aid throughout McAllen and in Brownsville, about an hour's drive away.

According to Sanchez, the idea for this trip started when Rev. Joe Corpora, CSC, a priest at the University of Notre Dame, asked Sanchez if he knew of a social work student who could complete her practicum with Sister Norma. Father Corpora had known Sanchez for a long time; he had been his pastor in Goodyear, Ariz. where he had worked with Sanchez's mother. "In 2019 I went on a site visit to Catholic Charities of the Rio Grande Valley to meet with Sister Norma's staff. I knew soon after I arrived that I wanted to organize more than a practicum experience," Sanchez said. "I felt a strong need to start the border immersion program so that students have their senses filled with sights and sounds of what a modern miracle looks like in the year 2020. Sister Norma has moved

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He continued, "I wanted groups of students from Saint Mary's College to learn about the journeys of the countless number of refugees seeking political asylum on the US/Mexico border."

Lyndes agreed, joining forces with Sanchez. "Part of Saint Mary's mission is to promote a life of social responsibility, that we are called to build awareness for our troubled world and social injustice, and to respond to it with compassion."

We learned from the people we met at the border. Each individual and family was trying to reach US soil to be granted asylum. I remember being impressed by everyone there, how innovative they were, how calm they were under the circumstances. There were volunteers from multiple organizations working with the people living in the tent city; some were singing songs with a group of children, a group had provided portable charging stations, and stylists were giving haircuts. While it felt good to see volunteers there providing comfort, I knew that we needed to be doing more. The basic needs of the asylum seekers

were not being met. With so many in such a small area, there were not sufficient showers, toilets, or security, and it was unclear if they had safe drinking water.

Sanchez recalls spending his first visit preparing meals and driving people to the bus station. Because of the volume of people seeking refuge through RCM, some days were entirely spent making sandwiches. When we arrived in March 2020, most of those seeking asylum were unable to stay in the United States with their sponsors while they waited. As a result, the tent city on the Mexican side of the border was created as a temporary waiting location, established by humanitarian aid centers, like RCM. But asylum seekers frequently wait an indefinite time for news on their asylum status. Many wait years. So, instead of providing fresh clothes and food at the respite center, as Sanchez intended for us, we spent our time packaging ingredients and other toiletries, loading them into wagons, and walking them across the border. There clearly would not be enough for the thousands there. But still, we delivered the supplies.



Students spent an emotional day learning about La Lomita Chapel in Mission, Texas. A historical landmark, La Lomita was built in 1865 and served as a church for local ranchers as well as a place of rest for generations of travelling missionaries, like the Cavalry of Christ.

On one delivery day, children asked us for milk. It was frustrating and disappointing that we didn't have any to offer them. Later, as we processed what we were seeing and hearing, one in our group remarked how calm, and even hopeful, people seemed, even without milk or toothpaste or countless other provisions. Student volunteer Magdalena Hernandez '20 reflected that the asylum seekers were survivors who often fled unsafe, even lifethreatening environments in their home countries, and said "Their resilience and motivation to find a better life held them together" while they were waiting for asylum in less than ideal conditions.

On our trip, we spent time learning from Sister Norma. Her commitment to helping asylum seekers lies in her Catholic faith. "We believe in a God of love, a God who tells us we must welcome the stranger, feed the hungry, clothe the naked," she said. She and her staff arranged for our group to help at other nonprofits and visit area sites.

One day we visited La Lomita Chapel, a one-room chapel built 150 years ago as a meeting place for the Cavalry of Christ.

The chapel is a historical landmark and serves as a physical reminder of hope for all who encounter it on their way to the border. Learning that the chapel had been a place for Masses, baptisms, weddings, and funerals for all of that time was poignant. However, when I learned that the diocese was fighting to keep the chapel from being torn down to make room for the border wall, I was overcome by the strength and determination that was the legacy of those who had built the chapel and those who had been taking care of it since.

At Saint Mary's, we are taught to value life and help each other. This was motivating for our work. But the lack of resources for the asylum seekers adding to their dangerous journeys was frustrating. Although we were awed by the strength of the people we met, it was easy to feel that the work would not make a significant difference for this enormous problem. I'm glad we were able to provide help for a few days, but most of the support at the border is being provided by volunteers who were there before we arrived and would be there after we left. After we got back and I had time to reflect on the people we had met, I realized that this trip had been for us. Like with so many other

cases "it is in giving that we receive."

Our intention may have been to provide support for people who do not have sufficient resources, but we were the ones who gained something important. The lasting change was within myself—the faces I now put with the facts I know about this humanitarian crisis, and the increasing motivation I have to help people understand the situation.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, there has not been another McAllen immersion trip since 2020, although Sanchez is committed to continuing it. "My vision for the McAllen border immersion is that the College creates

a community on campus to support future trips," Sanchez said. "So we can continue learning about the precious life of an asylum seeker." In addition to students receiving course credit, as the first group did, a longer internship with RCM may be a possibility in the future, he said.

The Saint Mary's community is made up of people who are invested in social justice and human dignity. Our community understands that in order to avoid dynamics like white saviorism, it is important to acknowledge what we don't know about new situations, and be open to learning. After meeting people who are personally affected by life-threatening situations in their countries, and who are trying to build new lives here, I understand more about asylum seekers than I did before.

My own commitment to social justice deepened while at Saint Mary's. And by reflecting on the bravery and patience of those who are crossing our border to work and learn here, I am emboldened to do as much as I can to help. How can I do any less?

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100 Years of Educating the Educator by Terri Suico and Steven Mast

Saint Mary's first awarded diplomas in education in 1923. That year just four students completed their **Bachelor of Philosophy** in Education.

One hundred years later, the Education Department at Saint Mary's College is in a far different place.

In its first years, the four-year education program focused on preparing high school teachers—one of the few professional avenues women could pursue—with a two-year option for those who chose to earn the Elementary Provisional Certificate. Besides religion, English, and modern language, students also took coursework in philosophy and education.

Saint Mary's students are now unlimited in their choice of career opportunities. The education program has expanded to include not only majors in elementary and secondary education, but also programs in early childhood, English as a second language, mild intervention, and reading. Students who are majoring in elementary education with mild intervention now have the option of pursuing the 4+1 with a master's in Autism Studies. The department also welcomes students from the University of Notre Dame, who can get their teaching license at Saint Mary's by the time they graduate with their bachelor's degree.

We are fortunate to have graduates who remain in the area to teach who serve as fantastic ambassadors for the profession, the department, and the College. They have also given back in other ways about 20 of the clinical instructors in the Education department are graduates of the Education program at Saint Mary's.

"I am so grateful and genuinely enjoy giving back to Saint Mary's by co-teaching with current students and learning from them as I help prepare them to be future educators," said Michelle Van Meter Sanchez '97, a first-grade teacher at Prairie Vista Elementary in Granger, Ind.

The need for well-prepared and committed teachers is more important than ever.

In addition to their vital work as classroom teachers, our graduates have gone on to earn graduate degrees and work in school leadership roles. Kim Holly Maher '05, who just started her ninth year as principal at Wilson Creek Elementary, in Manhattan, IL, credits the department and the College, stating, "Everything Saint Mary's promises about discovery and leadership is true. None of this is a coincidence... The experiences we had at Saint Mary's along with the field opportunities provided to us laid the foundation for the educators we would become."

Likewise, Franca Peluso Mulhern '11 currently serves as an adjunct faculty member at the College, and is assistant principal at Walt Disney Elementary

in Mishawaka, Ind. She says, "The confidence instilled in me through these field experiences and the continued support from my Saint Mary's family has pushed me to strive for achievements I once thought unattainable. Not only have I become a part of our school district's leadership team, but, today, I am also beginning my second year of doctoral studies in educational leadership.

"My parents always believed in my abilities to lead and achieve, but Saint Mary's gave me the confidence to truly believe in myself," Mulhern continued. "It is my sincere hope that I will continue to encourage young women to find their voice, strive for excellence, and pursue their passions without limitations."

700 Hours

While the programs have changed since 1923, the department's commitment to preparing teachers has remained. At the center of the program are the diverse field experiences. From their initial course in the program, students are placed in a local K-12 classroom. These placements are carefully designed to expose students to multiple grade levels and school districts, as well as to diverse student populations.

Placements serve multiple purposes. Besides providing students with the opportunity to experience a variety of school settings and teaching styles, they also help students confirm that teaching is right for them, before they get to the next step of student teaching. By the end of their time in the program, Saint Mary's graduates will have over 700 hours of field experience—a distinctive feature that sets the College apart from other education programs. Our graduates are well-prepared to lead their own classrooms the moment they graduate.

Recently named Teacher of the Year for School City of Mishawaka, Angelina Lazovich '15, who teaches sixth grade at Beiger Elementary, says, "I will never forget the variety of field placement opportunities I was given throughout my years in the education department. This array of grade levels and districts allowed me to be exposed to so many different teaching and building styles and prepared me to conquer whatever I was given as a teacher."

To provide students with these wideranging opportunities, the department has cultivated strong community partnerships throughout the years with many schools, including Beiger Elementary in School City of Mishawaka, Swanson Traditional School in the South Bend Community School Corporation, and Walt Disney Elementary School in the Penn Harris Madison School Corporation. These partnerships allow consistent placements in each of these schools for our teacher candidates and student teachers. Consistency is key not only in ensuring that the students get quality experiences but also in helping the department improve, since the teachers and administrators at these schools provide feedback that helps shape our program.

In turn, the schools appreciate our emphasis on co-teaching as well as having well-prepared, professional teacher candidates. With class sizes growing due to teacher shortages, everyone involved benefits from these placements—teachers, K-12 students, and the teacher candidates.

During the pandemic, our teacher candidates were great resources for local teachers, when a quick pivot to virtual learning was required. Our students' experience with a variety of online learning platforms and programs provided invaluable assistance to classroom teachers.

The Partners in Education Committee, composed of local administrators, teachers, and alumnae, is key in evaluating practices, offering insight, and providing support for our current students. This volunteer group, which meets with faculty at Saint Mary's after school each semester, always surprises us with their enthusiasm and insight as they share suggestions and provide feedback on how the program can grow and improve. Guest speakers share their expertise as administrators, as the teacher candidates prepare for student teaching and

job interviews. Our adjunct faculty include alumnae, clinical educators, and other classroom teachers who come to campus to teach methods courses and use their rich experiences to prepare our students.

A Look Ahead

As the department looks to the future, it is clear-eyed in its understanding of the challenges teachers face. As more people choose other careers and a teacher shortage looms for many areas, the need for well-prepared and committed teachers is more important than ever. Faculty remain resolute in their commitment to preparing new teachers for the realities of the classroom.

Maggie Pacana '17, who teaches sixth-grade language arts at Kaneland Harter Middle School in Sugar Grove, Ill. says, "I felt extremely prepared to enter the teaching profession. I had practice using State standards as guides for planning my units, knew how to use professional development opportunities effectively to my benefit, could comfortably communicate with parents and fellow staff members professionally, and understood how to educate the whole child, looking at more than just their academics."

Amy Noppenberg Gallo '00, a K-5 music teacher at Prairie Vista Elementary in Granger, Ind. remembers talking to education professor Sister Marilyn Zugish '70, CSC, as the moment when "I [realized] I did in fact love music and more importantly loved teaching young people...she changed my life and the lives of thousands of children who have entered my classroom over my 20-plus year career."

From the days when we had four graduates, the Education Department at Saint Mary's has graduated thousands of students from the program. As we move through our celebration year, we eagerly await Commencement in May, when we'll award degrees to the 100th graduating class of teachers.

Jill Lepore Talks Democratic Process

Jill Lepore, Ph.D. wears many hats: author, essayist, staff writer for *The New Yorker*, professor at Harvard University, podcast host, and most recently, the 2022 Christian Culture Lecture speaker at Saint Mary's.

"As a writer, thinker, and researcher, her reach is unspeakably vast," said Laura Williamson, associate professor of the Department of Humanistic Studies. "Her award-winning work on American history and politics has impacted not just academic circles but also community book clubs, readers of *The New Yorker*, and podcast listeners."

Lepore is a best-selling author, writing about American history, law, politics, and popular culture. Her impressive career includes a long list of published work and many prizes and accolades, including the Bancroft Prize and the American History Book Prize. These Truths: A History of the United States was named one of Time magazine's top-10 nonfiction books of the decade.

"We were especially excited about the seminar that Dr. Lepore offered Saint Mary's students in Humanistic Studies and History as this afforded students a chance to learn from a top historian and public intellectual," Williamson said.

Lepore sat down with the small group for a writing workshop. During the session, students asked questions about her writing process, shared stories of inspiration, and connected as women writers.



Later, Lepore spoke in O'Laughlin
Auditorium about her work as a historian
and asked everyone to participate in an
anonymous poll about democratic culture.
She focused on the Amendment process in
the United States, relating the Amendment
clause to a self-cleaning oven. "When The
Framers wrote the Constitution they were
very mechanically minded. They wanted
the Constitution to be a watch, and when
you wound it up it would just go and it
would always be able to correct itself,"

Following the lecture, **Jill Tiefenthaler '87**, CEO of The National Geographic Society and vice chair of the College's Board of Trustees, joined Lepore for a spirited conversation to answer audience questions.

Women's Colleges Unite for Unique Career Fair

The Career Crossings Office at SMC held a virtual career fair in collaboration with nine other women's colleges and universities across the country—the first of its kind. The Women's College and Universities Diversity Career Expo was held September 27 to help current students land internships, jobs, and post-graduate service opportunities. More than 115 employers attended the fair, giving participants the opportunity to connect with job and internship opportunities ranging from Amazon to Apple, the FBI, and 1st Source Bank. Once participants registered, they were able to sign up for group sessions to learn more about the organizations and to explore various career paths or intimate one-on-one sessions to connect directly with recruiters. According to program organizers, Saint Mary's wanted to lead the charge on bringing together similar institutions to help our students get recruited and our employer partners gain access to more student candidates.



Summer Camps Offerings to Expand

From forensics to lacrosse, campus was lively throughout June and July. The College hosted nearly 500 girls from across the country at nine summer camp experiences, including the new Dialogue and Democracy Academic Institute. Thanks to a \$1 million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc., future campers will be able to choose from even more programs. President Katie Conboy announced that the grant will enhance and expand on-campus educational summer programs for girls over the next three years, modernizing the College's summer programming. Saint Mary's is committed to broadening its impact as a place of lifelong learning for women and girls, she said, adding that "As the only women's college in Indiana, located in a region where girl-specific resources are scarce, Saint Mary's has both the opportunity and the obligation to lead. The summer youth programs will specifically emphasize access for Indiana girls and help strengthen how Saint Mary's recruits students, especially students who have been underserved in higher education."

SMC Professors Compile South Bend's COVID Stories

At the South Bend Heritage Center, audience members found themselves transported back to the height of the pandemic, when fear combined with resolve, when uncertainty met with hope. They gathered to listen to audio clips containing a collection of voices from the community to remember—and archive—how COVID-19 affected South Bend.



"Listening to Pandemic Narratives: Selections from COVID-19 Oral Histories in the South Bend Area" is a project of Jamie Wagman, professor of

history and gender & women's studies, and Julia Dauer, professor of English at Saint Mary's. The event was held on October 11 and featured audio clips from interviews conducted with members of the South Bend community to get different accounts of what pandemic life was like for residents.

"Together, we interviewed an emergency room nurse, a public high school teacher, a mother of four, a community organizer, a yogi, a small business owner, an oboist, a priest, and the director of the LGBTQ Center, among others," Wagman said. "They reflected over loss, isolation—at times gains—and how they are emerging today. Altogether, their narratives make up a generation of people who have collective memory built around the trauma of the pandemic."

Wagman and Dauer had noted other oral historians doing these collections but no one was documenting South Bend. So, a year ago, the two researchers worked with students to compile the recordings. Through a class called Doing History, the professors taught students historiography and the critical examination of the sources who write historical documents. Dauer said looking at these narratives from a humanities perspective helped to process the events of COVID. Using audio to capture the stories rather than video lent a particularly compelling sensory experience for the audience.

"Their memories differ and coexist with one another, not disputing facts but rather offering a layered picture of what life was like for residents of South Bend throughout quarantine, vaccination rollout and beyond," Wagman said.

"Listening to Pandemic Narratives" is part of a series sponsored by the National Endowment for the Humanities and Indiana Humanities as part of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021.

Honoring Our First African American Alumna



Saint Mary's College remembers **Juanita Boozer Bay '52**, a pioneering alumna who died on August 28 at her home in Haliburton, Ontario in Canada. Bay is considered to be Saint Mary's first Black alumna, graduating with a bachelor of arts degree in 1952. Prior to her retirement, Bay was the acting director of policy at the Ontario Women's Directorate, an organization that promotes women's economic independence and fights against gender-based violence. In 2007, Bay returned to campus to lead a roundtable discussion, "African-American Trailblazers in Post-War America," examining diversity issues. Bay compared experiences with other panelists, and recalled that her experience on campus was difficult at times, "but the education I received here has stayed with me and instilled in me a love of learning. It also taught me about leadership and how one person can make a difference." In her memory, the Juanita Boozer Bay '52 Scholarship Fund has been established.

New Hang Out Corner

Tables, fire pits, ambient lighting, and brick pavers were among the amenities installed this fall in a near-vacant corner outside of Le Mans Hall. Where bike racks once stood now has become a popular gathering place for students, employees, and visitors of the College. Officially called Belles Corner, it began as an informal location during COVID to provide an outdoor eating and safe socializing space. Tucked in the corner just outside the west entrance of Le Mans, students enjoyed the space throughout fall and winter in

the pandemic months thanks to comfy Adirondacks, firepits, and Edison bulbs strung among the oaks and maples. Eventually, that furniture was moved to the lawn on the north side of Le Mans to a space known as Belles Backyard. This summer, the College decided to formalize Belles Corner, adding 21 tables and chairs, more lighting, wi-fi and electricity for outdoor events, and stable flooring to be handicap accessible. The grounds department maintains the space, even adding seasonal decorations, said Ben Bowman, director of facilities.

Madrigal Dinners To Celebrate 50 Years of Performances

Year after year, the immersive Christmas Madrigal Dinners have invited audiences to step back in time through



the food, music, scenery, costumes, and performances of the Renaissance period. When this year's Madrigal holiday banquet and performances take place this December 2-4, it will be momentous as it marks its 50th anniversary. As is customary, singers from the Women's Choir are featured, as are dancers, actors, and musicians from the College community. In the months leading up to this year's event, organizers are encouraging former performers to come to campus to see the show. 


An Evening with Author Ashley Ford



In late October, Indiana author Ashley C. Ford spent an evening at Saint Mary's as the Department of English's 2022 Visiting Writer Series speaker. 

major life challenges and continued to grow and move on. The column in this issue is shaped by the generosity of two of our classmates who have a keen sense of how Courier sometimes fortifies our ongoing community. We can be proud of their strength and resilience in finding ways to transcend unbearable tragedy.

Arline Hagan Saturdayborn's oldest son Bill Whelan took his life last November at 55 vears of age. As she writes: "He had been in the grips of mental illness that manifested in his mid-20s, prevented him from seeking any help, demonized me and one of his brothers. alienated him from family and all who loved him, and ultimately isolated and caused him so much anguish that suicide appeared to be the only way out."

Arline continues: "Being with the pain of mental illness, alone as one who has it or one who witnesses it, is almost unbearable. I am taking the love I have for Bill — that could not connect with him in his adult life — and using it to create awareness of this crisis of mental illness in our society. I imagine there are classmates who have lived with the agony of a loved one lost and suffering in mental illness or taking their own life. Open conversation heals. Connection heals. Awareness of this reality of human life is essential for improving and changing systems for mental health and suicide prevention. Ken Burns has an excellent new documentary (Hiding in Plain Sight) circulating now on PBS, and Thomas Insel, MD, has an inspiring book (*Healing*). The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention sponsors a national all-night Out of the Darkness walk and shorter community walks to raise money for education to create a culture that is smart about mental health." Arline joined her first walk in Portland, ME last September.

Barbara (Barb/Bobbie) Hankins Douyon

lost her granddaughter Chloe to suicide two years ago last March. She writes: "I've made a conscious decision to celebrate her life, to no longer mourn her death. We had no clue. Chloe, who had recently graduated from college, lived, worked, and took classes in Los Angeles. She had visited 'home' a few months before she was found — overdosed in her car at a much-frequented park. Had she come home to say 'goodbye'? Was there something I'd missed, something I should have picked up on during her visit? Looking back, she was her usual full-of-laughter, teasing self.

"I've visited her grave site after the solemn burial only once, on the anniversary of her interment. (The visit) hit me — hard — I knew she was not there! It's what she'd been trying to tell me for months —'Gramma, see me; talk to me." Barb describes the process of reconnection with Chloe: "And so, after a year of avoiding her — avoiding her

photographs, locking away my memories of her, conversations with her...one morning I lingered over her picture — a favorite of mine — of Chloe on the counter in the kitchen. I smiled at the memory that surfaced, of her showing me "the best way to slice a pineapple." I spoke aloud to her one afternoon when I noticed the remnants of her favorite flower. I'd planted it, but it had not survived the gophers in the yard. I laughed. I knew her spirit was there laughing, too. I started and have continued to 'see' Chloe and all her whimsical antics, to visualize behaviors as I actively skim photos of her, to talk to her about matters she'd have eagerly given her opinion. My granddaughter is the only suicide I've ever encountered. I know her physical presence has gone, that her spirit — remains."


