It has been a great academic year for the Social Work Department. The students continue to raise the bar with their skills and their contributions to the community. As the practicum field coordinator, I have been able to see their efforts first hand. This year, I asked more of the students in completing their senior comprehensive portfolio. With the help of Stacie Jeffirs, Director of Career Crossing Office, students were able to document their academic and field work along with work and life experiences in an e-portfolio. The eportfolio included the academic components of the 10 social work competences, projects or experiences from the field, why they chose social work as their major, personal mission statement, and many of their contributions and accomplishments while at Saint Mary's College. In the end the students did a wonderful job on both the written and oral portion of the comprehensive. I hope the students share these experiences with their field instructors, other students, professors, staff, and their families. I believe they have developed a strong professional Social Work foundation to build upon.

This spring break I had the pleasure of going to Honduras to complete a service project with eight Saint Mary's students. It was an eye opening experience for everyone in the group to see the poverty and poor living conditions of the Hondurans. We spent most of our time at a residential program for boys called El Hogar Dia-

mante. The boys are at-risk youth who spend most of their time on the streets panhandling. El Hogar Diamante helps parents who do not have viable resources to provide for their children. I was so proud of the Saint Mary's students who went on the trip. These eight service students got up at 6:30am to start the day. They worked very hard painting El Hogar Diamante's cafeteria, the kitchen, and pillars outside of the dorm. The pay off was playing and spending time with the boys of the Hogar. The boys had such a great time developing a little brother-big sister bond with the Saint Mary's students. I believe the students will hold this memorable experience in Honduras for a lifetime. I would like to give a special thanks to Professor Karen Van Meter of the Education Department for co-facilitating the trip. She was a great help and a nice addition to the group. Next spring break I am planning a trip to El Sal-

vador with Professor Jan Pilarski from the Justice Education Department. Students, please contact me if you have an interest in going.

As many of you know I recently graduated from Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri, with a Master's in Social Work. I have been blessed with a volunteer opportunity to become a part of the leadership team in a small community in Jinja, Uganda. While attending Saint Mary's College for my undergraduate degree, I had a class with Sr. Stella Maris who is from Uganda. Through our continued correspondence, she connected me with Fr. Fred Jenga who is from Jinja, Uganda and is associated with the Mission Center at Notre Dame, falling under the Holy Cross Apostolates. Fr. Jenga is also involved with creating a program call the Lazarus Community. The Lazarus Community is a Community Based Organization which was developed by Fr. Jenga's brother Henry and his colleague James in response to an overwhelming need to serve poor families infected and affected by HIV/AIDS. The program has around 120 active members, mostly widowed women and orphans. Along with the HIV/ AIDS treatment program, the Lazarus Community is establishing a savings and revolving fundraising program, a child sponsorship program, and a small crafts program in an effort to increase household incomes. Another goal is to begin a "Grandmother's Group" which constitutes working with elderly women whose children have died of HIV/AIDS leaving them the responsibility of raising their grandchildren. My passion for working with the older population has always been clear but I was unsure in what capacity. However, my senior

year my passion has become more focused after a series of opportunities encountered because of the social work department. To begin, my field placement at REAL Services was working in the case management sector. It was here that I began seeing and talking with older adults who lived in their own homes. Second semester, I switched to the Caregiver Connection Center which aims to aid informal caregivers of older adults by providing respite services and home modifications. What was unique about this placement was that I was simultaneously working on an independent research study with Dr. JoAnn Burke, Hannah Snyder, and Dr. Dennis Kaldenberg, Senior Vice-President and Chief Scientist at Press Ganey, Inc. doing this program's evaluation according to the grant stipulations. While I loved working with these older adults, it was becoming very evident to me that many of these people are

happy to be in their homes but very isolated and lonely. I began questioning whether or not remaining in their own home was the best thing for older adults. Last year, in my gerontology class I learned about The GREEN HOUSE Project where their mission is to create a more humane elderly housing/living model radically different from traditional skilled nursing homes or assisted living facilities where the focus is on the community as opposed to medical aspects of their care. Piecing these things together, my interest sparked drastically in creating these types of communities. As I am internalizing all of this, Dr. Burke received an email from an alumna with a job opportunity working with the GREEN HOUSE Project and quickly forwarded me this opportunity. While I was not qualified at this time for the MSW position, I inquired about possible summer internships and months later I received a phone call offering me an internship! So this summer I will be working in Washington D.C. with this project. In the fall, I will be attending the University of Michigan where I received the Geriatric Scholarship. Saint Mary's has provided me tremendous opportunities that have prepared me to make a difference with our baby booming population!

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
