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Prestigious Faculty Award Won by Dr. Frances Bernard Kominkiewicz

Dr. Frances Bernard Kominkiewicz, Professor, Chair of the Department of Social Work and Gerontology and Director of the Social Work Program, received the Kevin J. and Marijo Rogers Kelly '77 Faculty Service Award for her exemplified local, regional, and national commitment to social work education. This award was established through the recently completed *Faith Always, Action Now* campaign. The Saint Mary's College Academic Affairs Council, chaired by Saint Mary's College President Carol Ann Mooney and comprised of administrators, faculty, and staff, voted on this award.

Dr. Kominkiewicz has been a faculty member at Saint Mary's College for eighteen years. She has served as the Director of the Social Work Program for seventeen years. She successfully helped lead the Social Work Program to its first national Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) accreditation in 1998, and has led the Program to the national reaccreditations

of that Program since then, the last reaccreditation in 2011 with a perfect rating. Dr. Kominkiewicz earned her Ph.D. in Sociology and Master of Science in Administration degree at the University of Notre Dame, Notre Dame, Indiana, and her Master of Social Work and Bachelor of Social Work degrees at Indiana University School of Social Work, Indianapolis, Indiana. She holds three licenses, all with Indiana State Board of Certification: Clinical Social Worker, Marriage and Family Therapist, and Clinical Addiction Counselor. Dr. Kominkiewicz has many publications and has presented numerous research sessions, including presentations in Germany and in China. One of her book chapters regarding child maltreatment interviewing is used in counselor trainings in Germany and is widely used and cited within the scholarly community in Europe. Her research interests include child maltreatment policy issues and homeless youth. Dr. Kominkiewicz served on the national board of the Baccalaureate Social Work Program Directors as a member-at-large representing all baccalaureate social work programs, served a three-year term as the co-chair of the national Baccalaureate Social Work Program Directors (BPD) Research Committee, is a consulting editor for the *Journal of Bacca*laureate Social Work, and is presently a member of the BPD Nominations Committee. She was appointed to the CSWE Council on the Role and Status of Women in Social Work Education and to the CSWE Council on Social Work Education Ad Hoc Group: Commission on Diversity & Social & Economic Justice & Religion & Spirituality Work Group. She was given a BPD award in March 2015 for her dedicated service on the BPD Board of Directors. Dr. Kominkiewicz thanks her husband, John, her son, Joseph, ND '05, and her daughter, Lauren, SMC '10, for all of their love and support, and also thanks her colleagues for their support. Social work students in the Human Behavior and the Social Environment II course (SW 236) taught by Dr. Frances Bernard Kominkiewicz have organized a community forum in that course for the last eleven years. Students in the course again chose a topic of importance to the South Bend community: the needs of our veterans. Students focused on issues of great relevance to veterans and organized a panel of three well-known local experts: Mayor Peter Buttigieg, Mayor of South Bend; Dr. Kent Laudeman, Director of the Judge Miller Center for Homeless Veterans; and Congresswoman Jackie Walorski, IN-2nd District. These experts participated in the community forum panel, "The Battle after the War: Veterans on Their Lives and Struggles" on March 31, 2015, and discussed such issues as traumatic stress disorder, depression, economic issues, homelessness, policies, laws, and services that challenge and impact veterans' lives. Participants in the forum were encouraged to ask questions and provide comments to the experts. We greatly appreciate our

The field in Social Work is much more than it seems. The field challenges us outside of our comfort zones through possible audible, blind spot tackles, and even onside kick offs. Although the field is not literally comparable to football, the comparison between the two does convey the rough and tough that is associated with the contact sport. hoped. I had no idea what to expect going into this particular field. I had never worked with children or students with different needs and abilities; I was feeling intimidated. Fortunately, my anxious feelings were completely defied after even just the first week. I found myself truly enjoying the company of the students in the Special Ed Department and connecting with them in ways I never thought I would be able to. This definitely pushed me out of my comfort zone and made me realize that sometimes going for the two-point conversion, although risky, is definitely worth it.

And that is something that I have definitely learned this year through the field. Social work pushes you and pulls you in so many different directions, but at the end of the day even the smallest victories are so valuable. Social work requires you to be creative, to try the trick plays, and to not give up. This year at the school where I am interning I have been able to have such a diverse experience. I have been able to have one on one sessions with some of the special ed students, facilitate and co-facilitate different groups (Life and Social Skills, Anger Management, Girls Groups, Student Council), gain experience, and learn more about myself as a social worker.

Regardless of the bruises or hits that this year has given me with unexpected conflicts or students getting upset, I have found that I truly enjoy this profession. I find myself waking up on Tuesdays and Thursdays refreshed and ready to go to school and leaving school only wanting to go back. With this internship this year and my education through the Department of Social Work and Gerontology at Saint Mary's, I have found something that I love. I have found something that I do not merely call a job, but a passion. I have found a place where I belong. I call this field my home.
