Carol Ann Mooney '72 recently announced that she will retire as Saint Mary's 11th president at the end of the academic year. In her 12 years as the College's first lay alumna president, she solidified Saint Mary's reputation as a leading liberal arts college, among other accomplishments.

"We are profoundly indebted to Carol for all she has

President Mooney will leave office when her contract ends on May 31, 2016. The Board of Trustees has begun the presidential search process to ensure an orderly and transparent transition of leadership. The College remains in the top 100 of the *U.S. News & World Report*'s Best National Liberal Arts Colleges list for the seventh consecutive year. This year Saint Mary's moved up from 96 to 82 out of at least 235 liberal arts colleges. *U.S. News* uses many indicators to capture academic quality, including assessment by administrators at peer institutions, retention of students, faculty resources, student selectivity, financial resources, alumni giving, and graduation rate performance.

The Princeton Review also listed Saint Mary's among the Best in the Midwest for the 13th consecutive year. In surveys for The Princeton Review, Saint Mary's students described the school as a unique women's Catholic college with a strong sense of tradition, high standards for education, great faculty and staff, and an excellent sense of community.

Food Recovery Project Benefits the Homeless

What started out as a goodwill project by two students has turned into an official partnership between the College's Office for Civic and Social Engagement (OCSE), Sodexo Food Service, and the Center for the Homeless (CFH) in South Bend. Twice a week three students employed by OCSE — Eleanor Jones '16, Jade Johnson '17, and Sidnee Silveira '19 — pick up unused food from the dining hall that Sodexo packages for the CFH. The students weigh the food and enter the amount into the Food Recovery Network database. The trio then delivers the food to the kitchen at the Center for the Homeless where it is used for guest meals. The Food Recovery Network includes nearly 200 colleges and universities, and Saint Mary's is just one of three colleges in Indiana taking part in the effort.

Pushing Boundaries to Make a Difference

Quick, can you recite the mission statement of Saint Mary's College? One line probably comes to mind. Saint Mary's is where students "develop their talents and prepare to make a difference in the world." Making a difference means pushing boundaries, or as our foundresses the Sisters of the Holy Cross say, "responding to the needs of the times."

Making a difference is not comfortable or easy. The mission doesn't promise that. Here, three alumnae share their stories of pushing themselves — out of chaos, heartache, and the culture of the times. Bet they'll cause you to reflect on your life and how you've made a difference in the world.



Unshakable in Chaos

Her story has the makings of a bestselling novel or Hollywood action movie...

Dr. Renee Salas '03 is drawn to the adrenaline rush of emergency medicine, but could she survive a wilderness medicine fellowship in the Himalayas? Extreme winter weather and the 14,500-foot elevation were minor adversities compared to what she'd face — an earthquake, an influx of casualties from a resulting avalanche, primitive clinic conditions, and language barriers. She would need to think clearly. Decisively. Lives would depend on it. Did she have what it would take?

Spoiler alert — yes!

Salas says the two-year Massachusetts General Hospital Wilderness Medicine Fellowship, which included three months with the Himalayan Rescue Association (HRA), "pushed my physical, emotional, and clinical practice limits in ways like never before."

The three-month assignment began in March 2015 in Pheriche, Nepal — a remote village set against soaring pinnacles that include Mount Everest.

"The HRA created the post in Pheriche because it was en route for trekkers on their way up to Everest Base Camp (EBC). It's a place they can adjust to the altitude." EBC, a nine-mile hike up from Pheriche, sits at 17,590 feet. Mount Everest's peak, the highest in the world, is 29,035 feet.

On April 25, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake hit the region. "My colleagues and I ran out in front of the clinic. We watched in horror as buildings collapsed around us."

Amazingly, there was only one injury. Further up the mountain at EBC, though, the earthquake caused a 180-mile-per-hour avalanche. "We learned of the avalanche nine hours later, when the first patients, who self-evacuated on foot or horse, arrived at the clinic."

Salas says approximately 18 hours after the earthquake and avalanche, doctors at EBC began evacuating 73 patients to Pheriche by helicopter. There were just three doctors at the clinic, including Salas, and very limited supplies.

"We recruited additional aid from the trekking population — those with and without medical training... approximately 150 individuals from all over the world. We overcame environmental challenges, language barriers, and difficult terrain to provide the best care possible. Without international teamwork, we never would have had the success we did."



Over the course of seven hours, they treated and stabilized the 73 patients. About 20 of them were critically injured. Patients were evacuated by helicopter — 18 at a time — to a hospital in Lukla 23 miles away. Amazingly, all but two survived their injuries.

The experience pushed Salas to the brink. "I had to push aside my own fear about continued aftershocks, personal hunger, and cold intolerance, and focus my energy solely on patient care and the logistics of the operation."

And when technology, testing, and electronic medical records disappear: "You are left with two humans interacting on a very intimate and fundamental level. That is why I love what I do."

Renee Salas '03 earned a degree in biology and minors in chemistry and psychology at Saint Mary's and attended medical school at the Cleveland Clinic College of Case Western Reserve University, also earning a master's in clinical research. She will complete a master's degree in public health at Harvard School of Public Health in May 2016. Salas is the assistant fellowship director for the Massachusetts General Hospital Wilderness Medicine Fellowship, clinical instructor of Emergency Medicine at Harvard Medical School, and a practicing emergency department physician at Massachusetts General Hospital.



Finding Sense in Tragedy

Delia Garcia '93 was on a dream trip to Ireland with her husband — so why did she feel more exhausted than exuberant? Sure, she was 25 weeks pregnant, but Garcia hadn't even experienced morning sickness. Her doctor gave her the "all clear" to make the international trip, a "babymoon" with her husband, Kelly Stokes.

Garcia shrugged off the lethargy as jetlag. She boarded the bus headed for the Cliffs of Moher.

"When we got to the Cliffs that morning, my water broke in the restroom."



She was in labor in the visitors' center of Ireland's most popular natural attraction — located in one of the country's most remote regions. The front desk called for an ambulance, which could take an hour to arrive.

"A million tourists come to the Cliffs each year, and there wasn't even a first aid kit."

Garcia delivered her baby boy — Nicholas — on the floor of a tiny office.

The ambulance arrived, but Nicholas stopped breathing on the way to the hospital.

"I kept praying for a miracle," she says. "But it was very clear it was a lost cause."

It was July 12, 2006. Three days later, the couple laid Nicholas to rest in County Clare, where he was born. Garcia would later call it Divine providence that they chose a cemetery in the town of Ennis.

Back home in Phoenix, the couple felt they had to make sense of the tragedy and thank those who helped them. Garcia Googled "Irish Embassy" and "Phoenix." What popped up was "City of Phoenix Sister Cities" and a list of cities, which, remarkably, included Ennis.

Garcia, a former Phoenix city employee, knew people in the office. She and Stokes met with program leaders who "were clearly moved by what happened to us and wanted to help."

The couple learned that a multimillion dollar visitors' center was under construction at the Cliffs of Moher. They met with Irish diplomats, looked at blueprints, and found a space that could serve as a first aid room. The couple raised \$86,000 to establish Nicholas's Room, dedicated in 2007. Since then, they've continued fundraising to support and expand the services provided there.

"It's built to be an ambulance without wheels. Staff members at the visitors' center receive basic to advanced first aid response training. There are defibrillators, spinal boards, and a flatbed golf cart to transport injured visitors to Nicholas's Room, where they are triaged until an ambulance arrives."

So where did she and her husband find grace in the face of adversity?

"It was a faith response for us," Garcia says. "Christ is the ultimate example of following God's will. As Christians we are called to follow where God leads us."

In October the couple was honored with the Anam Cara Award by the Irish Center in Phoenix for their contributions to the Irish Community.

Delia Garcia '93 earned a degree in political science and Spanish and a minor in French at Saint Mary's and a master's degree in public policy, housing, and urban development from Harvard University. She is director of communications for Wal-Mart Stores, Inc. and serves on the College's Board of Trustees. Garcia and her husband, Kelly Stokes, have a 4-year-old daughter Madeleine Clare, whose middle name points to County Clare where Nicholas is buried. Shattering Glass Ceilings

When **Fran Bardello Craig '64** was starting out, most people hadn't heard of computers — herself included. It was the '60s, after all.

"My father's friend knew that I majored in math and said, 'You should be a computer programmer.' I said, 'What's that?' He explained that programmers make computers work. To which I said, 'What are computers?'"

She worked at a phone company that sent her to school to learn programming and coding and soon found herself in what would become the IT industry.

"I am definitely in a male-dominated field, and I always have been. I was usually the only woman among 50 men. It has changed a little, but not a lot."

In the '70s when most moms chose to be at home, Craig took the career path. "I worked the whole time, except for short times off when the kids were babies."

It was a transformative era for women, and for Craig. Becoming a mom stirred in her a need to succeed. "I guess it was about security."

Early in her career Craig realized something about herself.

"It seemed that whenever I was put into a group for something, I was perceived as the leader."

Craig thinks Saint Mary's helped her find her voice.

"We, as women, don't want to stand back and let men overshadow us. Studies show women that go to allwomen colleges actually do better in the business world."

And Craig has done very well in that space.

The 73-year-old is CEO of the technology firm Unanet, which publishes cloud software for businesses that work with government agencies. The Washington, D.C.-area resident says she built the company "by attracting a team of bright people who are deeply involved in, enthusiastic about, and committed to building Unanet and helping customers achieve successful outcomes."

Two of those bright people are her children. Christopher Craig is president and chief operating officer of Unanet and Ellen Craig is vice president of professional services.

Retirement is the boundary Craig is currently pushing. She *may* retire — in seven years, at age 80. In the meantime she has mastered work-life balance, splitting her time between work, bridge, golf, and travel, which includes trips to California to visit her grandsons.

When Passion Lanites Action

Britt Blackwood '17, Aiko Kawano '16, and Eleanor Jones '16 are three different Saint Mary's students with a common's rength. It's a typical trait of Saint Mary's women. And each woman expresses it in her own, individual way — through her career, her relationships, her intellectual interests, and myriad other outlets. These three women are pushing boundaries spiritually, academically, and in service to others. Here's what they've discovered so far.

Walking By Faith

These days Britt Blackwood '17 just calls herself a Christian. It's not that she has never been one. It's



just the simplest way to explain her faith journey. Blackwood grew up in what she describes as "a non-denominational Christian household." Her mother is not religious and her father was raised Catholic but converted to the IFBBC (Independent Fundamental Bible Baptist Church) when he was a teenager.

Blackwood's own journey began in middle school and early high school when she became involved in a church that was connected to the Assemblies of God Pentecostal churches. She joined a missio a 1... 1., participating in ministry buildi 1... 1. various villages.

Her background, having given her an appreciation for every individual's faith journey, led Blackwood to her eventual passion for interfaith dialogue. "While I was brought up with a lot of conservative Christian values, I am forever grateful for my father's encouragement to find a faith path and community that works for me," she says.

With the help of Campus Ministry leaders and students of various faiths, Blackwood is working to establish interfaith dialogue on campus. Her goal? Understanding and inclusivity. "I want it to be all inclusive — people from every age, gender, and faith background. I want it to become a group where people can come to talk about faith matters that are important to them and where we can learn from each other. I also want it to be a force on campus where we can eradicate stereotypes and phobias." Eradicating Islamophobia, so present in the news lately, is a major conversation point for the group.

Blackwood realizes approaching interfaith conversations can be intimidating for students who aren't Catholic. As a non-Catholic who was used to interpreting the Bible more literally, she admits attending her first Bible study on campus was a little scary. "But, honestly, it has been so enlightening and I am able to see things that I have never noticed about these biblical stories before. More importantly, these women are so kind and we all agree that the Bible is a great source of comfort in our lives," she says.

This is the kind of community experience Blackwood wants to create for women of all faiths on campus with her interfaith group. "I want people to know that we will always be more the same than we will ever be different."





Intercultural Insight

In their junior year at Saint Mary's, students begin thinking about possible senior comp topics. Aiko Kawano '16, a sociology major and math minor from Japan, followed her natural curiosity about interracial marriages. Now a senior, she is conducting a content analysis of the struggles of interracial couples made up of Japanese women and white American

men. The topic is reflective of Kawano's experience in the U.S. Among her friends' parents, there are several interracial marriages.

To better understand them from a sociological perspective, Kawano surveyed four blogs written by Japanese women married to white American men. She first translated them into English, then compiled significant data points.

Kawano's results showed that these couples struggle with issues common to any given married couple like division of chores and disputes over child-rearing methods. But one struggle was particular to the interracial couples. The language barrier they face prevented them from communicating effectively with one another.

While Kawano's research focuses on interracial marriage, her interests in intercultural issues are broad. In addition to her coursework, Kawano is involved with the Center for Women's Intercultural Leadership (CWIL) on campus. She works with CWIL staff to create events for international students on campus. And she tutors a group of women from Saudi Arabia, helping them learn English.

Kawano believes endeavors like her comp are useful to students and to anyone interested in bridging gaps between cultures. "My senior comp is important learning because there are so many misunderstandings toward certain racial groups in the U.S., even though the country consists of different racial and ethnic groups." And learning about each other's specific struggles is the first step on the path to understanding.

A Just Business

Global studies major Eleanor Jones '16 is passionate about helping other women remove limitations. Last summer she was among four Saint Mary's students to take part in the Study of the U.S. Institute (SUSI) on campus along with about 20 undergraduate women from Jordan, Egypt, Libya, Tunisia, and Iraq.

At the conclusion of the institute, the Jordanian delegation came up with the idea to start SheCab, a taxi service with female drivers for women passengers. Women in Jordan are often sexually harassed on public transportation, which can affect whether or not a woman works outside the home. The delegate students hoped to start a business that would support professional women by providing safe transportation to and from work.

Jones and other Saint Mary's students and staff have supported the SUSI participants by helping them put together a business plan, apply for grants, and fundraise to get SheCab started. Jones even traveled to Jordan over spring break when the Jordanian women pitched their business idea to officials at the U.S. Embassy in Amman.



According to Jones and a recent article in The National, Abu Dhabi Media's first Englishlanguage publication, SheCab has received mixed reviews in Jordan. Conservative Jordanians struggle to accept the idea of women driving taxis or even of women working outside the home. But Jones and the Jordanian women have hope, knowing that new ideas often face resistance.

In addition to starting a conversation about a serious issue for Jordanian women, "The SheCab team is demonstrating the entrepreneurial and activism power of women," says Jones. "These four women are not business majors three of them are pharmacy majors and one is a finance major; however, they acknowledge an issue that they are passionate about and they stepped forward with a solution."

Working on the project with the Jordanian students has been one of the most rewarding of Jones's college career, which includes a year studying abroad in South Africa. She points to a quote from The National article on SheCab, in which student Rahmeh said, "People tell me that I have been brainwashed by the Americans after we participated in the program. But I tell them I have brainwashed the Americans back, changing their perception on Islam and women through our discussions." Jones says, "I believe that this quote sums up the power of exchange through programs like SUSI." For Jones, this project has been about breaking down barriers both for and between women of different cultures.



Expanding Our Limits

Graduate Programs at Saint Mary's

For the first time in nearly 50 years, Saint Mary's College is offering graduate programs. The programs stem from a history of progressive initiatives in graduate education, most notably the School of Sacred Theology. Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, then-president of Saint Mary's, launched the school in 1943 at a time when women were not permitted to study theology in post-graduate programs.

Aligning with the Sisters of the Holy Cross's mission of seeing a need and meeting it, and building on Sister Madeleva's forward-thinking educational model, Saint Mary's is now offering a Master of Science in Speech Language Pathology, a Master of Science in Data Science, and a Doctorate of Nursing Practice to meet the demands of three rapidly growing fields. The Master of Science in Data Science and Doctorate of Nursing Practice (DNP) programs represent Saint Mary's first foray into primarily online education; data science students make an annual visit to campus, while nursing students visit each semester.

Doctorate of Nursing Practice

So far, the model is providing the same one-on-one interaction with professors that is a hallmark of the Saint Mary's undergraduate education. According to Daniel Petrie, a student in the DNP program, "The instructors have been open and caring, and have made themselves available for questions and feedback on performance." Petrie's career goals align with Saint Mary's commitment to social justice, so he was naturally drawn to the DNP program. "I like the idea of giving a higher level of care to those that don't have access to it," says Petrie. Petrie is passionate about this and a dream of obtaining his pilot's license to fly into remote areas to help people. The DNP program focuses on relationship-centered leadership in healthcare from the perspective of an entrepreneur who operates within a tradition of social justice. The program is offered in two tracks: a post-Bachelor's in Nursing (BSN) to DNP degree and a post-Master's in Nursing (MSN) to DNP.

Master of Science in Data Science

The Master of Science in Data Science program is offered at a time when the market is ripe for deep analytical skills. A study by McKinsey and Co. projects that, "by 2018, the U.S. may face a 50 to 60 percent gap between supply and requisite demand of deep analytic talent." While many programs have been established to meet this need, Saint Mary's is one of the few that will produce professional practitioners with the necessary mathematical and computational depth needed to refine the tools others simply use.

In other words, Saint Mary's graduates will be those who actually write the algorithms used to decipher and interpret data. This expertise in turn helps business leaders make more informed decisions. "Students will come out of the program with enduring mathematical skills that will allow them to take on data challenges now and in the future, no matter what programming language they're using," says math professor and program director Kristin Kuter, PhD.

The broad application of data means students hail from a wide variety of backgrounds. Current students include a math teacher, an information technology (IT) specialist, and a data warehousing expert, to name a few. Alumna Lisa Horenkamp Durham '93 found out about the program last year through a Courier article and both she and her

husband Mike applied and enrolled. Durham previously worked in IT consulting, which led her to Scott Air Force Base, where she became involved with data modeling. She hopes to use her degree to go into analytics, ideally for a sports team. Mike works in data warehousing, which involves putting data onto a system. "The systems we build sometimes turn into a data roach motel — the data checks in, but it never checks out," he says. He wants to help people get that data out of the system and turn it into useful information.

Master of Science in Speech Language Pathology

Like the DNP program, the on-campus Master of Science in Speech Language Pathology program has a commitment to social justice. There is a shortage of qualified speech language pathologists in education and healthcare, and this shortage is felt deeply in Indiana. Students will work with underserved populations through partnerships with local clinics, schools, hospitals, and other services. The program

is functional and hands-on, meaning students meet people where they are. For example, in working with a stroke patient, a student might go with the patient to the grocery store and help him or her shop for meals, incorporating therapy techniques into real-life situations.

The program also emphasizes clinical experience. All speech language pathology graduate programs provide students with clinical experience, but Saint Mary's offers more extensive, varied hours. "At the heart of what we do is creat[ing] clinicians — thoughtful, reflective clinicians who base their decisions in evidence," says professor and program director Susan Olney Latham '91. "Students will gain firsthand experience in evaluating evidence by actually going out into the community and conducting research. They'll have the opportunity to participate in studies that affect the course of peoples' lives."

Belles were there too—on the White House and Capitol Building lawns, on the streets of Washington, D.C., and New York City, and along Benjamin Franklin Parkway in Philadelphia. The papal experiences of students and alumnae ranged from "popembile" sightings to conducting a choir at a papal Mass to a chance one-on-one meeting (and blessing).

Providential moment

On the morning of September 24, Linda Janke Ruszkowski '04 stood outside the Apostolic Nunciature of the Holy See in Washington. The director of campus ministry at the nearby Academy of the Holy Cross was with a small group of students and school leaders hoping to catch a glimpse of Pope Francis on his way to address Congress. For Ruszkowski, just to be there was extraordinary.

"I have been so inspired by how he has embraced a servant-leadership style to his papacy, a quality I strive for in my own ministry," she says.

When Pope Francis emerged from the residence, Ruszkowski, in her third trimester, called to him: "We love you so much, Papa...My baby can't wait to meet you, Papa." In a moment captured on video, the pope approached a smiling Ruszkowski, placed both hands on her midsection and quietly said a blessing. Audible gasps can be heard from the crowd.

Thaddeus Ruszkowski, Linda's husband, told us in a Facebook message that day, "It was completely providence... It was a very real passing on of God's grace to Linda and our daughter."

In the City of Brotherly Love

Katherine Chmelko '09, choral director at Nazareth Academy in Philadelphia, directed a 50-member regional high school choir that sang at an open-air Mass celebrated by Pope Francis on Benjamin Franklin Parkway in Philadelphia on September 27. Among the crowd were 41 Saint Mary's students and seven staff who made the pilgrimage by bus thanks to the College's Division for Mission.

"I hadn't experienced the greatness of a universal faith until the papal Mass," Perla Ocadiz '18 said of the hundreds of thousands of pilgrims. "All the waiting and walking and fasting and Power Bars were worth it and I will forever cherish it."

Reporting from the nation's capital

Sara Mahoney '04 was invited to the arrival ceremony for Pope Francis held on the South Lawn of the White House on September 23. Mahoney is a diversity manager in the U.S. Department of State's Office of Civil Rights.

Alumna and Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson attended Pope Francis's September 24 Congressional address. She generously shared tickets with some D.C.-area alumnae to watch the historic event on a Jumbotron on the Capitol's West Front Lawn. Kelly Cook-Lewis '97 took her 10-yearold daughter Riley there for "the best field trip ever."

Kelly Craven '83, director of House Operations for then-Speaker of the House John Boehner, called it "an exciting day," which included seeing Pope Francis in person. Craven noted that Boehner, who is Catholic, had been trying for 20 years to have a pope address Congress.

Communicating history, in real time

Normally Stephanie Cherpak Clary '12 serves as director of campus ministry and religion teacher at Rice Memorial High School in South Burlington, VT. But during the papal visit, she put her communication studies and theology background to work as a member of the media relations team for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops communications committee. She was in all three cities of the papal visit, helping facilitate news conferences and media requests.

Kathleen Hessert '74, founder and CEO of Sports Media Challenge led a digital initiative to inspire millennials. The @PopeIsHope effort featured pope emojis that could be downloaded for free on smart devices. A digital street team of about 60 millennials, like Kelly Vaughan '17, created content demonstrating that #GoodIsWinning, to build excitement about Pope Francis's visit. Ellen Wilson **Hoover '90** was involved in the execution and analysis of the project. Social media insights derived from @PopeIsHope could help the Vatican understand which issues young people are most concerned about and how to engage with millennials going forward.

Pioneering in the counting Field

Jody Matousek Padar '94 didn't set out to change an entire industry. But the CEO and popular AccountingToday.com blogger has become a leader in her field by heading a new movement of "digital CPAs." A Certified Professional Accountant, Padar is the CEO and principal of New Vision CPA Group in Mount Prospect, Illinois. Five years ago she began blogging about the accounting business and has just published a book titled The Radical CPA: New Rules for the Future-Ready Firm.

Padar's path from Saint Mary's accounting major to awardwinning CPA and sought-after conference speaker was a logical, if not magical, one. "I didn't really know what I wanted to do after graduating," she says. After Saint Mary's Padar joined a Big 4 firm, then a mid-size firm, and then, she joined her dad's accounting firm.

Because of her liberal arts background Padar found she could think outside the CPA box and then communicate her ideas to other professionals. "The benefit of having attended a small liberal arts college, gave me skills my peers in the field didn't have. They helped facilitate my unique views of the industry," says Padar. When she saw a need for CPA firms to change their practices in order to accommodate their changing clientele, Padar started blogging. She discovered a receptive audience in her peers via the Forbes and Accounting Today websites, among others.

Padar had been blogging her ideas for more than five years when a publishing company reached out to her. Her book, The Radical CPA, based on her blog articles, is a down-to-earth practice management manifesto. It outlines four tenets Padar

believes are key for CPAs who want to move into the future. They include embracing new technology and social media, focusing on the customer experience, and doing away with billable hours. "I tell other CPAs that our customers have changed. If we don't change with them, we'll become irrelevant," says Padar. As with most pioneering women, Padar simply saw a need for advancement and acted on it.

The CPA industry has been responsive to Padar's message. It shows in her accolades. Padar's been named one of Accounting Today's 100 Most Influential People from 2011-2015. The same organization named her 2015 MP (Managing Partner) Elite. In addition to these and other awards, Padar spearheads media events "to shake up the profession" and is a regular featured speaker and expert contributor to industry events.

Padar created a career for herself as a blogger and author that falls outside the traditional CPA lines. "That's something Saint Mary's sets you up for," she says. "Thinking, speaking, writing — those kinds of skills help you when you climb further up in your career." The process of finding one's passion, she says, is sometimes a process of elimination. Padar worked at a CPA firm after college, eventually getting her master's in taxation. "I didn't find out what was really important to me until I started blogging," she says. Because she was an experienced CPA, she established credibility in the business blogging world and found her niche. And that path has led Padar to a successful career through which she can make an impact.

In reflecting on her Saint Mary's education, Padar says she and her friends, fellow alumnae, are all successful in different ways. Whether it's teaching and then staying home with children, becoming a nurse, starting a business—defining success for yourself is key. "We can all be successful in whatever is important to us," she says. For Padar, that means embracing change and helping her chosen industry do the same.

We drove to their home at Lakeside, Michigan for a weeklong 4th celebration with endless firewords on the beach. Two weeks later I flew to Boise, ID for my youngest daughter's wedding. My seven children and some spouses were able to attend, and it was a memorable weekend for everyone. Now my life is quieter and back to normal. In September my grandson, his wife and baby Lucy MacDonald will visit. I'm excited to meet my 10th great grandchild, the first with the name MacDonald. Life continues to move forward and life is good. I wish good in every new day for all my Saint Mary's friends and classmates."

I had asked Joey about reaching **Joyce McMahon Hank,** whose husband Jerry died a while back. Joyce

is no longer on email. Joey wrote that Joyce "has left Moline and moved to Minnetonka, west of the Twin Cities. She has three daughters who live there (Kathy lives near Traverse City). Most of her and Jerry's friends in the Moline area are no longer living, and Joyce and Jerry were a quiet, family-oriented couple who avoided the cocktail party circuit in spite of their wealth. I remain mildly active in our parish, chairing events for senior men and women. Of all the ministries in which I have participated, Liturgy of the Word for Children is my favorite. Recently this beautiful prayer came my way and I want to share it will all of you: "The Gift of Life... Lord, teach me not to hold onto life too tightly. Teach me to take it as a gift. To enjoy it, to cherish it while I have it, but to let go gracefully and thankfully when the time comes. The gift is great, but the giver is greater still. You are the giver and in you is a life that never ends. Fond regards to all and don't forget to smell the roses."Vivian



SUCCESS—ACHIEVED THROUGH INTERDEPENDENCY

Interdependency is the cornerstone upon which my Saint Mary's senior comp was built. As a double major in philosophy and religious studies, I explored philosophies of nonviolence and concluded that the practice of nonviolence is dependent on moral convictions grounded in spiritual beliefs, beliefs that are more specifically rooted in a concept of "inter-subjectivity," as defined by Luce Irigaray, or interdependency. I could not have ever predicted that the theme of interdependency, chosen as a young college senior, would be a prophetic voice in my life, a banner over all of the many seasons yet to come.

I remember with great gratitude the many ways in which I have and continue to depend on the relationships I made during my four years at Saint Mary's. Following graduation I was living and working on the Colville Indian Reservation with Jesuit Volunteer Corps Northwest. I was up to my ears in challenges and new experiences. Then, out of the blue, a former Saint Mary's professor sent me a package of books written by Native American authors to use in my class and to give to my students. Her support made a significant difference in the lives of my students and helped me to feel a little less overwhelmed, a little more hopeful in the face of poverty and oppression. She illustrated to me with her unsolicited act of generosity a truth about interdependency that would take shape more concretely in the next phase of my life.

"Some give by going; others go by giving" is a common saying in missionary circles. When I decided to volunteer in Cochabamba, Bolivia, I did not actually have the means to do so. I was forced to go out beyond myself and ask for help! How humiliating! How un-American! How miraculous to see how God finds a way. Support came from a wide net, including friends and faculty from Saint Mary's College. Those who would not otherwise go to Bolivia were able to connect to the needs of Bolivian people by supporting me financially, spiritually, and emotionally. Generously seizing the opportunity to give, they made sure that I was in turn able to respond to my call to serve. As a direct result of their giving, girls ages 8-18 with slim to no prior schooling learned reading, writing, and arithmetic. I could never have been their teacher without the support of so many back home.

My awareness of interdependency has most recently revealed itself through music. Songwriting in Bolivia gave me a means to process my experiences and to explore my faith. My final months in Bolivia were dedicated to recording an album of these songs. I am in awe at how the generosity of others allowed me to follow my heart to Bolivia and make music there. Now that same music is a gift I can offer in return to those who supported me — and the many others I encountered in my years of service. What a joy it is to share the journey!



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
