THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Last year, the addition of Dr. Don Paetkau provided much needed expertise in molecular biology and stimulated us to explore alternatives to the traditional major. The departure of Dr. David Sever, after 30 years of service, resulted in the hiring of **Ryan Dombkowski** (see below) to join the faculty in the 2005-2006 academic year. Ryan's major responsibility will be teaching anatomy to both biology majors and nursing intents. Ryan's extensive experience teaching medical students should mesh well with many of our student's goals to pursue careers in medically related fields.

New concentrations in Ecology/Environmental Biology and Cellular/Molecular Biology were approved by the College. We graduated our first major in the Cellular/Molecular concentration this year (**Danelle Duffy '05**) and we have several rising senior and juniors pursuing degrees in this exciting field. The addition of a molecular biologist and the development of the concentrations in cellular/molecular biology and ecology/environmental biology were done, at least in part, based on information from alumnae surveys and exit interviews with our graduating seniors. Movement in these directions is also directly related to preparing our students "to make a difference in the world" (College Mission Statement), and inviting "students to think critically and creatively about the natural world" (College Statement of Philosophy and Purpose).

The department continues to participate in Hypatia Day which encourages young women in junior high school to continue their science education by providing role models (our students and faculty) and hands-on activities in the biological sciences. Our students also serve as judges for the Northern Indiana Regional Science Fair. One of their most important duties is to identify the best elementary and junior high projects done by female students. These students are presented with the Dineen Award which consists of a certificate and a small monetary stipend.

Julia Adams was the co-valedictorian of the Class of 2005 (our second consecutive valedictorian!) and **Elizabeth Schowe** had the second highest grade point average in the graduating class.



Ryan Dombkowski (Ph.D. candidate, ND, '05) brings new expertise to the department. After completing his B.A. in chemistry (Wabash College, 20000), Ryan enrolled in the Indiana University School of Medicine, South Bend campus. After completing the first year of medical school, Ryan realized that his real interests were in teaching and research and enrolled in the Ph.D. program at the University of Notre Dame. During his years at ND, Ryan has taught Gross Anatomy (Fall 2003 and 2004) and Physiology (Spring 2004) at the IU School of Medicine, Human Musculoskeletal Anatomy (Fall 2003 and 2004) at Notre Dame, and an Anatomy and Physiology course (Summer 2004) at Indiana University, South Bend. addition to these teaching responsibilities, Ryan has completed his dissertation, "Vertebrate Mechanisms of Hydrogen Sulfide Vasoactivity, " and has co-authored three research publications. To top it off, Ryan is married to Alicia Lesneskie (SMC '02)!


