Noon – 1:30 p.m. "Lunch and Learn" How is Saint Mary's keeping Sister Madeleva's "promise of discovery" today? Madeleva Hall, Carroll Auditorium

A half-century after the conclusion of Sister Madeleva's presidency, her forward-thinking leadership and vision continue to inspire and guide the work of the College. Current students and recent alumnae from various disciplines will share how Sister Madeleva's vision of a Catholic, liberal arts education for women has equipped them "to think ethically, honestly, morally... about the sacredness of human life, about power, wealth, and truth" and " to love, to think, to wonder, to explore their own inheritances as children of God."

Gail Mandell, professor emerita of humanistic studies and author of *Madeleva: A Biography*, will guide the conversation. Panelists include: Alma Bravo '12, social work; Amanda Lester '12, communication studies; Liz Bajema '11, chemistry; Courtney Parry '09, mathematics and economics; and Julia Malone Hum '07, biology. There will be an opportunity for questions and comments from the audience.

Gail Mandell is professor emerita of humanistic studies and the Bruno Schlesinger Chair in Humanistic Studies emerita. She came to the College in 1972 and joined the humanistic studies faculty in 1978. Gail earned the highest faculty awards the College

bestows: the Maria Pieta Award for teaching and the Spes Unica Award for service. In 1994 she delivered the 10th annual Madeleva Lecture in conjunction with the publication of her book, *Madeleva: A Biography*. She recently published a chapter on Sister Madeleva in *Reclaiming Catholicism: Treasures Old and New*. In addition, she has published a book-length study of the poetry of D.H. Lawrence (*The Phoenix Paradox*) that received the Chicago Women in Publishing Award for Excellence in Publishing, and she has authored a collection of interviews with biographers on the art of biography (*Life into Art*). It is her research and writing on Sister Madeleva that Gail will weave into the conversation with our panelists.

Alma Bravo will graduate in May with a bachelor of arts degree in social work and a minor in Spanish. Alma is a South Bend native who has been involved in a wide variety of community and campus activities. At Saint Mary's, she worked with the College Academy of Tutoring (CAT) program for two years as a tutor and teacher's assistant and earned the Sister Maria Concepta McDermott Award for Service in Education as a first year student. As a CAT Scholar she provided over 600 hours of service to at-risk students at Warren Primary Center, one of Saint Mary's partner Title 1 schools. In 2011 Alma received the College's Spirit of Service Award. In addition, La Casa de Amistad, which serves the Hispanic community, named her Volunteer of the Year for her work with Fiesta Michiana, the food bank, and providing interpretation and other services. Currently, Alma works at Catholic Charities in South Bend to fulfill degree requirements. She assists the adoption and pregnancy specialist and works with the ECHO (Education Creates Hope and Opportunity) program that helps girls graduate from high school when they are pregnant or have children. Alma plans to pursue a master's degree in social work and will enter graduate school with advanced standing.

Amanda Lester will graduate in May with a bachelor of arts degree in communication studies and a concentration in mass communication. In her junior year, Amada enrolled in Saint Mary's New Venture class in which students experience real-world entrepreneurship by launching a new business. With three other students, Amanda developed BTG Advertising, Inc., a full-service agency providing creative design services and on-campus publicity for businesses, school departments, and student organizations in the South Bend area. Clients pay to place advertisements on the 22" monitor that BTG Advertising installed in the shuttle bus between the Saint Mary's and Notre Dame campuses. The company is profitable and Amanda plans to continue with the business after she graduates from Saint Mary's. Along with classmate Melissa Jackson, Amanda was recently named an Orr Fellow. They are the first Saint Mary's students to receive this honor. Approximately 25 Orr Fellows are selected from a pool of nearly 2,000 soonto-be college graduates who seek to break into the professional world through paid positions with high-growth Indiana companies. Amanda will serve a two-year internship at TinderBox, a web-based proposal management solution company in Indianapolis. She will be the fifth full-time employee at the tech start-up company and the only nonengineer.

Liz Bajema graduated in 2011 with a bachelor of science degree in chemistry, a second major in religious studies, and a minor in math. She also spent a semester studying abroad on Saint Mary's Rome Program. She says her religious studies major was a crucial part of her maturation at Saint Mary's; it kept her balanced and gave her the intellectual freedom to form her own views. Liz deferred graduate school to work as a professional specialist in the chemistry department and continue assisting Professor Toni Barstis with the Paper Analytical Device (PAD) Project, a joint research project with the University of Notre Dame that seeks to provide a way for consumers to detect counterfeit drugs in the developing world. As a student, Liz traveled to Liberia to participate in a conference for small businesses and to see firsthand how hospitals, pharmacies, and clinics are dealing with the problem of counterfeit drugs. The PAD project has helped Liz to find her calling: using her skills in chemistry to meet worldwide social needs. Liz will begin a chemistry PhD program this fall at Northwestern University.

Courtney Parry graduated as valedictorian of her class in 2009 with a bachelor of arts degree in mathematics and economics. She was one of four Saint Mary's students to receive the prestigious Clare Booth Luce Scholarship in Science and Math which covered tuition, books, travel to conferences, and an internship. She served as the student trustee on the Board of Trustees and as a resident advisor. As a junior, she presented a lecture titled "Mathematics and Nature" at the spring meeting of the Indiana Section of the Mathematical Association of America (INMAA). Courtney received a master's degree with distinction from the University of Notre Dame's ESTEEM program in Engineering, Science, and Technology Entrepreneurship. Currently she is an associate with Graham Allen Partners in South Bend, focusing on new venture development and strategy in information management and cloud services. Her responsibilities include identifying new investment opportunities, conducting due diligence and market research, and managing projects.

Julia Malone Hum graduated in 2007 with a bachelor of science degree in biology. In recognition of her leadership and loyalty to Saint Mary's, she received the Lumen Christi Award at Commencement. It is the highest award the College confers upon a student. Julia was a two-year varsity basketball athlete, winning the Player's Choice Award and the Coach's Award. She was involved in a variety of activities including serving as the student trustee on the Board of Trustees, peer minister with Campus Ministry, residence hall president, and providing tours for prospective students. As part of her senior comprehensive project, Julia participated in graduate-level research at the Oral Health Research Institute in Indianapolis. Her research involved testing two types of fluoride gels on tooth decay. This led her to a statewide undergraduate research conference in Indiana and later to the national conference in San Francisco where she presented her findings. Julia is currently a PhD Candidate in the Department of Cellular Physiology at the Indiana University School of Medicine. She was recently awarded the

2012 Charles H. Turner Young Investigator Award for her research on the cellular signaling pathways by which bone responds to its external environment. She plans to finish her degree next summer and pursue a tenure track appointment at an undergraduate institution.

 Examine the art and calligraphy of The Saint John's Bible Cushwa-Leighton Library, 1st floor Hosted by Robert Hohl, librarian

The limited Heritage Edition of the handwritten and illuminated *Saint John's Bible* was given to Saint Mary's by alumna Judy Rauenhorst Mahoney '74. Saint John's Abbey and University in Collegeville, Minnesota commissioned the work. No project of this kind has been undertaken since the advent of the printing press in the 15th century. The Heritage Edition is a full-size, reproduction of *The Saint John's Bible*.

Explore The Learning Tree
 Madeleva Hall, Room 251 (near Carroll Auditorium)
 Hosted by Jayne Fogle, director

This resource center, which is open to the public, provides a variety of learning materials and educational supplies. Resources include learning games for preschoolers through 6th grade, bulletin board ideas, textbooks, children's literature books, and equipment such as a laminator, a poster printer, an Ellison machine which punches out letters and shapes, and bookbinding machines. Materials are available for a low fee to cover the cost of purchasing supplies. After your visit to The Learning Tree, tour the Education Department's suite next door.

 Learn about the cutting-edge Paper Analytical Device (PAD) research project and conduct your own PAD test
 Science Hall, 1st floor

Hosted by Toni Barstis, Professor of Chemistry, and chemistry students

The Paper Analytical Device (PAD) Project is a collaborative research program between Saint Mary's College (led by Toni Barstis, professor of chemistry) and the University of Notre Dame. In many parts of the developing world, an estimated 10 to 40 percent of medications purchased by consumers are counterfeit. The PAD project aims to provide a way for consumers to do low-tech chemical analysis on medicine to determine its effectiveness, and ultimately improve medical outcomes. Another focus of the research is the development of devices to detect iodization of salt and water quality. Conduct your own PAD test. In addition, poster presentations of chemistry and biology student research projects will be on display throughout the building.

Visit Professor Billy Ray Sandusky's art studio Moreau Hall, Room 326 Hosted by Billy Ray Sandusky

View Professor Sandusky's ambitious life-size reinterpretation of the 15th-century paintings that adorn the Brancacci Chapel in the Church of Santa Maria del Carmine in Florence, Italy. Professor Sandusky's Brancacci Project blends the bright colors and religious themes of the Italian Renaissance with familiar local backgrounds and people. Most of the models are Professor Sandusky's colleagues, friends, and family members, including President Carol Ann Mooney and her husband, George Efta.

Visit the new home of the College archives Madeleva Hall, lower level (follow signs)

Listen to a recording of Sister Madeleva. View the Sister Madeleva tribute wall down the hall from the archives in the new north entrance. The wall features the late Alice Schlesinger's portrait of Sister Madeleva, plus quotes, poetry, and two stained glass windows from the Church of Our Lady of Loretto.

View Saint Mary's collection of Norman Laliberté artwork
 Using the illustrated guide available at the Donor Appreciation registration table,
 begin your self-guided tour on the second floor of Madeleva Hall where you will see
 the spectacular "King of Kings." Continue to the lower level and then on to Spes Unica
 Hall, Haggar Hall, O'Laughlin Auditorium, and the Student Center.
 Laliberté taught at Saint Mary's from 1957-1962 and received an honorary degree from
 the College in 1982. He first gained international recognition for his creation of 88
 cloth-appliqué banners designed for the Vatican pavilion at the 1964 World's Fair. His
 paintings, prints, and sculpture appear in prestigious public and private collections such
 as the Smithsonian Institution and the Nelson A. Rockefeller Collection. Laliberté, age

87, continues to paint and exhibit his work on a regular basis.
