UPON REFLECTION

While taking long walks on the beach this summer, watching and feeling the wonderful waves gently embrace my legs, I reflected on the conversations I had with students as the year was ending. I was profoundly struck by the students' search for knowledge, their strong relationships with peers and mentors, and their love of learning. All of these things help to form their values, attitudes, and behaviors. These students are witnesses to Father Moreau's philosophy of education, "We will always place education side by side with instruction; the mind will not be cultivated at the expense of the heart" (*Circular Letter, 36, 1849*).

As I watched the water change from calm to dangerous over my days at the beach, I realized the students' reflections revealed that even in their violent storms, they experienced what it means to let go and trust that they are not alone. They see Christ in others—a peer, a Sister of the Holy Cross, a professor, an upperclasswoman, a member of the Saint Mary's staff, or even a stranger. They discovered the importance of community.

Students told me that learning happened when they could ask good questions, delve further into important issues, explore new ways of doing, and learn to trust. In their willingness to respond "yes" in areas of the unknown, they more deeply discovered their gifts, their passions, and their voices to go out into the world. Students quoted Sister Madeleva about the importance of an education that embraces discovery, "discovery of yourselves, discovery of the universe and your place in it. *(Conversations with Cassandra.)*

As they told their stories of research, teaching in the classroom, working as a nurse with the Sisters in Uganda, eating lunch with the Latino children, the death of a parent, failure in their major, sitting with young homeless pregnant women, or what it meant to hold their diploma in their hands, I was reminded of the quote from Mother Pauline, "Education stands for the highest development of mind and heart, and aims to make its students women of ideas rather than women of mere accomplishments, to bring them into personal relation with the wider worlds, larger life, by placing before them the truth as it may be apprehended, truth in literature, history, science and art" (*The College History Series, Saint Mary's College*).

When I recently accepted the position of vice president for mission, one of my main goals was to find ways for members of the Saint Mary's community to tell their stories of a Holy Cross education. Many of you, as you read this issue of the *Courier*, will be reminded of your own story and how your education of mind and heart continues to make this world a better place. I would love to hear your story and what it means for you to be a member of the Saint Mary's community in the world today. How are you continuing the legacy of the Sisters of the Holy Cross?

Belles' Closet

Belles' Closet is a new student organization that collects clothing for men, women, and children who are survivors of sexual assault. Brandyn Blosser '03, social work faculty and director of client services for Area 2 Agency on Aging with Real Services in South Bend, started the organization with her social work class.

After they've surrendered their clothes as evidence, survivors of sexual assault must wear home whatever the hospital can scrounge up, likely scrubs or items from the lost and found if a friend or family member isn't able to bring clothing.

"At a time when they may feel helpless and robbed of their dignity, we want to show them that they are still being cared for, that they really do matter," says Morgan Carroll '15, one of the campus coordinators for Belles' Closet.

Belles' Closet held a campus clothing drive, accepting new items of clothing in all sizes for men, women, and children. They collected five large boxes of clothing, and several cash donations.

Belles' Closet donated the items to Saint Joseph Regional Medical Center of Mishawaka. Just one day after dropping off the clothing, a nurse told Blosser she was finally able to provide new, correctly sized clothing for a young survivor. "It is heartbreaking to know there was a need but we are comforted to know that Belles' Closet could meet that need."

Shakespeare, Petunias, and E. Coli By Adrienne Latson

Summer research at Saint Mary's

"Literature and drama, especially timeless works like Shakespeare's, have an uncanny ability to shine a mirror on the people who interact with it," says Jennifer Vosters '16. Vosters is visiting theatres, reading reviews, and meeting with directors and actors to evaluate the last 30 years of performance history of Shakespeare's Roman plays—*Julius Caesar, Antony and Cleopatra, Coriolanus,* and *Titus Andronicus*. She and Christopher Cobb, associate professor of English, are conducting this research thanks to a Student Independent Study and Research (SISTAR) grant. Summer Research Grants

The Marjorie A. Neuhoff '61 Summer Science Research Community is a grant funded by the bequest of Marjorie A. Neuhoff '61, and is one of the first noticeable benefits to stem from the Faith Always, Action Now campaign. The grant encourages collaboration among the sciences and is available to biology, chemistry, or physics faculty and students to conduct research for at least 10 weeks.

Student Independent Study and Research (SISTAR) grants support teams of one faculty member and one student to work collaboratively for eight weeks in the summer, between the student's junior and senior years. The grants are open to scholarly or creative projects, and the participants may do separate projects that support or complement the other's work. Established in 1991, the SISTAR grants include the Maryjeanne R. Burke and Daughters SISTAR, which is reserved for pretenure faculty.

"We're interested in learning about the Midwestern theatre community when it comes to Shakespeare; what people value, what they enjoy seeing and producing onstage, and how the Roman plays have fit (or not fit) into that mold," Vosters explains. She and Cobb will gather data and make meaningful conclusions about the local community's values, politics, and aesthetics.

An integral part of a student's college education, research is often associated with the sciences. But as Vosters illustrates, along with fellow Belles conducting research on campus this summer, members of all disciplines conduct valuable research that contributes to their field. Most of these students will use this summer research in their senior comprehensives, or "comps," one of the unique features of a Saint Mary's education. (See the story on page 8.)

"To me, this is very important work, perhaps not with the urgency of researching vaccines or energy conservation, but with results that help illuminate our own community and how it has explored and defined itself through the arts in our lifetimes," Vosters says.



Fellow student-faculty researchers are on campus representing other disciplines. Together, Cassie Majetic, assistant professor of biology; four biology majors; Kathryn Haas, assistant professor of chemistry/physics; and one chemistry major comprise a Marjorie A. Neuhoff Summer Science Research Community. They're studying phenotypic plasticity in plant traits and DNA. "Phenotypic plasticity, or epigenetics, is the phenomenon in which certain genes get turned on or off based on the environment, leading to differences in trait expression, or phenotype," explains Majetic.

The project is studying six cultivars of *Petunia*, exposing each to different levels of nitrogen fertilizer and examining whether floral traits (number and size of flowers), leaf and vegetative traits (plant height and leaf number), and floral chemistry (scent and color) change in response. They're also studying whether these possible changes affect the way pollinators visit the plants.

The researchers grew petunias and set up a "lab" on the grass between Haggar and Lake Marian, and they recorded the number and behavior of pollinators on the plants for two hours a day for several weeks. The plants attracted pollinators, sure, and the students attracted attention. "We pretty much didn't go a day without someone walking by and asking us what we were doing staring at flowers for the majority of the day," says Olivia Beck '16.

Each student is in charge of a different section of the research, giving her practical experience in both researching and research planning. For example, Beck's component is the pollinators' reactions. Katelyn Beam '16 conducted research on past phenotypic plasticity in vegetative characteristics of plants and coordinated the assessment of leaf and vegetative traits.



The amount of experience students receive from hands-on research is exponential. "As a biology student, I have science labs every semester, but experiments follow the textbook and generally we know what is going to happen in the end," says Beam. Elizabeth Stachnik '16 agrees. "Research is different from classroom learning in the sense that you are not given any answers, instructions, or asked to memorize facts. Rather, you must problem solve along the way, applying the skills you have learned as a scientist to the work you are doing in the hopes of answering your initial question." Vosters' experience is similar. "This grant is giving me the opportunity to develop other skills: interviewing, independent investigation, persistence, asking questions, and collaborating with a scholar already established in the field," she says.

One purpose of research is to address worldwide issues such as water contamination. According to the World Health Organization, 88 percent of the total diarrheal diseases in the world are caused by unsafe drinking water. Reena Khadka, assistant professor of biology, Adriana Ledesma '16, and Meghan Cusack '16 are developing a paper analytical device (PAD) that will determine the likelihood of contamination in a water source. A colorimetric device, it changes color when the sugar substrate is metabolized by *Escherichia coli*, coliform bacteria that are highly indicative of fecal contaminants in the water. The research team intends to develop a more economical and easier to use PAD than is currently commercially available.

The link between water contamination and healthcare is clear, and this research group is doing their part to manage this global concern. "Healthcare professionals get the privilege of caring for people who have been affected. I would love to be a part of using my knowledge of microbiology to care for the sick," says Ledesma.

From insights into political and societal views to detecting water contaminants to plant changes due to fertilizer, our faculty and students are making a difference in the world, one research group at a time.

The Senior Comps A Saint Mary's

Capstone Experience

Kiera Johnsen '16 grew up watching the news with her parents every night and the headline show *60 Minutes* every Sunday. A communication studies and political science double major from Costa Mesa, CA, Johnsen remains fascinated by the role the media plays in politics.

"Many news stories broken by *60 Minutes* and other outlets have become catalysts for change in our society. I came to realize how powerful the media is, how it influences society...It made me want a career which was either a part of or influential on the political process, whether through directly working in public policy or as a news producer or journalist," says Johnsen. That led her to her double major and its upcoming culmination in her senior comprehensive project.

A rising senior, Johnsen will complete her senior comprehensive, or "senior comp," in communications studies. According to the College Bulletin, her major requires that she complete this senior capstone experience in "one of two sequences of courses reflecting the main intellectual traditions of the communication discipline: 1) research methods, which explores social-scientific and qualitative methods of inquiry, or 2) rhetorical criticism, focusing on the critical analysis of all types of public communication." Johnsen chose the former and is embarking on a research project that investigates the ways in which Internet media sites like BuzzFeed impact young voters.

That's how a random perusal of a BuzzFeed article became the topic of Johnsen's senior comprehensive research project. Through the project, she will not only satisfy her own curiosity, she will demonstrate her ability to apply both qualitative and quantitative research skills as well as her capabilities as a writer and critical thinker. The College Bulletin, a detailed outline of majors and minors and their requirements, makes mention of a senior thesis as early as the 1929-30 academic year. Throughout Saint Mary's history, this "thesis" has developed from a traditional exam or term paper to the individualized experience it is today. However, since the College's early history, the senior thesis, now senior comp, has always required students to apply the concepts they've learned in their major area of study and demonstrate their ability to use that knowledge practically. That goal hasn't changed.

"Over the years the format of the senior comprehensives has changed as the goals and outcomes for the majors have evolved," says Susan Vanek '70, associate dean for advising in Academic Affairs and First Year Studies. "In all cases, the senior comprehensive is considered a capstone experience. At the end of their major, students apply their critical thinking and communicative skills to demonstrate a deeper understanding of their major."

Vanek, an alumna who completed a Spanish major, recalls writing a long research paper and taking an oral exam as part of her own senior comp experience. "When my classmates and I were first-year students, upper-class students told us not to worry about the senior comprehensive because it would be eliminated by the time we were seniors. At the time I thought it would be great to have one less graduation requirement. In retrospect, however, I realize that the knowledge and skills I gained from this experience were important. I am glad to see that the senior comprehensive continues to be a valuable part of a Saint Mary's education."

Senior comp requirements vary according to major, but all involve practical application of a student's knowledge, writing abilities, and research and critical thinking. For example, an education major is required to complete her student teaching as well as a comprehensive teaching portfolio including unit and lesson plans. The education major is demonstrating her knowledge, in addition to gaining valuable hands-on teaching experience. She'll also leave Saint Mary's with the portfolio, which contains materials she can put to use in her first year of teaching after graduation.

Throughout their coursework, nursing majors complete valuable clinical experience in hospitals, long-term care facilities, health departments, and community settings under the supervision of qualified faculty members. The capstone experience is an exam during the final semester of their senior year. The exam serves as the nursing senior comp. It is computer-based, simulating the NCLEX-RN, the National Council Licensure Examination for registered nurses.

A religious studies major takes a two-part exam consisting of three open-source essays each. The College Bulletin explains: "The exam tests the student's breadth of knowledge in religious studies and her facility in theological reflection. One part covers historical materials, texts, and issues...the second examines contemporary sources..." Students prepare their bibliography in consultation with their academic advisor and then work with two members of the religious studies faculty to discuss the texts and prepare their responses.

Students in most majors work individually with a faculty advisor, whether their comp features an exam, research paper, or other project. Chemistry major Jennifer Connell '16 is conducting the research for her senior comp this summer. Connell's project is titled "Detecting Methylated versus Unmethylated DNA using Ultra High Performance Liquid Chromatography-Mass

Senior comp topics are as varied as our more than 30 College majors. Some current and past projects include:

- The Effect of Media Exposure on Attitudes about Individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (psychology)
- The Goldilocks Effect: What Concentration of Linalool is the Most Effective for Attracting Pollinators to Hesperis matronalis? (biology)
- Femininity through the perception of appearance and gender roles (studio art)
- Attacking Masculinity: An Examination of Hegemonic Masculinity in Two Television Series (sociology)
- A Survey on the Quality and Benefits of an Older Adult Guardianship Program (social work)
- The Effects of International Monetary Fund Loans: Gross National Product and Inequality (political science)

Spectrometry." It involves extracting plant DNA in order to explain physical changes caused by different amounts of fertilizer.

Her faculty advisor, chemistry professor Kathryn Haas, has been a valued influence throughout the experience. "Professor Haas has been there to celebrate the small victories I have experienced in research and has guided me through the problem solving," says Connell, a rising senior from Grand Rapids, MI. "She has given me constructive feedback on the writing I have done for this project and overall has been a wonderful source of guidance throughout the experience."

Natasha Flores '12, recently left her position as chief operating officer at Janus Motorcycles in Goshen, IN, to teach math and coach soccer in the Goshen Community Schools. She is also working on her master's in business administration in a program with Arizona State University. As a Saint Mary's senior Flores studied the mathematics behind climate change. A problem-solver by nature, Flores says, "I have a desire to make the environment better for all future generations that will live on this planet. I believe the best place to start is understanding what the problem is and define the variables we can change to fix the issues." Her senior comp was a natural expression of her passion for sustainability and her mathematical approach.

Much of Flores' project involved deriving the equations that drive climate studies today. The academic research experience proved useful as she went on to pursue her master's of science in engineering, science, and technology entrepreneurship at the University of Notre Dame. In fact, her investigative and problem-solving skills prove useful every day in her work and her MBA studies. "I apply [them] in my professional life by constantly digging deeper in all subjects. When there is a problem at work, I do all research possible. After that I try to find a solution and determine the best way to clearly present it to my boss/team," says Flores. The lessons she learn while completing the senior comp stay with her today. "It taught me about the subject and about my abilities. I learned a lot about who I am and what I want to do in the future," she says.

As Johnsen works to complete the research for her comp on media impact on voters, she says she is gaining a greater appreciation for and perspective on how much work goes into the entire process. "This process, while long and stressful, excites me because I'm working on a topic I love. It is something I find really fascinating and really am passionate about. I am so excited to discover what the results will be and to present my work in December," says Johnsen. She has learned an important life lesson too. "This entire senior comp process validates the idea that some of the greatest rewards come from things that are difficult." In the completion of the senior comp, Johnsen and each Saint Mary's senior prepare for a career and a life that makes a positive difference in the world. They learn valuable critical thinking skills, collaboration, and problem-solving. And, along the way, they complete a process-be it research, writing, presenting, teaching, or testing—that also leads to self discovery.

Commencement HONOREES

Valedictorian: Sarah Miller '15

The valedictorian for the Class of 2015, Miller is a music major and dance minor from Carmel, Indiana. She is currently in the process of auditioning for graduate schools

and plans to pursue a master's degree in vocal performance.

Having loved science from a young age, Miller originally thought she might become a medical doctor, but her love of music and her passion for vocals took over. She flourished at Saint Mary's under the direction of music professor Laurel Thomas who became her "mentor, teacher, and inspiration."

Thomas celebrates Miller's self-discovery at Saint Mary's and her success as an accomplished student of music. Miller's decision to attend Saint Mary's was in part due to what she calls the College's perfect pairing of the voice and dance programs, the opportunities to study science, and the sisterhood that is immediately recognizable when visiting.

"I absolutely loved all of the girls I met when I toured Saint Mary's, and immediately knew it was were I wanted to be," says Miller. "The opportunities are endless, and I encourage current and incoming students to not only take advantage of learning in the classroom, but also from your peers outside of that environment." Miller did just that, as a member of the Saint Mary's Dance Team, as well as being involved with the choir, musicals, and operas, and spending a semester abroad in Rome, Italy.

Outstanding Senior: Kaitlyn Rabach '15



The Outstanding Senior award recognizes a member of the senior class who exemplifies the spirit and values of the College. The recipient is recognized for living her faith, and is distinguished by scholarship, leadership, and outstanding dedication to Saint Mary's—as demonstrated through participation in both curricular and extracurricular activities.

The Alumnae Association Board of Directors chooses the recipient from nominees submitted by students, faculty, and staff. Honoree Kaitlyn Rabach '15, from Muskegon, Michigan, is a political science major with minors in gender and women's studies and global studies.

Rabach was honored at the Alumnae-Senior Champagne Brunch as part of Senior Week festivities leading up to Commencement.

She offered this thought in her remarks to the Class of 2015: "Because of our all-women's, faith-based education, we have developed the tools to be confident leaders. We learned to be strong in the classroom, and now we're ready for wherever our career takes us in years to come. During our time here, no matter if we spent our energy pursuing the sciences or the humanities, we saw women doing great things. We did great things." Rabach's extracurricular involvement includes four years of many, varied posts, notably: serving as the Saint Mary's editor to *The Observer*; working in the Center for Women's Intercultural Leadership (CWIL) as both a lead peer mentor and a student coordinator for two summers with the Study of the U.S. Institute (SUSI) a U.S. Department of State supported program at the College; interning at ILive2Lead International in Washington, D.C., where she had the opportunity to report on the 2014 "Women in the World Conference" for The Huffington Post and ILive2Lead blog; and interning in the South Bend mayor's office and for the Michigan Women Win Political Action Committee (PAC), and as a staff member for Cathy Forbes's Michigan Senate campaign.

Lumen Christi: Samantha Grady '15



The Lumen Christi Award is the highest student honor at Saint Mary's, awarded to an outstanding Christian woman. The recipient is traditionally someone who has excelled in leadership and loyalty to Saint Mary's and whose presence has had a profound effect on the College community. The name of the recipient is not revealed until her name is read at Commencement.

"When my name was read I could hardly believe what I had heard. The description for the Lumen Christi award was the description of every Saint Mary's woman I know. To be recognized with this award is quite humbling," says the honoree Samantha Grady '15, a political science and religious studies double major from Corrales, New Mexico. "At Saint Mary's I truly sought to be like the people around me. I'm very thankful to Saint Mary's for forming me over the last four years." Grady was recognized as an excellent student and woman of faith known for her leadership, love of learning, and concern for others.

A four-year varsity volleyball athlete, Grady recognizes the importance of athletics, health, and wellness, and what it means to be part of a team as a woman of faith. She participated in a women's spirituality group, Friends with Sisters at the convent, and served as a Eucharistic minister and lector. She also studied abroad, led retreats, and coached girls basketball and tennis.

Grady thanked her parents for their support. "They have inspired me by their love, patience, and guidance. They taught me the value of faith and to use that as an anchor. They gifted me with five wonderful siblings and through that instilled in me my first love of community and others."

Grady will go on to Loyola University Chicago to pursue a master's degree in theological studies with a minor in education.

Saint Catherine Medal: Haleigh Ehmsen '16



Haleigh Ehmsen '16, a communication studies and English writing and literature double major from Mount Vernon, Iowa, thought she was attending Honors Convocation on Sunday, May 3, to write a story for *The Courier*. She had no idea that the occasion, an honors assembly for seniors and faculty, would also celebrate her contributions to the College.

Saint Mary's College President Carol Ann Mooney presented Ehmsen, a junior, with the Saint Catherine Medal, an award recognizing a sophomore or junior who demonstrates high standards of personal excellence and scholarship and contributes to the College community in the spirit of Christian leadership. The award commemorates Saint Catherine of Alexandria, the patron saint of scholars (especially women scholars). Kappa Gamma Pi, the National Catholic Honor Society, sponsors the award.

"I am so honored and filled with gratitude for the wonderful opportunities I have had at Saint Mary's," says Ehmsen.

Ehmsen's Catholic identity is an inseparable part of every commitment she has made throughout her college career. 
South Bend community. Kominkiewicz has been a member of the Saint Mary's faculty for 18 years.

ALUMNA ACHIEVEMENT AWARD Dr. Anne Connolly '80

Dr. Anne Connolly '80 earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Saint Mary's, graduating *summa cum laude* and receiving the "Mother Rose Elizabeth Award for service and academic excellence in biology." In her senior year, she was the first president of the Beta Beta Biological Honor Society. Anne earned her medical degree from Indiana University. Seeing with the Difference

Saint Mary's students help South Bend woman leave legacy By Amy H. Smessaert

Who knew that "a last wish before I die" request would forge a bond of love among two Saint Mary's College students, a Sister of the Holy Cross, and a South Bend woman living with AIDS.

It all started with Sheila Muhammad's desire to leave a written legacy for her family about her challenges and triumphs since she was diagnosed with AIDS 25 years ago. "I wanted to leave something for my kids about my life and help others who have the virus and are dealing with the struggles I went through," says Muhammad, a widow with three children and six grandchildren. She is also blind, having lost her eyesight in 1995 due to CMV, or cytomegalovirus, which she may have contracted because of her compromised immune system.

"I try to keep positive. I put one foot in front of the other. My motto: 'Don't let anyone tell you that you can't do something.' I try everything. I am a fighter," Muhammad says. "I've been employed (by Sodexo) at Holy Cross College for 12 years. I wash dishes. I try to be as normal as I can be. Losing my sight does not mean I lose my ability to work."

When Muhammad expressed her wish to share her life's story, her longtime friend Holy Cross Sister Linda Bellemore "got into gear" to find someone to help Muhammad. That someone turned out to be the team of Morgan Carroll of Fort Wayne, Indiana, who graduated from Saint Mary's in May with a degree in communication studies, and Faye Kennedy of Stillwater, Minnesota, who graduated in 2014 with a degree in business administration. Both were students of Marne Austin, assistant professor of communication studies. The two learned about chronicling oral histories in one of her courses. When Austin alerted her class that a Sister of the Holy Cross had a service project for someone to document Muhammad's story, Carroll and Kennedy promptly volunteered.

"The students' immediate, positive response to this invitation was indicative of women who know and believe that life, learning, growing, faith, and service are their personal values and why they are at Saint Mary's College," says Sister Linda, who first met Muhammad through AIDS Ministries/AIDS Assist in South Bend.

Carroll wanted to help Muhammad for another personal and compelling reason. She was born with a condition that could have left her blind, if not for surgeries at Riley Hospital for Children in Indianapolis.

"This experience has put my personal situation into perspective and helped me appreciate the vision I have been blessed with. Sheila is truly a role model in the way she lives her life despite the many challenges she faces," Carroll says. "I deeply appreciate all that she has done for me."

The six month long service project for Muhammad began shortly after Carroll and Kennedy volunteered. "Sheila would talk and we would record her on our phones. Then we transcribed the conversations and compiled her story," Carroll explains. "It was important for the three of us to get to know one another."

"I really loved meeting the girls and telling them my story. I love them for not judging me. I know I have them as friends for life," says Muhammad. "If my story gets published in a book, they will get special mention in the credits."

Carroll describes the impact the project—and Muhammad—has had on her life. "Each time we left Sheila's house, we got a deeper understanding of how amazing she is. Her inspiring attitude and outlook lifted my spirits. She is one of the biggest inspirations in my time at Saint Mary's."

"Sheila has always kept me grounded," echoes Sister Linda. "She sees obstacles and asks, 'How do I get around it?' She has such a positive outlook on life—she lives it."

Sister Linda recalls the moment when Carroll and Kennedy presented Muhammad with the finished product. "Witnessing Sheila's excitement that her greatest wish for her anticipated short life was fulfilled, and hearing her expressed gratitude for a task that she had been unable to accomplish herself, confirmed for me that the mission of Saint Mary's College is alive and impacting our world. Indeed, these women were prepared to make a difference in the world and they already are."

Tennis player Andrea Fetters '16 pursues athletics and ecology

As a tennis player, Andrea Fetters '16 does all three of those things seamlessly in order to be the best competitor possible. But as a biology major, she takes those three actions a step further. This past summer, she spent time on campus with other biology students conducting research for their senior comprehensive projects.

In research funded by the Marjorie Neuhoff '61 Summer Science Research Communities Grant, Fetters focused on analyzing the effects of different nitrogenous soil compositions on floral scent plasticity in petunias while studying plant-pollinator relationships

"Phenotypic plasticity has huge implications in plant-pollinator relationship studies," said Fetters. "Evolutionary ecologists can use results from such studies to uncover the intricate and delicately balanced evolutionary relationships between plants and their pollinators."

While those intricacies may be enough to make even the most focused biologist's head spin, Fetters has struck a balance in her college experience outside of the classroom and lab by becoming a big contributor to the tennis team's success. After transferring to Saint Mary's from Ohio State midway through her first year of college, it was not until her sophomore year that Fetters joined the Belles on the tennis court. Her impact was immediate.

Fetters led all Belles with 18 singles wins and helped pick up 14 doubles victories in her first season in 2014. Last spring, she moved up from number five singles to the number one singles flight. A big jump in terms of pressure, level of competition, and attention, Fetters learned to adapt and adjust from match to match. At the end of the season, she earned Second Team All-MIAA honors for her performance for the Belles.

"I learn new things whenever I'm in the classroom, the lab, or on the tennis court," added Fetters. "In doing both, I have also learned new things about myself, and I have also learned how to persevere through many different types of challenges."

After she earns her degree at Saint Mary's, Fetters plans to pursue a doctorate in evolutionary ecology. She attributes that aspiration to Dr. Cassie Majetic's guidance in and out of the classroom. Her research this past summer will undoubtedly play a factor in her academic success beyond Saint Mary's.

"Throughout this project, I have had the opportunity to learn several research techniques that are not usually covered in a typical undergraduate-level lab," said Fetters. Those skills will be something which she will use to her advantage when she begins the next step in her academic career.

One conclusion can certainly be made from this past summer's research. Much like the plants she has studied, Andrea Fetters knows how to adapt to whatever may come her way.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

After practicing speech-language pathology in Dallas for a few years, alumna Amanda Blackwell '09, went on a mission trip to the Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos Orphanage (NPH) in Honduras. She'd learned about the agency via the Daly family. Florence "Lulu" Romano Daly '82, a registered nurse, and Dr. Peter Daly ND '82, an orthopedic surgeon, and their daughter Tricia Daly Borg'10, have been conducting medical mission trips to the orphanage for several years.

The trip opened Blackwell's eyes to the opportunities to put her time and talents to use with underserved populations in Central America. "I felt like God was calling me to give more radically of myself," she says. Blackwell applied for a volunteer position with NPH, an international organization, and she was assigned a post at an orphanage in Chimaltenango, Guatemala, where she worked through July of 2014.

Blackwell graduated from Saint Mary's with degrees in elementary education and communicative disorders. She went on to the University of Texas-Dallas, earning her master's and completing her PhD coursework, with just the research portion yet to complete.

Blackwell explored the field of speech-language pathology as a Saint Mary's student volunteering respite care to families with children with special needs. Through this service opportunity, Blackwell met a family with five children, one of whom had autism. She determined to learn more about autism and services available for special needs kids. She signed up for Introduction to Communicative Disorders with professor Susan Latham '91. "Her passion for serving individuals with special needs and her commitment to the field of speech-language pathology has inspired me beyond words. I was hooked from that first COMD class on!" says Blackwell.

Giving Radically

Since 2013 Blackwell has served the people of Guatemala, including having made a big difference in the life of one little girl at NPH in particular. She was seven years old when Blackwell met her, and she weighed 27 pounds. Blackwell suspected that this little girl was aspirating on her food and because of that inability to swallow, she had a constant cough and/or pneumonia. Determined to help, Blackwell searched for a doctor who would let her and her team do a barium swallow study so they could confirm the diagnosis.

"A wonderful doctor in Guatemala City let us do the evaluation which confirmed that she had indeed been aspirating on foods and liquids nearly every time that she swallowed," says Blackwell. It was decided to put in a g-tube and now Blackwell's client is fed through a small button directly into her stomach. She has been steadily gaining weight since the surgery, is much more alert, and now goes to the Montessori school on the NPH campus five days a week with her peers.

Successes like these inspire Blackwell to keep working with the kids that need her skills most. "What I love most about my work is every second that I get to interact with individuals with special needs," she says. "I love pondering why God created each one of them with all of their uniqueness. I am always searching for their most special gifts and imagining the ways in which they can positively impact the people in their lives." Even when she and her clients don't make any progress in language in therapy, Blackwell says, "I want so much for each one of them to know that they are loved and that they have dignity and purpose."

When her yearlong service at NPH ended, Blackwell found that, knowing the great need among children with special needs in Antigua, she could not in good conscience return to the states to work right away. She decided to stay in Guatemala, where she could continue to answer that call to give more radically.

Now Blackwell works at Antigua International School and two clinics in Guatemala City doing feeding and swallowing evaluations with a pediatric gastroenterologist and doing therapy for children with dyslexia. She has since opened a new clinic in Antigua, Talk2mí Bilingual Therapy Services, with a Guatemalan speech language pathologist, where she and her partner provide therapy for children with special needs.

Blackwell remains committed to serving children in the area with the goal of giving them the best quality of life possible.





WHEN LIFE DOESN'T GO According to plan

Ten-and-a-half years ago, we welcomed our newest family member into our excited brood of seven biological children. This beautiful dark-haired, smiling 11 month old girl, whom we adopted from Guatemala, became the focus of attention for all of our children, from my oldest son—then 18—to the youngest seven-year-old twins. We had waited quite a while for our baby girl due to bureaucratic red tape and attempts by the Guatemalan government to adhere to

the Hague guidelines, standards of practice for inter-country adoptions.

One afternoon when Andrea was just four years old, I received a phone call from my doctor that completely turned my busy happy world into one of terror and uncertainty. I had been diagnosed with early stage invasive breast cancer and as I watched my four year old munching on her after school cookie, my mind filled with fear. I began to think that all those naysayers who had questioned our decision to adopt must have been right. Questions flew through my head, and my youngest daughter's fate was first and foremost in my mind. After Andrea had been taken from her birth country and the foster family who cared for

her, her life uprooted, would she now be traumatized again with an adoptive mom with a life-threatening illness?

I explained the illness to our children in a matter of fact, calm way, giving some details of my surgery, and letting

them know that I would soon be home again and healing. I answered their questions, but always with a positive spin, because I knew the way I faced my illness would set the tone for our children's well-being.

As I waded through the recuperation period, and my family seemed to be faring well, with no signs of depression or trauma, I realized that their love and support had strength-

ened me more than I had realized. My older daughters registered in the Susan Komen's Breast Cancer 5K, and completed the run in our town, proudly presenting me with a beautiful pink "survivor" tee shirt, which I wear often.

Though I tried to maintain an outwardly stoic appearance, there were many days when I wondered how my daughter Andrea would have fared, should my outcome have been bleak. Thankfully, our story has a happy ending. The strong bond that I have with Andrea seems to have solidified as we've traveled these years since my illness together. The good news is that with the bevy of resources, support groups, and treatment options available to us today, along with the benefit of

early detection, breast cancer is no longer a death sentence. It can even motivate us to slow down, let go of anger and regrets, and smell every sweet flower nature has to offer, if we only take the time to see it.

Clairmarie and her husband Bob live in Wilmington, DE, with their family. Clair teaches children and adults with reading disabilities, mentors other women struggling with breast cancer, and is active in her church and community.
