

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The Mission

Saint Mary's College is a Catholic, residential, women's college in the liberal arts tradition. A pioneer in the education of women, the College is an academic community where women develop their talents and prepare to make a difference in the world. Founded by the Sisters of the Holy Cross in 1844, Saint Mary's promotes a life of intellectual vigor, aesthetic appreciation, religious sensibility, and social responsibility. All members of the College remain faithful to this mission and continually assess their response to the complex needs and challenges of the contemporary world.

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College's sciences follow precedent set by Sisters of the Holy Cross a century ago

They are called STEM disciplines. It could have been METS or TEMS, or SMET, but STEM—the acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, Math—suggests a kind of supportive, nourishing, essential element, and that is how we in math, the sciences, and engineering like to think of our disciplines. One of the many attractions of Saint Mary's is a history that establishes a central role for STEM education—a surprising situation perhaps, at a Catholic College for women, a College that proudly emphasizes its commitment to the liberal arts. Surprising or not, the Sisters of the Holy Cross established the precedent more than a century ago. A 1903-04 listing of available "collegiate courses" begins: "astronomy, calculus,

botany, trigonometry, analytic geometry, advanced physics, pharmacy, chemistry, zoology, geology..." Walk the corridors of Science Hall and you will see displays of elegant wood and brass instrumentation from the turn of the last century—the best that European instrument makers had to offer—available to our students.

When I came to Saint Mary's in the late 1960s, the United States was in a feverish race to reach the moon before the Soviet Union, having just lost the race into space to that competitor/ foe. It was a heady time for the STEM disciplines, which were seen as fundamental to returning this country to the lead position. Women's colleges and Saint Mary's in particular had a special role to play because we were disproportionately effective at encouraging and preparing women to pursue careers in mathematics and science, areas in which women were seriously underrepresented. What goes around comes around. We started the 21st Century in a comparable "race," only now it is with our economic competitors. Again, STEM education is ascendant, or at least, receiving more attention.

And again, Saint Mary's is both prepared and preparing to play its part. I am impressed daily by a cadre of talented faculty bringing their enthusiasm for their subjects and their expertise as teachers to students with ambitious agendas: careers in engineering, medicine, basic research... future entrepreneurs, future teachers, and future leaders. Whether working side-by-side on a SISTAR project or in a "non-traditional" classroom, or for that matter, in a traditional classroom, students and teachers establish educational partnerships that convince me there is no better place to teach or learn.

New technologies and new classroom environments support increasingly diverse and creative approaches to teaching and learning. To get a sense of this 21st-Century environment, you need only visit the College's new Spes Unica Hall or the newly refurbished Madeleva Hall, which houses the math department's extraordinary new facilities. I say that with a touch of envy. We in Science Hall are still in the planning stages for the redesign of our facilities. We are looking to adapt spaces for different approaches to teaching (today's "lecture" classes often are not lectures), to better accommodate the broad range of instrumentation we support, and perhaps most important, to encourage and support the kind of interdisciplinary collaboration that characterizes the best of modern STEM activity. It's an exciting time for the STEM disciplines. It's an exciting time to be at Saint Mary's. We hope the following pages give you a sense of that.



Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, CSC, who served as president of Saint Mary's College from 1934–1961, had a vision to make Saint Mary's College the nation's premier Catholic, women's liberal arts college. That goal is unchanged even today, and is a core principle of President Carol Ann Mooney's Strategic Plan. The Madeleva Society, celebrating 30 years of dedication to the College, was established to perpetuate Sister Madeleva's dream and to help carry on her work.

Maryjeanne Ryan Burke '54 has been there from the start. Women <u>are</u> good at math

...A belief



The first woman considered to make substantial contributions to the field of mathematics met a brutal end for her unwillingness to conform to the societal standards set for women of her time. She dressed how she pleased, drove where she wanted in her own chariot, and bucked the cultural norms of her day by empowering herself as a scholar. Hypatia of Alexandria, a Greek mathematician who lived in Fifth-Century Egypt, was eventually murdered by a mob of fanatical monks that accused her of heresy for her flagrant behavior.

Hypatia's legacy lives on, inspiring not just women mathematicians, but all women who refuse to "know their place" by breaking into traditionally male-dominated fields. While women have made great strides toward gaining access to the male-dominated fields of math and science in the centuries since, they have always been underrepresented in these fields. Women comprise about 46 percent of the U.S. workforce, but lag behind men in holding top positions in fields such as medicine, engineering, biology, dentistry, and veterinary science.

According to Professor of Biology and Department Chair Nancy Nekvasil, there is a shortage of women in science, technology, engineering, and math, also known as "STEM" fields. "In all the related fields, except for nursing, there's still a lack of women, especially in math, engineering, and chemistry. Biology is somewhat better, but we still need more women scientists overall," she says. "There have been many programs in elementary and secondary schools, and in colleges and universities, encouraging women to go into the sciences, even by offering incentives.

A woman's place is wherever she chooses to be

Like Hypatia, there are Saint Mary's women who want to buck that trend, and the College remains dedicated to

educating and encouraging them to change the status quo. In the last five years, an average 244 students annually have majored in science or math fields. In addition, all students are required to take a minimum of one math and/or one laboratory science course, which means that both the math and science departments support Saint Mary's students regardless of major. "It takes a lot of one-on-one to encourage a student who never thought of herself as good at math," says Professor of Math and Department Chair Joanne Snow. "You don't give up on the students and you don't let them give up on themselves."

Piquing women's interest early on

Nekvasil and Snow agree that you have to interest women in science and math early in life. "The research shows that right around fifth or sixth grade they decide whether or not they are going to—I don't want to say 'pursue the sciences' but they decide whether or not they're going to be 'okay' with science," Nekvasil says. The same is true for math and many other fields that depend on science and math innovations.

Even then, women's interest in science has traditionally leaned toward the biology side rather than the chemistry side, which may be partly due to women's tendencies to interact with the physical, rather than the theoretical, according to Dorothy M. Feigl, the Denise DeBartolo York Endowed Chair in Science and Professor of Chemistry. "I think that it's the life aspect of the life sciences—that they can connect it much more readily to the natural world around them, and I think that is a draw for them," says Feigl. Conversely, she describes chemistry as an "essential science," which focuses on microscopic atoms and molecules, so it tends to be model oriented in nature.

Young girls are often under-encouraged in math, science, and related studies throughout their schooling, and even

in the home, according to some studies. "Some parents will even say, 'I wasn't good at math, so it's okay for you to not be good at math,'" says Snow. It's just one of the cultural obstacles women face, despite the great

accomplishments of women scientists and mathematicians that paved the way for them.

Women who opt for these careers often drop out as they advance in position

A recent study by researchers from Cornell University examined the reasons why women who are proficient in math tend to opt for less technical math-related careers and why they drop out as they advance in position. Their findings, published in March 2009 by the American Psychological Association, indicate that such careers don't allow for the flexibility women need to raise a family.

In recent years, the emerging STEM movement has drawn more women into math- and science-related fields. The concept evolved in the business world as companies began integrating research and development across disciplines.

STEM education supports the way women learn

STEM is also paving the future of education at Saint

Mary's and across the country, and often as early as primary school. STEM's basis of cross-disciplinary study is appealing to women, who tend to learn best through conversation and collaboration.

According to a study posted by the Women's College Coalition

likely to enter STEM fields of study because of the supportive, single-sex environment: "Some research suggests that women's colleges provide a qualitatively different experience for women compared to coeducational institutions, including higher levels of academic challenge, opportunities for active and collaborative learning, and greater support for women in STEM majors" (Kinzie, Thomas, Palmer, Kuh & Umbach, 2007; Pascarella & Terenzini, 1991).

For Saint Mary's students, STEM education is still mostly on the horizon. Nekvasil says that the science building isn't designed to support work across disciplines. "Right now, we model the team-centered, collaborative-type setting in our labs. We do it within disciplines, but not as much across disciplines," explains Nekvasil. "Students need to be able to do that same kind of teamwork in an integrated way."

The faculty pictures clusters of offices where professors in related fields can more easily converse, as well as areas where students from different majors can hold problem-solving, "nitty-gritty" work sessions. Professors envision joint classrooms for students in related majors. "There is a whole lot of integrated science work going on out in the world today and we need to be modeling that for our students in our own coursework and our own thinking," Nekvasil says. While the funding to realize the structural and instructional





requirements to fully support STEM education here is not yet in place, it must be a priority for the future.

Women's future in math and science rests on breaking the cultural stereotypes that discourage them early in life. It lies in encouraging and mentoring young women at all levels of schooling, and helping them explore the many career

opportunities open to them in STEM fields. Saint Mary's alumnae who pursued careers in engineering, medicine, chemistry, and many other male-dominated fields, stand as proof to their future opportunities.

Under the Microscope

A student and two alumnae pursue their scientific passions

Kara Joseph '11 and Chemistry Professor Isabel Larraza: A Green Partnership

"I knew this would be a challenging field for me, but

at Saint Mary's, we have all the resources to help me succeed," says Kara Joseph '11. Her success as a chemistry major developed from her own hard work, persistence, and the support of chemistry faculty. It also led to a major opportunity for discovery.

Joseph and Chemistry Professor Isabel Larraza received the College's Student Independent Study and Research (SISTAR) Grant, awarded by the Center for Academic Innovation, sponsored by Maryjeanne R. Burke and Daughters. The student/ professor team was awarded funds to conduct research during the summer with Joseph working as a junior colleague on a project that influenced Larraza's own research.

Their project, "Hexabromoacetone and Ethyl Tribromoacetate: A Novel Green Path to Drug Intermediates," focused on "halides," which are chemical compounds that are a part of the process to develop new products in chemical and pharmaceutical industries. Halides are usually prepared using harsh, raw materials, and normally form strong acids or toxic gases as byproducts. "The goal of our project was to arrive at an efficient, greener protocol for the preparation of such

halides that would have valuable application in the synthesis of pharmaceutical intermediates (product development)," explains Larraza.

> In the end, Joseph's and Larraza's combined research culminated in the testing of a new procedure in the preparation of a drug precursor for the drug Prilosec, an antacid. They will present their research at a meeting of the American Chemical Society next year. The project "took my learning experience to the next level," says Joseph. It helped her apply what she was learning in class to science in the pharmaceutical industry. Larraza adds, "As an educator, I consider undergraduate research in partnership with faculty a vital component of higher education. There is an extensive amount of evidence that shows that engaging in a collaborative research experience promotes effective student learning and, therefore, a first-rate education."

Kerry Long '70: Business-minded Chemist

When alumna Kerry Long '70 entered the business world as a newly graduated chemist nearly four decades ago, the outlook for women in her field was bright. "I graduated on the 'cusp.' Women practicing in my field were

not totally unheard of, but it was certainly not as common as it is today," she says.

Long has worked for several major companies throughout her career including Gillette, where she analyzed competitors products. Since then, she has worked for Soya Foods and G.D. Searle Company (now, a division of Pfizer), advancing from analytical chemist to vice president of quality control. "Going into industry versus academia or even the medical field, well, there weren't a lot of examples out there for me. But I didn't set out to be a trailblazer." The three options were

Piquing their interest in science early

One way the College engages young women's interest in science is the Saint Mary's Summer Academy, a three-week camp offered to students in grades 8-12.

In summer 2010, the Summer Academy will feature a forensic science week for the first time. Forensic science requires a variety of crossdisciplinary skills. Campers will apply concepts from various sciences to their investigation and gain an understanding of how they all work together, says Andrea Nichols, Summer Academy director.

Kerry Long '70

ones Long considered upon graduation. "I was just more interested in what I could do to apply what I'd learned and still stay in touch with the business world," she says.

Long wants to impress upon current Saint Mary's students that there are a world of options open to women with science degrees. "Not only do you get this outstanding technical training, but because of the liberal arts foundation, you can also join the big picture, the real world. Research your options. There are all sorts of ways to make use of a science degree, so make sure you learn about them." To encourage students, Long has established the Kerry Long Endowed Fund for Science, which sponsors summer research or supplemental internships for students interested in using their science degrees in the business world.

Dr. Robyn Lord Fean '02: The Biology Advantage

Family Doctor Robyn Lord Fean '02 knew she wanted to pursue a science degree when she took a human anatomy and physiology class in high school. Her science classes excited her, and her teachers in high school and at Saint Mary's encouraged her to follow her dream. She majored in biology and came away from Saint Mary's with many fond memories of the coursework she completed in the biology program.

"I will never forget the four months I spent taking care of rats for my research project," Fean recalls. "I have never been very fond of rodents, and apparently they weren't very fond of me either as I have several small scars on my fingers where I was bitten." Fean went to Professor Nancy Nekvasil for preprofessional advising, but says Nekvasil's advice and encouragement didn't stop there. "At other schools, it seemed that pre-professional advisors only encouraged those who were at the top of their class. Professor Nekvasil encouraged everyone to pursue their dreams, no matter how challenging they might be."

When Fean graduated from Saint Mary's, she went on to obtain her medical degree from Indiana University School of Medicine in 2006. She's currently completing advanced training in sports medicine at the University of Washington. "Because I had a biology degree going into medical school, I think it put me at an advantage over others who had non-science degrees," she says. "The first two years of medical school consist of basic science courses, and since I had been exposed to similar courses at Saint Mary's, I felt well prepared for them."



Robyn Lord Fean '02

Chemical Attraction

Professor Dorothy Feigl helped pioneer women's entrance into chemistry in an era when women were not always welcomed. She was the only female to graduate with a chemistry degree from Loyola University Chicago's Class of 1961. With a lengthy career—43 years and counting—teaching chemistry at Saint Mary's, Feigl is still in a class of her own.

From early on, the Denise DeBartolo York Endowed Chair in Science and Professor of Chemistry showed an interest in chemistry and technology. "If we went to a farm, I looked at the milking machines as opposed to the cows. I was always inclined in that direction," says Feigl, who played with her brother's chemistry set as a child and knew by high school she was destined to become a chemist. The path to that degree was not an easy one.

When she first applied to Loyola in the 1950s, Feigl was told that women weren't allowed on the main campus where chemistry was taught. "I think the department head wasn't

particularly interested in having women in his department," Feigl says. She took math the first year at Lovola's Downtown Chicago campus at Lewis Towers (now Water Tower Campus). At the time, Loyola's scholarships were awarded based on administered test results. Men who tested well received a four-year scholarship while women received a oneyear scholarship for equal scores.

When Feigl's scholarship expired the following year, she applied to DePaul University in Chicago, was accepted, and offered a scholarship that would extend through her expected graduation year. Arming herself with that news, she went back to Loyola to see if they could match it, and they did. Feigl was finally able to gain admission to Loyola's chemistry program and received the balance of the four-year scholarship. In spite of all her efforts, "the actual experience of the education at Loyola was fine: strong, with a lot of support from my fellow students—all male—but all very supportive. It was a very nice environment," she recalls.

After later earning a PhD in organic chemistry from Stanford University in 1966, Feigl considered her career options, at first dismissing the idea of teaching, imagining it as endless days filled with endless speeches and questions. Then, Feigl's sister-in-law, M. Joanne Deger Feigl '59, mentioned an available teaching position at Saint Mary's. "There is a God in heaven," says Feigl. "So I thought, 'Well, I'll do that," and she did. "Within a month, I knew that teaching was exactly what I wanted to do," she says.

As a witness to changing times and perceptions, Feigl can speak about the role women's colleges had as leaders in non-traditional education for women, particularly in the 1970s, during the women's movement. "Even during the early part of that time, women's colleges were very good at not discouraging women from being chemists or scientists," says Feigl.

"If you came to Saint Mary's, the presumption even then was that 'Saint Mary's has all these degrees, all these disciplines available to you. Pick which one you like—and try to pick something you like—because we're going to push you hard so you'll have to like what you are doing, so you'll take that push," she recalls.

It is good news that the number of women seeking chemistry degrees today is growing. In fact, the majority of chemistry degrees at institutions in the U.S. are being awarded to women, not men, and excellent career opportunities await today's female chemistry graduates. Yet, fewer women than men today choose to pursue advanced chemistry degrees and female chemistry academicians in major research institutions are rare. Research and studies are being conducted to understand this dynamic. Women's colleges like Saint Mary's will continue to work hard to dispel beliefs about women's roles by supporting young women here to choose to be whatever it is they desire to be. And, they can be sure Dorothy Feigl will be up front and center, encouraging them and serving as proof of what they can achieve.

It all adds

College's Math Center = Student

Students receive unconditional help and support with their math studies

When Professor of Math Suzanne Cox was growing up, she had ample help with her math homework. "My mom was a middle school teacher who taught math because she liked it. So, in my house the female was the one who did the math. There was never the issue of 'girls don't do math," she says. Today, Cox is a mathematics professor and the College Math Center's instructor and director, where she keeps a daily schedule helping students, most of whom are not math

majors, with any struggles they might have learning mathematics.

The new, spacious Math Center in the newly renovated Madeleva Hall, is fully equipped to support the math learning process with its eight computer workstations, worktables for group study, and an adjacent room for conducting student testing. Bookshelves with reference materials on math line one wall, on top of which sets a jar of candy.

"Sometimes I'll see girls walk

in, get a piece of candy, and walk out, which is fine. At least they're in here, and they know we're here," Cox says.

Cox and the math department's faculty are in the business of debunking the myth that women are not good at math. "Saint Mary's faculty members serve as strong role models to our students because of the number of women in our department. Students see women who have been very successful and who would never make the excuse of, 'Oh I'm a girl—I don't get this.' We provide an environment that supports the students and gives them the confidence that they can succeed—the idea that they can do it because we believe they can do it," Cox says.

Students like Victoria Darling '13 and Mary Kate Conness '13 visit the Math Center twice a week to stay on top of their learning. "The Math Center allows me to work


out any kinks I may have in my understanding of a concept," says Darling, a biochemistry major. The center helps her solidify the concepts she has learned in class. Conness says that one of the greatest benefits of the Math Center is having someone there who enjoys helping students. "Everytime I go to the Math Center, Professor Cox is there and we work on my homework or she helps me get ready for my next quiz or test," Conness says.

Whether they stop in for the candy or for math assistance, students are sure to find understanding, encouragement, help, and support from Cox, each other, or the math student tutors.

Environmental studies require an interdisciplinary lens

issues surrounding high-level nuclear waste disposal and environmental radiation exposure. Plus, she had taught environmental ethics in an environmental studies program elsewhere for several years, so she recognized the importance of a college providing a solid environmental

One way Saint Mary's has given women that foundation is by offering a major in biology with a concentration in environmental biology through the science department. Fleming was delighted by the College's existing program and equally delighted to learn that the biology department had identified Cassie Majetic to lead its efforts to establish an interdisciplinary environmental studies minor in addition to its existing biology major. Majetic officially began leading that effort in 2009.

An assistant biology professor, Majetic's background is in floral evolution, particularly, how pollinators' interactions shape floral odor. Majetic defines environmental studies as "a field in which we explore the connections between humans and the environment," a distinction she makes from environmental sciences, which take a scientific approach through fields such as geology, physics, and chemistry, for example.

Preparing students who want to pursue graduate work by arming them with the knowledge to work in the field, or obtain a position with an environmental or non-government agency (NGO), requires a solid understanding of the science that undergirds environmental concerns, says Fleming. This requires an interdisciplinary approach, she says.


Majetic's own journey is illustrative of the interdisciplinary nature of the College's proposed environmental studies minor. Her undergraduate degree is in biology and her PhD is in ecology and evolution. While working on her undergraduate degree, she switched her sights from environmental science to biology when she realized the value of learning the theory and logic involved in the science underlying environmental issues.

"Environmental studies take a wider approach (than environmental science), incorporating scientific knowledge and information on how people respond to the environment," Majetic says. Some of the questions that environmental studies explore include determining:

- historical perspectives on environmental issues;
- pertinent laws and policies in place in the U.S., which govern environmental interaction;
- the feasibility of a worldwide agreement on environmental standards;
- the value people place on the environment and whether its goods and services are tangible;
- the worldwide environmental influence on culture: art, literature, communication, and anthropology;
- and, if science can agree on singling out specific environmental issues and identify ethical and moral considerations that need to be examined.

As such, the College's proposed environmental studies program would draw from an array of other disciplines, including English literature, psychology, philosophy, and

science foundation.



problem-solvers need to be exposed to all of these fields to really understand the issue at hand," Majetic says.

An environmental studies minor is a perfect fit for a liberal arts college because understanding environmental issues requires an interdisciplinary lens—looking at the issues from different perspectives and disciplines. Students can pair their minor with a variety of majors, such as the English major who writes about environmental issues or the political science major's career writing environmental policy.

Majetic is working with other professors at the College who have wanted the environmental studies minor program to materialize for some time. "Having an interdisciplinary program allows a wonderful group of diverse faculty to provide different viewpoints to our students. We need economists, politicians, writers, artists, historians, and ethicists to bring their perspective to the issues at hand and train future problem-solvers. That's only going to happen in an interdisciplinary program," Majetic says.

As the environment and its concerns continue to evolve, the College will provide a solid foundation for its future scientists.



Saint Mary's Dual Degree in Engineering program with Notre Dame may seem like an awesome, but formidable, undertaking. Yet, its student participants view it as an opportunity that's...

Just the thought of completing two degrees in five years may seem daunting, but for Saint Mary's students participating in the Dual Degree in Engineering program, it's a way to obtain the benefits of a Saint Mary's education, plus a degree in engineering from the University of Notre Dame.

Casandra Williams '11, one of this program's participants, is enthusiastic. The program enables the Saint Mary's chemistry major to combine her interests of engineering and chemistry. The dual-degree program is open to students in any major, and is a co-exchange agreement between Saint Mary's and Notre Dame. Participants take pre-engineering courses and other degree requirements at Saint Mary's while taking engineering courses at Notre Dame. In four years, they receive a BS or BA degree from Saint Mary's, and in their fifth year, a BS in engineering from Notre Dame in chemical, computer science, electrical, environmental geosciences, or mechanical engineering. "I'm taking advantage of my chemistry major at Saint Mary's because it is a great foundation for chemical engineering," says Williams. Chemistry major Barbie Shaw '10 was drawn to the program because it combines her strengths in science and math and enables her to receive degrees from "two great institutions," she says.

Those interested in science or mathematics are encouraged to apply to the program. Notre Dame guarantees program admission to Saint Mary's students who are recommended by professors and who have earned at least a 2.8 grade-point average in their technical courses after three-and-a-half years of studies. While the curriculum is rigorous, students are guided, mentored, and encouraged each step of the way by Saint Mary's professors. Williams describes the support she receives from the College's chemistry and math professors as "phenomenal," adding, "I truly value the fact that I can speak with my professors about anything."

Williams and Shaw manage to lead well-rounded lives outside the classroom too. Williams has been on the Saint Mary's cheerleading squad since her first year and is an active member of the Notre Dame First Class Steppers. She is active in the Saint Mary's club, La Fuerza, which celebrates Latina heritage. Williams also works three different jobs throughout the school year—as a chemistry department teaching

assistant, a tutor to South Bend community students, and she works at the information desk in Regina Hall. "When I have time to myself, I love to dance. One of my favorite things to

do on the weekends is go salsa dancing!" she exclaims.

Likewise, Shaw pursues several interests including serving as a peer mentor to 23 students through the College's new Cross Currents program. She also works as a student manager for the College's Office of Special Events, and her love of technology led her to work at the Cushwa-Leighton Library's

Instructional Technology Resource Center (ITRC) as a media consultant to the campus community.

Shaw plans to pursue a Master's Degree in Chemical Engineering after graduation. She is also contemplating joining the Navy to participate in its Baccalaureate Degree completion program. Williams intends to participate in the Engineers without Borders program, "where I can apply my acquired knowledge of energy systems to assist underdeveloped countries," she says. Williams also plans to attend graduate school to earn her PhD. "My true passion would be to form an organization, using my chemistry and engineering skills to aid third-world countries in education and technology," she says.

Meanwhile, the career outlook is bright for graduates with engineering degrees, especially for those holding additional degrees upon graduation. In fact, degrees in engineering occupy seven of the top 10 spots with regard to compensation with chemical engineering occupying the number two spot according to the study, "Best College Degrees by Salary," conducted by PayScale, a global online compensation data company.

While Shaw and Williams admit that the dual-degree program is far from easy, it is worth the effort. Shaw advises students considering the dual-degree program to "be prepared to work hard and even be let down sometimes, but there are people here at Saint Mary's and Notre Dame, including peers and professors, that want to see you achieve your goals. It is not easy, but it is worth it," she says.

Science Fiction

the literature of change

It's part of the human thought process. We can't help asking, "What if?" The literary genre of science fiction has been asking "What if?" and trying to answer in imaginative ways for decades. Often referred to as the literature of change, science fiction addresses a culture's needs and challenges during times of great scientific and technological advancement. Its authors address controversial political and environmental issues, and boldly indulge our burning curiosity about the unknown in their literary attempts to answer such questions as "Are we really alone out here in space?" and "What does the future hold?"


In fact, science fiction authors are lauded for actually predicting scientific and technological developments through their works. Jules Verne—often referred to as the father of science fiction along with H.G. Wellsauthored classics like From the Earth to the Moon (1865) and Twenty Thousand Leagues under the Sea (1869–70). Verne is credited with predicting the development of air, space, and undersea transportation with remarkable


English professor Chris Cobb developed an interest in science fiction, and its sibling genre, fantasy, in junior high school. He first picked up a copy of J.R.R. Tolkien's, The Lord of the Rings, then a friend loaned him A Spell for Chameleon, the first of Piers Anthony's Xanth novels. "I found science fiction as well as fantasy, and I read both genres interchangeably all through junior high, high school, and college," he says.

"My preference for 'romance' over 'realism' in fiction drew me to fantasy and science fiction. Those genres probably helped to form and reinforce that preference, which also has expression in my interest in Medieval and Renaissance literatures, which are less bound by realism than the main tradition of English fiction from the 18th Century forward."

Cobb, who earned his BA from Swarthmore College and three additional degrees from Yale, including a doctorate, has been teaching at Saint Mary's since 2006. He brings his interests in science fiction and fantasy into the classroom, teaching courses like "Tolkien and Modern Fantasy," "Medieval Literature," and "Realism and Race in America."

Here, Cobb presents his list of five "must-reads" in the science fiction genre, works that, "I have found powerful and enjoyable," he says.





Daly Dose

Mursing student and her family administer hope and healing in Honduras

In a field that is steeped in the sciences, Nursing Major Tricia Daly '10 combines practical knowledge with care and compassion in her commitment to helping others. Tricia spent last summer as a student nurse at United Hospital in Saint Paul, Minn., where she had a wide range of responsibilities in generalized nursing care. "I observed many procedures, treatments, and operations, which tremendously helped to connect all that I have learned in the classroom. The hands-on experience solidified my nursing skills and enhanced my abilities," she says.

Tricia also volunteered her time with Nuestros Pequeños ("Our Little Friends"), an orphanage in Honduras, last summer. Tricia and her parents, Florence "Lulu" Romano Daly '82, a registered nurse, her father, Dr. Peter Daly ND '82, an orthopedic surgeon, and her siblings, Talia, 23, Michael ND '11, and Patrick, are very involved with Nuestros Pequeños. The family's involvement with the orphanage happened somewhat by chance when Tricia was in grade school. That was when her mother noticed a poster hanging on a wall, depicting two children in a Mexican orphanage. Lulu already had a trip scheduled to Mexico to visit relatives, so she offered to take needed items to the orphanage. That brief side trip in the '90s has resulted in the family volunteering and raising funds in support of the Honduran orphanage. Tricia and Michael, who aspires to be a doctor, cofounded Friends of The Orphans (FOTO), a Saint Mary's/ Notre Dame Club that helps support and raise awareness about the needs of the orphanage's children. The orphanage is one of nine throughout Latin America and the Caribbean that provides shelter, food, clothing, healthcare, and education in a Christian environment.

"My family chose to travel to Honduras because it is a safe environment in which we can volunteer together," says Tricia. "My parents hope to expose us to the reality of poverty in our world and to instill in us a sense of service." Tricia, her parents, and her brother, Michael, are pictured on these two pages during a recent trip where they volunteered at the Holy Family Surgery Center located on the orphanage grounds.

The same could be said of Marjorie Hosinski Hamel '43, who passed away on September 16, 2009. Marge was that mighty tree, for her family and her beloved Saint Mary's, channeling her energy, determination, and flair, to assure they flourished.

A native of South Bend, Ind., and graduate of Saint Mary's Academy, Marjorie went on to earn a BA in history from Saint Mary's College where, in the words of her daughter, Barbara Hamel '79, "She distinguished herself as a top-notch/go-getter student, long before these traits were desirable for females. . . ." Marjorie served on the College's Board of Trustees from 1981 to 1987. She received the President's Medal in 1977, the Distinguished Alumnae Award in 1983, and she was the recipient of an honorary degree from the College in 2002. A tireless volunteer, Marjorie also served on The Madeleva Steering Committee, chaired her Reunion Gift Campaign, and served as Chicago Alumnae Club President.

While at Saint Mary's, Marjorie met her husband, P. Jordan, a "double Domer" (undergraduate and law school). P. Jordan joined Marjorie in her zeal for Saint Mary's, himself serving as one of the first lay members of the Board of Regents. He passed away in 1977 after 33 years of marriage, and Marjorie moved on to the next stage of her life without her beloved P. Jordan.

An avid traveler and active community and church volunteer, Marjorie was energetic and engaged to the very end. However, above all these interests and avocations was her devotion to her family—her children, their spouses, and her many grandchildren.

The '43 alumna leaves behind a number of legacies at the College, including her daughters, Barbara A. Hamel '79 and Patricia Hamel Duffy '75, and four great nieces: Anna Sanford Mlodzik '00; Martha Shannon Sanford '97; Mary Sanford Dodd '97, and Ellen Sanford Aranowski '94.

Saint Mary's College lost a dear friend and advocate with the passing of Ann Meagher Vander Vennet '59 on October 7, 2009. Those who knew Ann will hardly be surprised by the opening words of the celebrant's homily at her funeral Mass. The Reverend William Sheridan related that upon hearing about Ann's death, he called her husband, George, to talk about the liturgy and other funeral arrangements. It was a short conversation. George told Father Sheridan that Ann had planned everything in advance. Those plans included women pallbearers, many of whom were Saint Mary's alumnae, and readings and hymns that were intended to comfort those she left behind—to let them know she's okay. Even in death, Ann was thinking about her family and friends.

A tireless volunteer, Ann served her alma mater in every way imaginable. She was a member and past president of the Chicago Alumnae Club, as well as a long-time member of the Chicago Advisory Council. Ann was a member of the Alumnae Board of Directors from 1988 to 1994, serving a term as president. While on the Alumnae Board, she spearheaded the effort to establish the Alumnae Memorial Scholarship, which has thus far awarded \$143,600 to 16 students. She served as a member of the College's Board of Trustees from 1995 through 2001. Ann was on The Madeleva Steering Committee, and in 2009, she served as co-chair for the Class of 1959's 50th Reunion Gift Campaign. Under her leadership, the Class of 1959 endowed a scholarship in honor of their 50th reunion.

Recognizing the importance of the unique educational experience that Saint Mary's provides young women, Ann and George (Notre Dame '59) endowed a library fund, established the Ann Vander Vennet Endowed Scholarship, and contributed to the construction of the College's Student Center. The Vander Vennet Theatre in the student center recognizes their generous support. Ann and George often hosted alumnae or prospective student events at their home.

The second reading at Ann's funeral mass included the following passage: "... And, at the mother's death, she will not seem dead, since she leaves after her, others like herself." May we all learn from Ann's example and continue her work to assure young women today and in the future have the opportunity for a Saint Mary's education.

Saint Mary's among Top 100 **Liberal Arts Colleges**

Saint Mary's College remains nationally recognized as one of the top 100 liberal arts colleges in the nation, according to U.S.News & World Report rankings released in August, which place the College in the 97th position. National recognition remains a key goal in the College's Strategic Plan, which includes providing "educational excellence equal to that of the best colleges in the country."

"It is wonderful to be nationally recognized for the academic excellence at Saint Mary's College," says College President Carol Ann Mooney. "We know that prospective students and their parents put value in these rankings." Saint Mary's was also rated one of the best colleges in the Midwest by the Princeton Review, a distinction the College has held every year since the Review began its "Best Regional Colleges" categorizations seven years ago.

The U.S.News & World Report rankings factor in the percentage of alumnae participating in gift giving to each college. In 2008, 32 percent of Saint Mary's alumnae generously made a gift to the College. While contributing to the College's excellent ranking, Saint Mary's lags behind the alumnae giving participation of some of its higher ranking peer institutions including Wellesley College, Oberlin College, Scripps College, and Whitman College—additional proof that alumnae gifts matter.

Saint Mary's achieves highest enrollment in nearly two decades

This school year, Saint Mary's College boasts its highest enrollment since 1991. In September, the College announced its total enrollment of 1,664 students—which includes 1,561 students studying on campus and 103 students studying abroad. In response to the increased number of students and these down-turned economic times, the College immediately stepped up its effort to ensure financial aid availability. Since the start of the 2008-09 school year, there has been an 11 percent increase in need among students and/or their families seeking financial aid from the College. In response, Saint Mary's increased its institutional aid budget by \$2.6 million.

"Everyone at the College has pulled together to make this increased aid happen," says College President Carol Ann Mooney. "Our Financial Aid department has worked countless hours processing applications. All departments made budget cuts, and members of the Board of Trustees and our Campaign Steering Committee established a fund to provide emergency assistance to returning students. The importance of alumnae gifts and scholarships was a critical component that enabled the College to meet the needs of

today's students.

"We know this extra effort resulted in a stable enrollment—even in these challenging times," says Mooney. Over 90 percent of Saint Mary's students still receive some form of financial aid from the College.

Two main reasons are cited for the increased enrollment, according to Dan Meyer, vice president for enrollment management. "For the past four years, we have had more than 425 students in each of the first-year classes. Secondly, this year, we had higher-than-expected retention of first-year students to second-year students," he notes. Increasing enrollment has been a long-term objective of the College and one that stands. "We are working to maintain and further boost our enrollment by expanding our market reach," says Meyer.

"We continue our work as a College to become more attractive to minority students. We've put greater emphasis on improving the student experience, which has helped our retention efforts. We're also working hard to maintain the financial commitment needed to recruit and retain students at the College," Meyer says.

The position is a joint appointment by the president of the College and the president of the Sisters of the Holy Cross. Sister M.L. has spent her career serving the University of Notre Dame and Saint Mary's College.

In addition to being a Saint Mary's College graduate,

Sister M.L. holds a licentiate from the University of Montreal and a PhD in French literature from the University of Pennsylvania. At the University of Notre Dame, she served as an Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs and taught in its Department of Romance Languages. She formerly served as an assistant French professor and French program coordinator at Saint Mary's.

The College's Division for Mission seeks to integrate Gospel values, the richness of the Catholic tradition, and the heritage of the College's founders, the Sisters of the Holy Cross.

A piece of Saint Mary's history from the 1940s you might find of interest . . .

In the Fall 2009 *Courier*, the College's library timeline feature stated that the Alumna Centennial Library was established in 1944 in sole commemoration of the founding of the College in 1844. However, College Archivist John Kovach has since located an article in the February 1941 *Saint Mary's Static* newspaper, in which Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, CSC, referenced the library's commemoration involving two centennials—the College's founding and that of the Congregation of Sisters of the Holy Cross in 1841 in Le Mans, France.


