Saint Leo Continues Growth

Saint Leo University has announced a major purchase and unveiled significant new building projects at its University Campus in central Florida.

In early October, the university announced it had purchased 29 acres from its neighbor, the Benedictine Sisters of Florida, including the Holy Name Monastery, the building that serves as the Florida administrative headquarters and home of the Benedictine Sisters. The lakeside monastery is adjacent to the west end of the campus. Also included in the purchase is a parcel facing the monastery, not far from the front of the university entrance.

The religious community, with 16 members, will remain where it is for about two years while the sisters build a smaller and more suitable home on nearby acreage. The timetable gives university administration and trustees the opportunity to incorporate the new property into its University Campus master plan and determine its best use.

DePaul Hosts Catholic Research Symposium

On October 15–16, DePaul University hosted the Catholic Research Resources Alliance (CRRA) Symposium, titled "Nurturing the 'Spirit of Perfect Charity': Libraries and Archives at the Intersection of Service and Scholarship in Catholic Social Justice Studies."

Founded in 2008, CRRA is a consortium of 35 institutions holding significant library or archival collections relevant to Catholic studies, including colleges, universities, seminaries, religious orders, and other Church offices. In addition to providing digital access to an increasingly robust collection of rare materials through its Catholic Portal program, CRRA supports collaboration among member institutions through joint programs and projects, including the symposium.

DePaul University President Dennis Η. Holtschneider, C.M., welcomed almost 100 participants from institutions across the United States and abroad with his thoughts on the unique character of the Catholic commitment to social justice and the role of libraries and archives in promoting the work of those who study it. "Libraries and archives," Fr. Holtschneider concluded, "enable scholars, enable voices to be heard, enable people to be moved."

The 2012 CRRA Symposium focused on the study of social justice and the scholarly use of social action archives, including those held at DePaul University, Loyola University Chicago, and Marquette University. The event also included discussion of the CRRA's Catholic Newspapers Project and the integration of special collections materials in undergraduate education. DePaul's Michael Baxter, visiting associate professor of Catholic studies, delivered the keynote address.

The 2012 Catholic Research Resources Alliance Symposium was co-sponsored by the DePaul University Library, the DePaul University Office of Mission and Values, and by CRRA. More information on CRRA is available on its website.
