Spring on Saint Mary's Campus

This spring, the beauty of the Saint Mary's College campus was backdrop for Recognition Weekend, Honors Convocation, and Commencement. Along with these events, the College calendar was jam packed with student-led seminars, symposiums,

and year-end celebrations. As the new College editor, I wanted to talk to as many people and attend as many of these events as possible, all in the spirit of a beat reporter getting to know one's territory.

And while the campus asserted its presence with blooming lilac bushes and majestic pines, it became clear that the students, faculty, and alumnae provide the real magic of Saint Mary's. As alumnae and students crisscrossed paths, those generational intersections morphed into a narration that gave life to the history and mission of the College. At the Madeleva Voices roundtable, a '42 alumna described her panic when, as a young student, she and her roommates searched for a can of sauerkraut (a Sister Madeleva favorite) just minutes before Sister Madeleva arrived for dinner. In March, I saw the professional results of Danae Jiminez's '12 work in organizing this year's Diverse Students' Leadership Conference. I spoke to a '60 alumna who praised the College's mission in promoting community involvement throughout one's life, but felt unprepared for the changes that took place during that turbulent decade. In May, I saw an '82 alumna secure the mortarboard on her daughter's head for Commencement 2010.

It dawned on me that Saint Mary's College is exceptional because it delivers what it promises. For more than a century, the young women who matriculate at and graduate from Saint Mary's receive a high quality Catholic liberal arts education. Just as importantly, that education is underscored with a sense of justice for others, duty to one's community, discovery and belief in one's own talents.

One of my favorite views of the campus is through a third floor window at Haggar Hall. From this perch, you can take in the willow trees shifting in the breeze next to Lake Marian. You see students, alumnae, faculty, and staff move through the campus with purpose and faith. As the Courier editor, my hope is that when you turn the pages of your alumnae magazine, you will find articles that eloquently capture the essence of Saint Mary's exceptional mission and the alumnae and students who embody the College's promise.



Sister M. Madeleva Wolff, CSC, who served as president of the College from 1934–1961, had a vision to make Saint Mary's College the premier Catholic, women's liberal arts college. That goal is unchanged even today, and is a core principle of President Carol Ann Mooney's strategic plan. The Madeleva Society, celebrating 30 years of dedication to the College, was established to perpetuate Sister Madeleva's dream and carry on her work.

A society is made up of many individuals, individuals who share a commonality. An institution that provides a rigorous education and a foundation of faith preparing today's students and those of tomorrow with the skills and confidence needed to impact the world. A Saint Mary's education challenges and transforms the young women who pass through our doors. The Madeleva Society challenges us all to invest in the human potential of our students.



TOGETHER, WE CAN MAKE AN IMPACT.

The Madeleva Society thrives on challenges — three decades have passed since the society was born of a challenge from Mary Lou and Judd Leighton. In that time, members of the Society have contributed over \$60 million to ensure that deserving young women can afford to experience a Saint Mary's education. And, other donors have followed the Leightons' example of initiating challenges to benefit the College and our students.

- Over the past 30 years, Madeleva Society members have been directly responsible for the establishment of 180 scholarships, five endowed chairs, 21 library funds, 11 program funds, and 13 academic department funds.
- The Madeleva Society membership today includes 43 charter members who have been there from the start — generously supporting the College and providing an example to all who love Saint Mary's College and support the mission.
- Ten charter members were present at this year's Donor Recognition Dinner to lead the celebration of the 30th anniversary of this important Society.





From the day they receive their acceptance letters to the final commencement march, a student's four-year college experience can be likened to a pilgrimage. Whether they study abroad or undertake a business internship, sing with the Women's Choir or participate in daily basketball practice, each student follows a unique course that determines who they are and who they will become upon graduation.

Saint Mary's has designed a new student advising program to guide our young women on their journey through the College experience. The Cross Currents Program debuted in the fall of 2009. A collaboration between three College divisions, Academic Affairs, Mission, and Student Affairs, Cross Currents helps students navigate choices and build confidence.

"A cross current in a river is where different currents converge into each other," Dr. Patricia Fleming, senior vice president and dean of faculty, says of the program's name. "Our students have always enjoyed a multitude of resources available to them from the three divisions, and the programs often flow into each other. Cross Currents recognizes the inter-connection of these resources and delivers them with a more systematic approach."

Cross Currents programming encourages each student to explore her vocation or calling in life by considering four central questions: "Who am I?" "What is my passion?" "To what am I called?" and "How can I make a positive difference in the world?"

The three College divisions organize programs relevant to each class. First-year students, beginning with the Class of 2013, are paired with student mentors from other classes and meet individually and in groups throughout the year. They also meet with faculty advisors, who make themselves available for meetings outside of class.

In addition, the Cross Currents program provides an e-portfolio (electronic portfolio) system, where students will store information regarding advising, internship, job-shadowing, and other experiences throughout the year. The purpose, according to the Cross Currents mission, is to provide students a platform upon which to reflect upon and learn from their educational activities (both inside and outside of the classroom). Other facets of Cross Currents include internship development, summer internship grants, and several other programs including the Collegiate Speaker Series, featuring prominent Indiana professionals.

The AM 1?



As a first-year student in theatre, Joy Viceroy '13 says nothing beats the rush she feels as she takes a final bow. Her intended music and theatre double major has already provided her with the thrill of performance, though she only just completed her second semester here. She is a member of the Women's Choir, the Liturgical Choir, and had roles in two College theatrical productions this spring.

Viceroy's most passionate performance, however, takes place off the stage. She is a tutor through the College Academy of Tutoring (CAT) program through the Office for Civic and Social Engagement (OCSE), a segment of the Division for Mission. Each week, Viceroy volunteers as a teacher's assistant at Coquillard Primary, a local Title I school. She and her fellow tutors work with at-risk children to improve their math and reading skills.

Viceroy says the experience has changed her life. "The children I work with have taught me more than they could ever know about life, love, and learning," she says. Just before winter break last year, her first graders at Coquillard wrote letters to Santa. The catch was that they had to ask for something for someone else. One little boy asked Santa for a job for his dad. "As a child, he should be going to school and having fun with his friends, not worrying about such 'adult' issues. To ask for something of that magnitude showed me that this small child was weighed down by grown-up concerns," she says.

Viceroy's class is the first to be guided by the Cross Currents program. By participating in campus clubs, including Thespians Unplugged, Viceroy has taken advantage of opportunities to explore the subjects nearest and dearest to her heart while dedicating her first year to asking the question, "Who am I?"

The answer to that question, Viceroy says, is a matter of exploration. "Although I am bound and determined to make a career for myself on the stage, I have considered other options during my short time here," says Viceroy. "Who am I today? Today I am a performer; however, yesterday I was an economist. Tomorrow I might be a liturgical musician." This question has launched her Saint Mary's journey and inspired self-exploration by encouraging both academic and spiritual growth that will take her through four years at the College.

What is my passion?



Kate Park '12 says that her study abroad experiences have taught her to really listen. "When someone is speaking to you in a foreign language, you have to pay attention or you miss something," she says. It's a lesson in being present to others that Park applies in many areas of her life, including her work with children.

The Glen Gardner, NJ, native is an education major who spent the spring semester in Saint Mary's Seville, Spain, study abroad program. Park found her passion in teaching and travel and says that's a direct result of the mentoring and opportunities for exploration she has experienced here so far. A meeting with student teaching director Karen Van Meter made a particular impression on Park. "I remember her telling me that I had to do something I was passionate about. That no matter what, I needed to find my passion and then do it." Van Meter asked Park to tell her what she enjoyed most and noted that Park was smiling throughout the conversation as she talked about caring for the children she worked with through her education department placements. After leaving that meeting, Park says, she knew she had been called to teaching.

Park's passion for learning extends beyond the Spanish culture and language. She is a history buff and loves teaching children about the founding and ideals of our country as well as the history of other cultures. Her education classes, where she creates and presents unit plans and observes in an actual classroom, fuel her fire. "Saint Mary's is providing me with all the tools and skills that I will need to be a successful and effective teacher so that I can make a difference in the lives of children," she says. If she puts her Spanish to use in the field, well, that's just icing on the cake. What Park really wants is to reach children, to be present to them, to instill in them the value of education and the confidence to pursue their goals.

WHAT AM I CALLED?



Katrina Mesina '11 is a motivator. She relishes helping others to achieve their goals. She believes in educating people on how to advocate for themselves and has witnessed the power of this process through her work at the South Bend Center for the Homeless. This year, Mesina paired up with fellow communication studies major Claire Yancy '11 to create the Women's Program, a women's studies initiative

to be installed at the South Bend Center for the Homeless next year. The program is based on work the two conducted through Professor Terri Russ's public communication class. Students in the class taught Homeless Center clients about communication skills necessary to be successful in life with family, school, work, and day-to-day affairs.

Mesina also is passionate about working with people with special needs. A Darien, Ill., native, she has participated in a fundraising walk for the Chicago chapter of the Autism Speaks organization for the past five years. She and her dorm mates in Holy Cross Hall also volunteer at Hannah and Friends, a nonprofit organization founded by former Notre Dame football coach Charlie Weiss and his family. Mesina wants to continue her work by bringing a chapter of Autism Speaks to Saint Mary's.

Her experiences, both volunteer and academic, have guided Mesina to her ultimate calling: to work in service of others as a student and after graduation as a professional. Her involvement in Saint Mary's student government gives her opportunities to coach other students to excel. "My goal is to create an environment where students feel comfortable with their own voices," she says.

COW CAN I MAKE A POSITIVE DIFFERENCE IN THE WORLD?



In 2006, Wenwen Bai '10 traveled thousands of miles from her home city of Chengdu, China, to attend Saint Mary's College. As she tells it, her one great challenge throughout her college experience was to learn to stand on her own two feet, to be truly independent. Saint Mary's opportunities allowed Bai to find her independence and to flourish.

This past May, Bai graduated cum laude with degrees in economics and business administration. The Department of Business Administration and Economics also awarded her the B.A. Comprehensive Award in Economics, the Academic Achievement in Economics Award, and she was invited to be a member of the National Finance Honor Society.

During her Saint Mary's years, Bai sought out experiences that would point her towards ways to engage her talents. In her sophomore year, she was awarded a Burke Student Independent Study and Research (SISTAR) grant along with her professor and mentor Jerome McElroy. The prestigious grant funds summer research and creative pursuits for a faculty-student team. Bai and McElroy studied China's trade

investment and aid in the Pacific and Caribbean islands. Their work from the grant was published in the *Island Studies Journal* in 2009.

The research experience impressed upon Bai the significance of various countries' roles in the global community. But she also found that her studies in Rome broadened her perception of her own place in that community. "[My study abroad experience] affected me tremendously. It helped shape me as a global citizen because I gained a new appreciation for Western civilization in regard to philosophy, art, and history," she says.

Saint Mary's also taught her how she could make a difference in the lives of others. As a member of the Around the World Club, Bai helped organize cultural events, including the hugely successful China Night, and offered support to other international students. She says that in addition to cultivating her identity as a strong, intelligent woman of faith, she has learned to give back. "I have truly developed an appreciation for humanity," she says broadly.

Her future now at hand, Bai will go on to pursue a master of science degree in accountancy at the University of Notre Dame in Fall 2010. ■

ON SAINT MARY'S RESOURCES, AND GIVES BACK

Alumna Jennifer Urgonski Keck '04 entered the world of personal finance prepared for the effects of the glass ceiling.

"Professor Jill Vihtelic told us that as professional women, we have to 'speak twice as eloquently, be twice as intelligent, think twice as quickly on our feet, and solve problems twice

as quickly as men in our same profession' just to be taken as seriously as men." Keck has been an investment advisor for the last six years, and she admits that it was an adjustment for her, going from an all women's college to a profession where women are often scarce. "As much as people try to pretend that it doesn't exist anymore, the 'Old Boys Club' is alive and well," says Keck. "Visitors to our office assume that I'm a secretary and begin discussing coffee needs with me."

Keck graduated cum laude with a bachelor's degree in business administration from Saint Mary's, and an MBA from Indiana University. Today she provides management and advisory services for non-profit organizations' 403(b) employer sponsored retirement plans as well as addressing individual investing needs. While the Cross Currents program wasn't in existence during her time at Saint Mary's, Keck feels her Saint Mary's experience gave her all the tools to make a difference in the world.

"Saint Mary's strengthened my Catholic faith, particularly on the Rome campus. Saint Mary's also gave us the opportunities, ethical standards, business skills, experience, and confidence necessary to pursue our dream careers, whatever they may be. These ambitions, these desires, this faith—these are Saint Mary's gifts to us. They have shaped who we have become as Saint Mary's women, and it's our legacy as Saint Mary's women."

Keck likens her first job experience with her study abroad time in Rome. She felt out of her element, but knew deep down that she had the skills to succeed. "Living abroad requires one to adapt, accept, explore, tolerate, embrace, listen, feel, see, and to simply be with a totally open mind and heart. So we did and are forever changed for it in a most remarkable way."

A beneficiary of scholarships that helped reduce her tuition and provided her with the opportunity to study abroad, Keck is giving back to Saint Mary's as a member of the Young Madeleva Society. "When an organization makes a profound impact on your life, you have to support it—through volunteer efforts, recruiting, and donations," says Keck, who designates her donations for the Rome Program.

"I personally benefited from the alumnae who made donations to enhance our Saint Mary's experience — my three roommates and I lived in newly renovated Regina Hall our freshman year, my roommate organized adoration in the beautifully restored Holy Spirit Chapel in Le Mans Hall our senior year, we gathered each night to eat dinner in our brand new dining hall, we literally cried over our physics projects in Trumper Computer Center in the library basement. These experiences were possible only because of generous alumnae."

Patty Duffy, a nursing major, is a twosport athlete who could often be found in Angela Athletic Facility cheering on other Belles teams, making banners, or helping out wherever needed. She also has been a member of Friends of the Orphans and Student Nurses Association.

After spending six weeks in the summer of 2009 in Kyarusozi, Uganda, working with the Sisters of the Holy Cross in their clinic, she and another student co-founded Belles for Africa on Saint Mary's campus. Through fundraisers at sporting events, they raised more than \$5,000 for the clinic.

This past spring break, Duffy traveled with other Saint Mary's students and several medical professionals to volunteer at the Holy Family Surgery Center located near the Nuestros Pequenos Hermonos orphanage in Honduras. After graduation, Duffy will work at a hospital in the Chicago area for a year. She then hopes to travel and work in underserved areas around the world.

Graduating with an accounting major with a concentration in finance and a math minor, Samantha Goudreau has made the most of her Saint Mary's academic and athletic opportunities. At the Honors Convocation on May 2, she

She was the president of Lady Accountants of Tomorrow and the vice president of Young Executives Club. She also is a soccer star. "A big part of my life at Saint Mary's was spent training for soccer," she says. She was a student trustee for the Saint Mary's Board of Trustees, president of the Sisters of Nefertiti Club, and mentored students for the Multicultural Services and Students Program. This fall she will lead her own classroom through the Teach for America Program in New Orleans, La.

Morgan Light has assisted with surgeries in a hospital in Ecuador, conducted a town hall meeting in Nicaragua, and has been accepted to medical school at Rocky Vista University College of Osteopathic

Medicine in Parker, Colorado.

As a rising senior, Light completed research for her senior comprehensive project on bacterial water contamination of private well drinking water on Little Corn Island, Nicaragua. The biology major presented her report on the conditions of the water in a town hall meeting on the island. "I had the opportunity to design and run my own project on international soil and make a real impact on a community. That's virtually unheard of at the undergraduate level," she says.

Light also helped run a clinic in Ecuador for five days with a medical team from Global Health Outreach. One of her choicest memories is of a woman who kissed her on the cheek after Light dispensed a small bag of Tylenol. She plans to enlist as a physician in the U.S. Army after graduate school.

Saint Mary's College has many exceptional students. We profiled eight seniors who throughout their four years at the College studied hard, volunteered, traveled to other countries to learn about other cultures, and became leaders by way of their talents and, at times, courage. As we interviewed them, we learned they all received some level of financial assistance through Saint Mary's scholarships, which allowed them to receive a liberal arts education that values them as unique individuals.



NANCY MULKERRINS Chicago, Illinois

Nancy Mulkerrins, the 2010 class president, majored in communicative disorders and chose a career in speech and language pathology. During her senior year Mulkerrins completed two clinical practicums, including a course

at the University of Notre Dame in which she worked with clients who suffered from autism. She also worked with a local family doing early intervention therapy. The hands-on experience she received in the program taught her how to put the things she learned in the classroom into action. She says the work affirmed her calling and prepared her to continue in a field that treats people with speech and hearing disorders, an estimated ten percent of the population.

Mulkerrins, whose parents were both born in Ireland, studied in the College's Ireland program for a full year. While living in Ireland felt like "going home" due to her family connections, she also found that she spent a lot of time getting to know the Irish culture first hand.

Blaine Nolan had her first taste of politics at the age of six after attending a sleep over at a friend's house. "My parents woke me up really early the next day to be in a parade for a friend who was running for mayor. I was so mad that I didn't talk

to them for a day." Despite that inconvenient early wake up call, the political science major has found that public service, both locally and on a national level, is her passion. She has volunteered on a number of campaigns. Through her studies and political involvement, she's met President Barack Obama, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, Kathleen Kennedy Townsend, and Chelsea Clinton. She's had internships in Senator Evan Bayh's office, and Congressman Joe Donnelly's office in D.C., while attending American University as part of a semester-long program through the political science department.

Blaine is a member of the senior board, the Political Science Club, and the Psychology Club; she was a state officer for the College Democrats of Indiana, and the treasurer for the Northern Indiana Democrats, as well as being the president of College Democrats for three years at Saint Mary's.



QUINLAN O'GRADY Middletown, New Jersey

"Faith in Action" was one of senior Quinlan O'Grady's favorite classes at Saint Mary's. She says the course challenged her to translate her beliefs into experiences, which led to a stint tutoring at an inner-city school, a class's

service learning requirement.

After graduation, O'Grady will join a two-year education service program where she'll work toward her master's degree in education while serving in an inner-city school. The education major decided to pursue teaching as a little girl and is now a passionate young teacher dedicated to encouraging students with limited opportunities. "I want to make a difference to these students and help them realize their own self-worth," she says. "I truly believe that education is the only way anyone can break out of the cycle of poverty."

Quinlan also tutored at a local primary school through the College Academy of Tutoring (CAT) program, mentored for fourth-grade girls through the Pen Pals Program, and served as a member of Students for Effective Autism Treatment (SEAT).



KELLI RIPP Peoria, Illinois

One of Kelli Ripp's political science professors, Patrick Pierce, has always made it a point to tell her she will go on to do great things. She believed him. She plans to pursue a career with a government agency after graduation.

Ripp's political science major offered her the opportunity to study in Washington, D.C., where she wrote her senior comprehensive project. While there, she developed a passionate interest in asylum law and immigration issues. Retired State Department Foreign Service officer Dan Whitman was her research supervisor, and Ripp says he opened up her eyes to the nuances of her topic and of U.S. government policy in general. "I like that there is an international aspect to the issue [of asylum law], as well as a personal aspect and the opportunity to help people who come to America looking for a better life," says Ripp, who also studied in Ireland for a year.



Sylvia Earle, PhD



In recognition for her outstanding professional accomplishments and her passionate commitment to saving the oceans

Marine biologist Sylvia Earle delivered the 2010 Commencement address and received an honorary doctor of humanities degree from the College. Dubbed "Her Deepness" by the New York Times, Dr. Earle has been an

Explorer-in-Residence at National Geographic since 1998, the year Time Magazine named her its first Hero for the Planet. She has logged more than 6,000 hours underwater with the completion of more than 60 expeditions. Her expeditions include leading the first team of women aquanauts during the Tektite Project in 1970 and setting a record for solo diving to a depth of 1,000 meters (3,300 feet). Dr. Earle was the first female chief scientist at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). She has also played a key role in establishing marine protected areas globally, including the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands National Marine Monument.

Lois Lowry



In recognition of her outstanding contributions to children's literature and to generations of young people

Lois Lowry is the author of more than 30 novels. Her books A Summer to Die, Number the Stars, and The Giver have become literary classics that earned her two Newbery Medals for her distinguished contributions to children's literature. "I try, through

my writing, to convey my passionate awareness that we live intertwined on this planet and that our future depends upon our caring more, and doing more, for one another," she has said. Saint Mary's elementary education majors are excited to re-experience Lowry's books as they now teach them to the next generation of elementary and middle school students. Ms. Lowry received an honorary doctorate of humanities degree from Saint Mary's College.

In 2008,O'Connor and his wife traveled with a College delegation to Le Mans, France, for the beatification of Blessed Basil Moreau.

VALEDICTORIANS ASK THE EXPERTS

FACILITATED BY GWEN O'BRIEN

It's not every day you are valedictorian. It's not every day you interview world-renowned oceanographer Sylvia Earle and Newbery award—winning author Lois Lowry. For Audrey Marrah and Carly O'Connor, Commencement 2010 was that day.

AUDREY MARRAH '10, BIOLOGY MAJOR, INTERVIEWS SYLVIA EARLE ABOUT CHOOSING A CAREER IN THE SCIENCES.

DID YOU ALWAYS WANT TO BE A MARINE BIOLOGIST?

I moved to Florida when I was 12. My backyard was the Gulf of Mexico. I came to understand that the ocean is where the action is, where the greatest diversity of life is.

DO YOU KNOW OF ANY UP-AND-COMING CAREERS IN-VOLVED WITH THE OCEANS/ENVIRONMENT THAT RECENT COLLEGE GRADUATES MAY HAVE NOT CONSIDERED?

Whatever your particular gift is, use it. We have an immense responsibility to take care of the natural world that takes care of us. Do you have a way with numbers? Use that talent to calculate and model and measure. Do you have an eye for photography and a will to use it? Do you have a way with words? Rachel Carson (founder of the contemporary environmental movement) was not truly a scientist. She was really a writer, a poet, but she learned what she needed to know and she communicated in a way that a broader audience, other than just scientists, could understand and be moved by what she discovered.

WHAT WOULD YOU SUGGEST FOR RECENT GRADUATES INTERESTED IN THE OCEANS/ENVIRONMENT?

Learn whatever you can. Go out into the wild—land, deserts, forests, marshes, oceans—get personally as involved as you can. If you can't go to these places, get up to speed like Rachel Carson did. She didn't dive, but she learned about the ocean. Get educated in the ways of the ocean and then use that knowledge to relate things.

WHEN I AM AT THE GROCERY STORE SHOPPING FOR FISH PRODUCTS, WHAT CAN I LOOK FOR TO ENSURE THAT THE PRODUCT IS SUSTAINABLE?

Realize that all sea creatures are wild creatures. Would you invest in eating snow leopards and elephants? Would you dine on songbirds and think that's sustainable? What we're taking out of the oceans is not sustainable. We've already lost 90 percent of the tuna, swordfish, shark, halibut, cod. We've lost 99 percent of the oysters and clams from Chesapeake Bay. Forget those claims that seafood is good for you. It's good for the oceans and for you to have fish alive, not dead. Tilapia, catfish, carp—cultivated, low on the food chain, are good choices, especially if they are locally grown as you can find, rather than the other side of the planet.

DID YOU ALWAYS KNOW YOU WANTED TO BE A WRITER?

From the time I was eight or so. A letter from me, written at age 10, published in a children's magazine in 1947 says: "I am writing a book."

WHAT IS ONE THING YOU WISH YOU WOULD HAVE KNOWN ABOUT BEING A WRITER THAT THEY DIDN'T TEACH YOU IN SCHOOL?

That it is a slow process because the acquisition of experience is a necessary part.

WHAT WOULD BE YOUR ONE PIECE OF ADVICE FOR AN ASPIRING WRITER?

To study broadly in many fields—to learn history, sciences, art, music—all of that knowledge serves a writer so well.

HOW DO YOU PRACTICALLY GO ABOUT WRITING A BOOK? WHAT IS YOUR DAILY WRITING ROUTINE?

B.I.C.—Butt in Chair. That's the secret—you simply stick to it. I am at my desk every morning unless I am traveling. There aren't any gimmicks, really.

CARLY O'CONNOR '10, ENGLISH LITERATURE MAJOR, ASKS LOIS LOWRY ABOUT THE WRITING LIFE.

DO YOU BASE YOUR CHARACTERS OFF OF PEOPLE YOU KNOW, OR DO YOU COMPLETELY INVENT THEM?

With the exception of autobiographical novels—*Autumn Secret*, *A Summer to Die*, and *Crow Call*—all of my characters are invented. And yet we imagine and invent, using everything we've observed over the years. So bits and pieces of real people find their way into fictional characters.

WHICH AUTHOR(S) HAS HAD THE GREATEST INFLUENCE ON YOUR WRITING STYLE AND YOUR LIFE?

James Agee (a Pulitzer Prize-winning novelist whose works include *Let Us Now Praise Famous Men*, *The African Queen*, and *A Death in the Family*.)

WHAT ARE YOU CURRENTLY READING?

I am reading Orhan Pamuk's *The Museum of Innocence*. I am waiting for the third book in the Stieg Larsson trilogy to come out in this country!

VALEDICTORIAN

The co-valedictorians both grew up in Kokomo, Ind., where they are parishioners at St. Joan of Arc Roman Catholic Church, and attended the same grade school and high school together. They have been best friends since the eighth grade. Still more remarkable, both women accomplished the astonishing distinction of earning an "A" in every class they took during their four years at Saint Mary's College.

Yet, Audrey and Carly are a study in contrasts. Audrey, a Biology major, is candid, composed, and conveys a quiet self-confidence. Carly, an English Literature major, is warm—even luminous—and her humor tends toward the self-deprecating. Carly, who admits to being a stickler for preparation, had finalized her plans by March 2010 to study theology at the Pontifical John Paul II Institute at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. Audrey describes herself as someone who doesn't worry too much about the future. She still needed to firm up the details, but is certain that after graduation she will do international service work, most likely in Guyana, a state on the northern coast of South America.

Professors of these co-valedictorians described both women as gifted and hard working, always prepared for class, and skilled at time management. Beyond these basics for academic success, however, professors note that each woman brings unique gifts that transcend class work accomplishments and that can be applied for a life well lived.

HAS A PASSION FOR LEARNING

Laura Haigwood, professor of English Literature, points to Carly's gift for exceptional clarity and precision in her writing. "Even more apparent is Carly's love for learning. It would be difficult to work so hard and so effectively if one did not enjoy spending a great deal of one's time and energy in that way," says Haigwood.

MOVES FLUENTLY FROM THE DETAILS TO THE BIG PICTURE AND BACK AGAIN

"Changing gears is no problem for Audrey," says Richard J. Jensen, professor of Biology. "She easily sees underlying themes or similarities at work and how components interact." Audrey is also good with ambiguity, according to Jensen. "She doesn't seem bothered by uncertainty, because she has the confidence that at some point she will master the problem," says Jensen.

IS OPEN TO CHALLENGES AS OPPORTUNITIES

Theodore Billy, professor and chair of the English department, says Carly demonstrates a high level of dedication to a variety of academic disciplines, not only those in her major. "Carly is someone who gained as much as anyone can from the Saint Mary's experience," says Billy. "No matter what the situation, she's equally appreciative of the value of each course. For her, grades are a by-product rather than the goal. She approached every course as having a unique value, which is a rare quality. Whatever challenges she faces in her future, she'll have the drive to succeed."

ACTIVELY DISCERNS

Thomas Fogle, professor of Biology, sees Audrey's approach to achievement as a process of discernment: her insights obtained from whatever class she was taking informed her next academic choices. "Audrey is not only very good at analysis, she also sees what may not at first be apparent," says Fogle.

For example, Fogle has seen many gifted Biology majors who had long-held career goals. The fact that, as yet, Audrey hasn't settled on any one path reflects one of her key strengths. "I think throughout her college years Audrey explored options, which is ideal for a student studying at a college like Saint Mary's," says Fogle. "It's also symbolic of her deep faith, which she enlists to guide her." He believes that Audrey's plan to do international service work after graduation will be a catalyst to discern her future choices.

"It is very rare for a school of our size to be able to give students the opportunity to be in contact with artists of the stature of Glenn Close," says Saint Mary's College theatre professor Mark Abram-Copenhaver. Students presented a scene from Saint Mary's theatre production, *The Imaginary Invalid*, as well as selected monologues. Before the students began, Close confided, "I've never done this before, and I want you to know that." And then she proceeded to coach each student, helping them to take their performance to a new level.

The 2010 Margaret Hill Endowed Visiting Artist sponsored Close's visit. Hill, a 1961 Saint Mary's alumna, is a Broadway producer.

Saint Mary's College Math Professor Named Fulbright Scholar

In October 2009, Saint Mary's College received a \$245,000 Small Business Administration grant to support women's entrepreneurship in the South Bend area. With the grant money, Saint Mary's Department of Business Administration and Economics (BUEC) and the Center for Women's Intercultural Leadership (CWIL) co-created the Women's Entrepreneurship Initiative (WEI). Directors Susan Vance, professor of business law and accounting, and Martha Smith, a local entrepreneur and owner of two successful businesses, envision WEI as a resource program for both existing small business owners and women who are interested in starting a business. In another aspect of the program, Saint Mary's senior business majors will apply their classroom learning as consultants to small business owners who are seeking input on how to improve their businesses.

On April 9, WEI presented its first half-day seminar for local women entrepreneurs and interested students. "Personal Financial Strategies" included topics on risk management strategies, investing, and insurance.

Skin Deep: Bold Beauty Conference Challenges Media's View of Beauty

On April 26, Saint Mary's College hosted its second annual Bold Beauty Conference, an event that is meant to challenge societal standards of female beauty. This year the conference also examined female sexual identity in American culture. The event was organized by students and co-sponsored by the departments of Communication Studies, Dance & Theatre, Women's Studies, History and Film Studies.

One of the displays, "Barbies on Parade" questioned societal beauty myths. Students modified a Barbie™ doll to more accurately reflect the range of female beauty and femininity seen in the real world. Laura Mullen '10 crafted a spinster Barbie.™ "Barbie is seen as a young, flirty female with the world at her fingertips. This is true for many females in their 20s, but time in the real world does not stand still," Laura cautioned. "Spinster Barbie represents what happens when she is no longer in her 20s or 30s. She has grown older, out of style, and never found 'the one'—something that happens all the time in the real world, but not an idea that Mattel would cash in on."

"The goal of the conference is to take our classroom discussion to a wider forum—an example of grassroots organization at its best," says Communications Professor Terri Russ. Conference speakers included Amanda Littauer, assistant professor of Women's Studies and History at Northern Illinois University, and lawyer Cait Mullen. Mullin helped draft New York's Safe Harbor Act which became law in 2008. The law recognizes that prostituted children are victims, not criminals.

"The biggest thing I am taking away from helping to organize the conference is why I choose to do things," says Erin Brennan '11. "Why do I wear what I am wearing? Why do I put on makeup? Is it for myself? Or is it because it is what society expects from me?"


