As the semester comes to an end, I have been reflecting on a number of discussions that I had with the social work students. One discussion that has continually come to mind was to see the client as a person and not a symptom. The students have been engaging in issues and concerns by placing a human face to the people they encounter. The students found a deeper investment in their learning and realized how their presence and aid truly impacts a client's life. Therefore, a number of the students questioned life events and how some people embraced each day by helping a fellow human being. They also questioned how other people do not see the world through the same lens of service and compassion.
