Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA)

<u>History</u>

The Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (MIAA) is America's oldest collegiate athletic conference.

The 2009–10 school year marks the 123rd consecutive year of operation for the NCAA Division III affiliated conference. The MIAA was founded March 24, 1888. From the very beginning, the MIAA has conducted full-season championships in multiple sports. There have been changes in some of the sports (bicycle racing and Indian club juggling have long since disappeared, and basketball did not even exist in 1888), but these changes have served to develop the MIAA into one of America's finest NCAA Division III conferences, today offering 18 sports for men and women.

The MIAA's continuity is noteworthy. Of the 13 schools that have had full membership, nine are still members—Adrian, Albion, Alma, Calvin, Hope, Kalamazoo, Olivet, Saint Mary's, and Trine*. Significantly, not one of these nine colleges has ever belonged to any other formal league. Albion and Olivet were charter members although Albion is the only member to hold continuous membership. Ex-members are Michigan State University (1888–1907), Eastern Michigan University (1892–1926), Hillsdale College (1888–1960), and Defiance College (1997–2000).

The MIAA's membership list went unchanged from 1954 until 1997 when Defiance College of Ohio and Saint Mary's College of Indiana were invited to join. It also marked the first time that the league added members outside the state of Michigan. The league stipulated, however, that the name of the conference would not change. The inaugural year of current members are: Adrian (1908), Albion (1888), Alma (1902), Calvin (1953), Hope (1926), Kalamazoo (1896), Olivet (1888), Saint Mary's (1997), and Trine (2004).

Trine University became a conference member in 2004–05 upon its acceptance as a provisional NCAA member.

MIAA in the NCAA

Since 1990, MIAA member colleges have won 10 National Division III championships. NCAA Division III history was made in 1992 when the MIAA claimed two national championships in basketball when Calvin claimed the men's title and Alma took home the women's championship. The MIAA has hosted NCAA national championship events in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's golf, men's and women's tennis, men's track, and men's and women's swimming.

MIAA Women's All-Sports Award Results

Since 1998, a trophy has been given at the conclusion of the spring sports season to the school with the highest cumulative point total in the final standings on the MIAA championships. Saint Mary's earned their highest-ever finish in the MIAA's Women's All-Sport Standings at the conclusion of the 2008–09 academic year. The Belles edged out Albion by two points to finish third in the standings that go into determining the annual Commissioner's Cup. Points are awarded based upon each MIAA school's final conference standing in each sport. With one of the best years in the 30-year history of intercollegiate athletics, the Belles claimed third among the nine institutions making up the MIAA.

The College was founded in 1844 and continues to be sponsored by the Sisters of the Holy Cross.

Saint Mary's College is one of America's Top 100 Liberal Arts Colleges, according to *U.S.News and World Report*.



LOCATION:

Although our mailing address is Notre Dame, Indiana, Saint Mary's is located next to the city of South Bend, Indiana, within walking distance of the University of Notre Dame. We are approximately 90 miles from Chicago and 160 miles from



Indianapolis. Saint Mary's is within easy access to the regional airport and interstate highway system.

EDUCATIONAL ADVANTAGES:

10:1 student-faculty ratio. Average class size is 15. Co-exchange programs with Notre Dame. Opportunities for foreign study, internships, and volunteer service.

RESIDENCE LIFE:

Approximately 80% of students live on campus in one of our five residence halls. Housing is guaranteed for four years.

THE STUDENTS:

Approximately 1,600 women from 43 states and territories and five foreign countries.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY:

Saint Mary's offers the BA, BBA, BS, BFA, and BM degrees in over 30 major areas of study. Qualified students may design their own major or earn a minor or minors in any of 45 academic areas. 2010–11 NCAA Division III Athletic Recruiting Notes



Division III athletics features student-athletes who receive no financial aid related to their athletic ability and athletic departments are staffed and funded like any other department in the university. Division III athletic departments place special importance on the impact of athletics on the participants rather than on the spectators.

The student-athlete's experience is of paramount concern. —National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA)

While it is well known that NCAA Division III student-athletes are not able to earn athletic scholarships, there are still many misunderstandings about what Division III institutions and what their athletic programs are and are not allowed to do. For instance, in spite of the lack of athletic scholarships, student-athletes at Division III institutions can and do receive financial aid and scholarships based upon financial need, academic merit, and leadership and service.

Moreover, Division III athletics provide a high level of competition while keeping the needs and experience of the student-athlete at the forefront. As such, the NCAA has put into place several rules and regulations regarding the recruitment of student-athletes by Division III members. Some of the major rules about recruiting prospective student-athletes at a Division III institution include the following:

- NCAA Division III does not require Clearinghouse registration.
- Prospects may receive printed materials at any time from NCAA Division III coaches.
- There is no limit on number or timing of phone calls or emails at the NCAA Division III level and the prospect may make calls to the coach at their own expense.
- The use of text messaging, instant messaging, or social networking Web sites by, or on behalf of, a member of the institution's athletic department staff at the NCAA Division III level for the purposes of recruitment of prospects is prohibited.
- The NCAA Division III college coach may begin to have contact with the prospect and the prospect's parents/ legal guardians off the college's campus after her junior year.
- There is no National Letter of Intent program for NCAA Division III.

Basketball Outlook

Fresh off of one of the most successful seasons in program history, the Saint Mary's basketball team will look to continue their climb to the top of the MIAA standings and show that they are contenders for a conference title in 2010.

After posting eight new school records last season and finishing second in the MIAA for their highest-ever placing, fourth-year head coach Jenn Henley will keep the ball rolling in a positive direction. She will look to a strong returning core from last year's squad and some key first-year players to fill the void left by the graduation of four seniors. The meshing of the seasoned and new players alike will help solidify the Belles as one of the top teams in the league.

Among those top returners are senior co-captain Anna Kammrath, junior co-captain Liz Wade, and sophomores Patsy Mahoney and Kelley Murphy. Kammrath, the lone senior on the team, will be the veteran leader for the Belles while coming into the season with 598 rebounds, the fourth-highest in school history. The senior has also averaged more than eight points per game over the past three seasons.

Last season, Wade emerged as one of the top point guards on both sides of the court as she led the team in assists and steals. She was also among the conference's leaders in both categories, which helped her to garner MIAA Defensive Player of the Year honors.

Mahoney and Murphy, meanwhile, had breakout freshman seasons for the Belles in 2008–09. Mahoney and Murphy are the top two returning scorers from last season's team that nearly scored 1,900 points. The pair of sophomores along with Kammrath accounted for more than 690 points a year ago.



The experienced veterans coupled with talented newcomers will be looked upon to propel Saint Mary's into the top of the MIAA in 2009–10 as the Belles look to claim the College's first conference basketball title.

The Belles continue their ascent within the MIAA.

Coach Jenn Henley

Jenn Henley returns to the court for her fourth season as head coach for the Belles with three very successful seasons behind her. In her first season as head coach, the Belles attained a 10–6 MIAA record, which represented the most conference victories since joining the league at that point. In her second season, Henley coached a Belles team that played their way to the MIAA semi–finals for a second consecutive year. Last season, she led the Belles to one of the best seasons in school history with record overall wins (17) and MIAA wins (13) while the team made their first appearance in the MIAA finals.

Prior to coming to Saint Mary's College, Henley spent five years as the head women's basketball coach at Mount Union College. Prior to her career at Mount Union, Henley served as an assistant coach at Loras College while attaining her master's degree in athletic administration, which she completed in 1998. The native of Fostoria, Ohio, played one season at Ohio Northern University until a career–ending knee injury stopped her during her freshman season. Henley earned her bachelor's degree in 1997 in both sport management and communication arts.

Henley has taught upper–level classes at Mount Union in human performance and sport management. She lives in South Bend with her husband, Brandon Werling, and son, Drew.

Recap Basketball 2008-09

In a year of "firsts", the 2008–09 Saint Mary's College basketball team set a new standard of excellence for the program. The Belles set eight new school records after completing the most successful season in the 30 year history of the sport at the College.

In what proved to be a record-setting season for Saint Mary's basketball, the squad opened the conference season with a win for the first time since joining the MIAA, but the Belles didn't stop there. A school-record 17 wins and a record 13 conference wins included a few marquee performances for the program. Not only did the Belles defeat Calvin for the first time in 29 games, but the team went on to defeat the Knights each of the three times the two teams squared off during the season.

Possibly one of the biggest wins in program history came in early January when the Belles picked up their first win over a nationally-ranked team. They defeated #1 Hope for their first MIAA win over the Flying Dutch.

The Belles hosted both the opening and semi-final rounds of the MIAA Tournament for the first time in conference history, while earning their debut appearance in the MIAA Championship contest.

At the end of the season seniors Erin Newsom and Nicole Beier, and sophomore Liz Wade were all recognized by the MIAA. Newsom was an All-MIAA First Team selection while Beier was named to the Second Team, both for the first time in their careers. Wade was named the league's Defensive Player of the Year, becoming the youngest player to earn the honor.

Swimming Outlook

Narrowly edged out of a fourth place finish at last year's MIAA Championships, the Saint Mary's swim team will look to break into the top four in conference for the first time in program history this winter.

The Belles will have to fill a few voids left by the graduation of diving record-holder Leah Bocinsky along with three other members of the class of 2009.

Headlining the Belles in 2009–10 will be senior Meredith Lierz and the sophomore duo of Audrey Dalrymple and Barbara Beidler. The three top returning Belles from last season were part of 13 new school records set a year ago. Lierz and Beidler swam the first two legs of last year's record-setting 200 and 400 freestyle relays. They are also two of the top three all-time fastest Belles to compete in the 50 freestyle.

Last season, Dalrymple became the second swimmer in school history to compete at the NCAA Division III Championships and will be looked upon to help lead other Belles toward national recognition and excellence.

Rejoining the team after spending the fall semester abroad will be Megan Price and Katie Donovan, who also had breakout freshman seasons a year ago. The two along with Beidler and Lierz set the school record in the 400 freestyle relay last winter.

Second year head coach Alicia Dombkowski and her coaching staff will be looking for standout performances this year from veterans and first-year athletes alike. Expectations are high, and the Belles are up for the challenge.

The Saint Mary's swim team will look to break into the top four in conference for the first time in program history this winter.

Alicia Dombkowski begins her second year as head coach for the Belles swim team with high hopes and great expectations for her talented squad. Prior to being named head coach Dombkowski served as the Belles' assistant coach for two seasons. Her coaching talent and experience has already been a great asset to the Saint Mary's program. Even so, her coaching career at Saint Mary's is simply part of a greater tradition.

Dombkowski is a member of the Saint Mary's class of 2002. She graduated with a bachelor's of business administration degree with a concentration in marketing as well as a minor in mathematics. Dombkowski was a three year letter winner for the Belles swimming squad for which she swam mostly distance freestyle and back-stroke events. She assisted in setting two college records in relay events and was named the squad's MVP during the 1998–99 season.

In addition to her coaching duties, Dombkowski continues to serve as the Director of the Northern Indiana Cancer Research Consortium. She has served in that role since Summer 2008. She and her husband, Ryan, reside in South Bend with their infant son Reece.

Recap Swimming 2008-09

Guided by first year head coach and Saint Mary's alumna Alicia Dombkowski, numerous records fell and the Belles had representation at the NCAA Division III Championships as the Saint Mary's College swimming and diving team completed one of the best seasons in program history.

From the start, the young faces of the program propelled the team's success. Freshmen Audrey Dalrymple and Eva Cavadini made an early splash among MIAA teams. The pair turned in top times in six individual events in a win over Alma. Senior Melissa Gerbeth proved the season was not all about freshman talent. The two-time, All-MIAA performer coasted to first place finishes in the 500 and 1000 freestyle events against Kalamazoo in January.

The MIAA Swimming and Diving Championships were hosted at Rolfs Aquatic Center at the University of Notre Dame from February 19–21. It was the first time the league championships were hosted in South Bend. The Belles' performances were outstanding. Six school records were broken day one; four more school records fell on day two. Dalrymple broke the school record in the 100 breaststroke in the morning and again in the evening finals. She finished third and earned a B cut time for the NCAA Championships. The Belles set five more school records on day three; 15 school records in 20 possible events were set. Freshman Barbara Beidler set school records in each of her seven events.

Eleven Belles helped set school records during the MIAA Championships. Beidler, Cavadini, and Dalrymple combined for eight individual and four relay records. Dalrymple's record-breaking 200 breaststroke was the ninth fastest in the nation and won a trip to the NCAA Division III Championships. Dalrymple set another school record at the NCAA Championships in the 400 individual medley to wrap up the season.



Coach Erin Sullivan

Erin Sullivan is in her fifth season at the helm of the Belles softball program. During the 2006 campaign she guided Saint Mary's to their most wins in school history (28) while posting a third place finish in MIAA play. In 2007, Sullivan's squad finished the season with the highest winning percentage in program history with a .735 clip (25–9 record).

The 2008 Belles squad had their highest finish in MIAA play ever as the team finished the regular season in second place with a record-high 12 wins. Last spring, the program had their fourth consecutive 20+ win season. During Sullivan's tenure, the Belles have had four pitchers throw six no-hitters. Moreover, Sullivan has coached seven All-MIAA players, an MIAA MVP, an MIAA Batting Champion, three NFCA All-Region athletes, over 20 NFCA Scholar Athletes, and an All-American in four seasons.

Sullivan is a 2004 alumna of Saint Mary's where she was a four-year starter. During her senior year she captained the softball team to their first ever MIAA Softball Tournament Championship. She was the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association Batting Champion and the Offensive Player of the Year in 2004.

Erin was a National Fastpitch Coaches Association Academic All-American for 2003 and 2004.

Recap Softball 2009

Each season under head coach Erin Sullivan, the Saint Mary's softball team has earned at least 20 wins. The 2009 season was no different as the team amassed 22 victories last spring. Each of Sullivan's teams has boasted at least a collective slugging percentage above .400 with the squad sporting a .441 slugging percentage.

The Belles' success was propelled through the season by a combination of young and veteran players alike. Freshman pitcher Angela Gillis fired a no-hitter against Goshen to become the fourth pitcher in the past four seasons to accomplish the feat. The Belles also had one of the best defensive first basemen to play for Saint Mary's in Katie Rashid, whose career .987 fielding percentage ranks among the best in program history.

Complementing the defense, the Belles had three players with season batting averages at or above .400 for the first time in over a decade. Leading the way once again for Saint Mary's was outfielder Ashley Peterson. The junior repeated as a First Team All-MIAA and NFCA Central Region First Team honoree with her second consecutive season with more than 50 hits and a .500 batting average. Peterson was among the top 25 of all NCAA Division III players statistically in batting average, slugging percentage, toughest to strikeout, and on-base percentage.

Joining Peterson atop the batting average standings were senior catcher Ashley Fusaro and freshman outfielder Lauren Enavati. Fusaro finished her final season with a .404 batting average and a career-best 42 hits. Enayati, meanwhile, ended her freshman campaign with a .400 average while scoring a team-high 27 runs.



Tennis Outlook

After a successful season under then-first year head coach Dale Campbell, the Saint Mary's tennis team is looking to reach new heights under Campbell's guidance and return to the top of the MIAA in 2010.

The team captured 10 dual match wins and a fifth place finish in the MIAA last spring. This season the Belles will strive to break into the top three of the conference for the first time since their MIAA Championship season in 2004.

Under Campbell's leadership, the Belles return several key players from last season who will be held responsible for dictating the team's success this spring. Among those returners from 2009 are two-time All-MIAA honorees Jillian Hurley and Camille Gebert.

Hurley, a junior who earned All-MIAA First Team accolades last spring, has amassed nearly 30 dual match victories in just two seasons at Saint Mary's. Gebert, meanwhile, was an All-MIAA Second Team honoree in 2009 and is quickly closing in on her 50th individual dual match victory of her career. The lone senior enters

the season on a twelve-match winning streak. The two have also teamed up for more than 20 victories at number one doubles for the Belles in the past two seasons.

Joining Hurley and Gebert in anticipated victory will be Jessica Kozinski. The talented junior had a strong sophomore season by earning eleven individual dual match wins last spring.

Led by a talented and experienced junior class, as well as a successful senior leader, the Saint Mary's tennis team will look to be a top contender in conference play this upcoming spring.

Dale Campbell will begin his second season as the head tennis coach at Saint Mary's College in the 2009–10 school year. In his first season at the helm of the program, Campbell led the tennis team to their fourth consecutive 10+ dual-win season.

Campbell brings a wealth of experience to the program as he has been teaching tennis for more than 20 years. Certified by the USPTA as a tennis professional in 1988, he served as the head tennis professional at the South Bend Racquet Club for 10 years. During his time there, Campbell instructed several district, sectional, and nationally ranked players. From 1999 until recently, Campbell had served as the managing director and was owner of the Lakeland Athletic Club in Niles, Michigan. Currently, he is the general manager of Signal Point Club in Niles. A 1988 graduate of Central Methodist College, Campbell was a number one singles player for the Eagles. He served as a captain for his college team and was named team MVP.

Campbell resides in Granger, Ind., with his wife Christy and their three children, Avery, Paxson, and Alayna.

Recap Tennis 2009

Under the guidance of first year head coach Dale Campbell, the Saint Mary's tennis team earned their fourth consecutive 10-plus win season.

With eight sophomores and one junior on the 2009 squad, the Belles opened up the season in Orlando, Florida by going 4–4 on the week with wins over NAIA squads from St. Francis (III.) and Aquinas (Mich.). The resilient young group battled throughout the course of the season by taking at least one point in all but two of their matches all year.

The Belles closed out the regular season and headed into the MIAA Tournament on a roll by taking commanding wins over Adrian and Olivet. With the two league wins, the Belles entered the conference tournament as the fifth-seeded team to set up a rematch with MIAA foe Albion.

Through the first six flights of the first-round match for both teams, the Belles and Brits were sitting at a 3–3 deadlock.

Albion, however, emerged with the win to push the Belles into the consolation bracket of the tournament. Saint Mary's came right back and picked up wins against Adrian and Olivet for the second time within a week to earn fifth place in the tournament.

For the eighth time since joining the MIAA in 1997, the Belles had honorees on both the First and Second Teams. Sophomore Jillian Hurley, who played #1 singles this season, was tabbed as a First Team All-MIAA honoree after earning All-MIAA Second Team honors a year ago. Junior Camille Gebert, meanwhile, was a Second Team All-MIAA selection this season. It was the second All-MIAA honor for the junior as she was named to the First Team last spring.

With the accolades earned by Hurley and Gebert, a Saint Mary's tennis player has been named to an All-MIAA team 25 times since 1998.

The Saint Mary's Athletic Department and student-athletes take an interest



in helping to raise awareness and increase support for those affected by breast cancer. The American Volleyball College Association

and the Women's Basketball Coaching Association each sponsor annual events to help increase awareness and support for the cause on high school and college campuses across the nation.

Last year, the volleyball and basketball teams raised over \$3,000 for local breast cancer awareness and survivor groups.



Student-Athlete Advisory Committee

"The mission of the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee is to enhance the total student-athlete experience by promoting opportunity, protecting student-athlete welfare, and fostering a positive studentathlete image."

In 1989, the NCAA adopted the idea to have an association-wide Student Athlete Advisory Committee, better known as SAAC, to review and protect the welfare of student-athletes. At Saint Mary's, the SAAC goes above and beyond the call to serve as a liaison between athletes and the athletic administration each year. The SAAC sponsors holiday-themed parties for various groups in the South Bend community. Each team also performs an on- and off-campus community service project each year. In the past, teams have done several different community service projects, which have included



reading to local elementary school classes, raising money and participating in the St. Margaret's House Winter Walk, and helping clean up the Saint Mary's campus.

Faculty Advisors

Each varsity team has a faculty advisor who plays an active role in monitoring the academic progress of studentathletes while supporting the Belles on the sidelines. The faculty advisor helps to serve as a liaison between academic programs and the athletic department and administration. Each advisor makes themselves available to assist any student-athlete with academic issues, such as declaring a major or a minor, or with scheduling and keeping up with work in and out of season.

CHAMPS/Life Skills

Saint Mary's College was selected among a number of applicants to join the CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success)/Life Skills program that focuses on assisting student-athletes in areas of academics, athletics, personal development, career development, and community service. Head softball coach Erin Sullivan, an alumna and former Saint Mary's student-athlete, is directing the Saint Mary's effort in hopes of enriching the present and future careers of Saint Mary's student-athletes in and out of the playing arena. It will be among Sullivan's responsibilities to monitor the academic progress of the student-athletes at the College through individual mentoring.

Originally implemented in 1994 by the NCAA Foundation, the program has grown from 46 institutions to more than 650 and is now overseen by the NCAA Education Outreach staff.

Athlete of the Week

For the past three years, the Saint Mary's College athletic department honors an outstanding student-athlete each week as the Saint Mary's Athlete of the Week for their various contributions to the College as well as the athlete's team and the athletic department.

Athletic Hall of Fame

In 1993, former Athletic Director JoAnn Nester created the Saint Mary's College Athletic Hall of Fame to recognize outstanding Saint Mary's athletes, coaches, and athletic administrators for their numerous contributions to Saint Mary's athletics. Since the inception of the Hall of Fame 15 years ago, 26 individuals and one team have been inducted.

Team Chaplains

Each varsity team at Saint Mary's has one very special fan that helps to foster the bond between the College and the Sisters of the Holy Cross. The team chaplain initiative pairs up a sister with a varsity team. Each sister passionately and vigilantly cheers on her team from the sidelines while also sparking an interest with other sisters at the convent.

Belles Athletic Facilities



Soccer Field

Over the past five seasons at the Saint Mary's College soccer field, the Belles have posted a 17–9–2 record in league matches. In 2007, the Belles recorded three shutouts in their seven home contests. Nine different players have earned first- or second-team all-conference honors while calling the Saint Mary's College soccer field home.

Softball Field

The Belles put together their fourth consecutive winning season at the Saint Mary's softball field in 2009. The softball team has won 34 home contests since the 2006 season, including 14 doubleheader sweeps. Last season, Angela Gillis threw the third no-hitter at the Saint Mary's softball field since 2006.

Tennis Courts

The Belles have experienced a great deal of success on their home courts. Last season, the tennis team put together their fourth consecutive season with at least 10 dual match victories. Since joining the MIAA over a decade ago, the Saint Mary's tennis courts have been home to nine different players who have earned either first or second team allconference honors as well as three MIAA Sue Little Award winners.

Angela Athletic Facility

Since its dedication more than 30 years ago, Angela Athletic Facility has served as the home of the Saint Mary's College basketball and volleyball teams.

In the past three seasons, the volleyball and basketball squads have combined to win 37 home competitions while hosting six MIAA Tournament contests over that same span. During the 2008–09 school year, the basketball team won 10 home contests, including the first MIAA Tournament Semifinal contest played at Angela Athletic Facility.

Over the years, Angela Athletic Facility has also played host to the College's former gymnastics and fencing teams. In 1990, the Facility was the site of the NCAA Division I Championship for women's fencing through the University of Notre Dame.

Nich Hoover, ATC

Nich Hoover joined the Saint Mary's College staff during the summer of 2008.

Prior to coming to the College, he spent the previous three years working with the Saint Joseph Regional Medical Center in South Bend, where he was placed at South Bend Clay High School as an on-site athletic trainer. A member of several medical societies, including the American College of Sports Medicine and the American Orthopedic Society for Sports Medicine, Dr. Simons is a co-director of the South Bend Sports Medicine Fellowship.

Women's Health Center




